

## Alumnus to receive honorary doctorate



**Dawson**

Robert Dawson, a 1949 NDSU graduate, will receive an honorary doctorate during NDSU Winter Commencement Dec. 17. Dawson, the board chair of the Dawson Insurance Agency, Inc., Fargo, and a member of the board of directors for Dawson Hail Insurance Co., is noted for his long history of generosity and commitment to NDSU, the Fargo-Moorhead community and his industry.

Dawson and his brother, Jim, began their business careers in 1943 by buying interest in Dawson Insurance, owned by their father. The family-run business celebrated 80 years of service in 1997. In 1969, the brothers formed Dawson Hail Insurance Co., which grew to work with 700 local agencies in five states. When the firm was sold in 1995, it had written \$60 million in premiums and had \$1 billion in liability on the region's crops that year.

A respected leader in the insurance industry, Dawson is a past president of the Fargo Association of Independent Agents, past president of the North Dakota Association of Independent Agents and served as a state national director of the Independent Insurance Agents of America.

Dawson is an active participant in NDSU alumni and fund-raising events. A member of the NDSU Development Foundation's board of trustees since 1972, he has participated in several capital drives, including chair of the business division for the SU '75 Campaign, steering committee of the Music Education Center Campaign, participant in the Centennial Campaign, chair of the Century II Division of the \$20,000,000 Campaign for North Dakota State University and co-chair of the Bison Bidders Bowl.

In addition, Dawson served as president of the foundation board from 1983 to 1985, is a member of the President's Medallion Society, was presented Honored Alumnus status in 1974 and received the Alumni Achievement Award in 1978.

"Robert exemplifies integrity, leadership and good citizenship," wrote Dr. Warren B. Diederich, foundation trustee, in a letter of nomination. "He is a candidate worthy of an honorary doctorate."

Foundation trustee Lloyd O. Thompson called it a privilege to know Dawson. "Bob Dawson is well respected in the community and throughout the state of North Dakota and is a gentleman with high integrity," he wrote in a nomination letter.

Dawson has been involved in several local and regional organizations including leadership roles with the Fargo Kiwanis Club, St. Luke's Hospitals, Norwest Bank, Jamestown College, Fargo Chamber of Commerce, F-M Family YMCA, Red River Zoological Society, Fargo-Moorhead Area Foundation and the First Presbyterian Church. He is a member of the Fargo Elks Lodge, Shiloh Masonic Lodge, Scottish Rite Bodies and El Zagal Shrine Temple.

James E. Dixon, president of Dixon Insurance, Fargo, cites Dawson's character in his letter of nomination. "Through the years Bob has given unselfishly of his time and money to many worthy civic causes," he wrote of his fellow Independent Insurance Agent. "Lending his reputation to the many organizations he served also encouraged others to support the same institutions, thus multiplying his influence in our city and state."

## Libraries offer new authentication system for off-campus Internet access

NDSU Libraries offers a new authentication system for NDSU students, faculty and staff who are not on campus but want to use online library resources.

NDSU is required to verify that only people affiliated with NDSU are able to access digital journals, library databases and other Internet resources that have been licensed. People using the NDSU network from computers located on campus usually have ready access to these materials, but those that try to connect to these library resources from remote locations are often denied access. A new registration process will permit remote users to verify their affiliation with NDSU and create a secure login and password that can then be used to gain access to needed materials.

When an NDSU student, staff or faculty member who is off campus attempts to link from an NDSU Libraries' Web page to a secured resource, a window is displayed to allow a login to the resource. To establish this login ID and password, first-time users must click the "cancel" button on this login window. An explanation of the authentication system with a link to a remote access registration form is then displayed. Completing the remote access registration form once will generate the login ID and password that can be utilized for all future uses of secured online library resources. Alternatively, library patrons may register at any convenient time by pointing their web browser to <https://www.lib.ndsu.nodak.edu/disted-auth/>.

In establishing this authentication system, the Libraries have made Web resources more easily accessible to the NDSU community. Login and verification information that remote users transmit are as secure as possible.

## Instructional development grant proposals due

Faculty are reminded that proposals for instructional development grants are due Dec. 10. The grants are awarded up to \$1,500 for course development projects and \$3,000 for inter/intra-disciplinary projects.

"The money can be used for anything related to instructional development, including videos for use in the classroom and travel to develop instructional skills. The grants can be used for virtually anything except salary," said Charles Harter, associate professor of business administration and chair of the Faculty Development Committee. "We have money we need to distribute and we encourage faculty to apply by Dec. 10."

Copies of proposal reports should be submitted to the Office of the Vice President of Academic Affairs, Old Main 103, and Harter, Putnam 17. Applicants will be notified of the acceptance or rejection of their proposals within three weeks following the deadline.

### Sehgal receives research grants

Inder Sehgal, assistant professor of pharmacy, has received two federal research grants during his first year at NDSU that will allow him to develop a basic research program in the College of Pharmacy targeting prostate cancer metastasis.

The first award, an National Institutes of Health AREA grant, is for \$75,000 for direct costs over three years. It is directed at defining new strategies to block neuropeptide hormones in prostate cancer and prostate cancer metastasis. These peptide hormones can promote both the growth and spread of prostate cancer cells.

The second award, a Department of Defense Prostate Cancer Research Program New Investigator Award, is for \$223,000 for direct costs over three years. It will fund research aimed at the identification of novel intracellular proteins in prostate cancers that increase the production of enzymes called "Matrix Metalloproteinases" or MMPs. These MMP enzymes permit cancer cells to successfully migrate from their point of origin, the "primary" tumor, to distant sites by digesting natural barriers. By understanding how MMPs are regulated specifically in prostate cancer cells, it may be possible to design new treatments that will selectively inhibit MMP production in these cancer cells more than in normal tissues.

## Chapmans donate American Indian star blanket to university

The NDSU President's House has a new work of art on display, an American Indian star blanket. The blanket was created with an NDSU theme by New Town resident Shirley M. Grady, whose Indian name is Lead Woman. Joe and Gale Chapman purchased it at last fall's Bison Bidder's Bowl as a gift to the university and now have it on display in their living room.

Through oral tradition, it is told that star blankets, or star quilts as they are also known, became a part of the American Indian lifestyle in the early to mid-1800's. They continue to play a prominent role in modern Indian culture and are often offered as special gifts.

"American Indian culture is so important in North Dakota that as soon as we saw this wonderful blanket, we wanted to put it on display in a place of special honor," said Gale Chapman.

The Chapmans hosted a group of multicultural students at a special unveiling of the new quilt Nov. 22, including several students from New Town.

## Music faculty perform in November

Neil Mueller, assistant professor of music, recently performed the Concerto for Trumpet in D Major by Johann Fasch with the Eastern Connecticut Symphony Orchestra. The concert was held in New London, Conn., and was conducted by Xao-Lu Li.

The reviewer for the New London Day wrote, "Trumpeter Neil Mueller popped sonic fireworks with his piccolo trumpet in the Baroque concerto. In the short, but brilliant showpiece, Mueller was especially impressive in his control of dynamics, maintaining a balanced timbre in his quietest and brassiest passages, including the stratospheric flourish ending the second movement."

Mueller, a South Dakota native, has been active on the east coast as a soloist and chamber and symphonic musician. He won the 1997 Concerto-Aria competition at Boston University and has performed with the Boston Pops Orchestra, the Boston University Symphonic Orchestra and several other orchestras in the New England states. He performed at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., as first trumpet with the Brass Ring. He has been the principal trumpet of the Eastern Connecticut Symphony Orchestra since 1993 and has recorded a variety of music with chamber groups and brass quintets.

Also in November, Robert Jones, assistant professor of music, performed in the Fargo-Moorhead Civic Opera's production of Peter Schickele's "The Stoned Guest." Jones and Andrew Froelich, professor of music, provided music at the annual St. Andrews Society Banquet. Froelich is the principal keyboard player for the Fargo-Moorhead Symphony Orchestra and has served as the music director and/or conductor to more than 50 theatrical productions in the Fargo-Moorhead area.

## Jacobson selected to All-America team

NDSU middle hitter Carrie Jacobson was named to the 1999 American Volleyball Coaches Association Division II All-America 1st team. Jacobson is the third NDSU volleyball player to earn All-America honors three times joining former Olympian Janet Cobbs (1986-88) and Brenda Schultz (1988-90).

The AVCA will present the 19th annual All-America awards Dec. 1, at the NCAA Division II Womens National Championship banquet in Battle Creek, Mich.

"Working with so many younger players this season, Carrie's leadership was real significant in helping win the region championship and getting back to the Elite Eight," said head volleyball coach Zaundra Bina. "Blocking-wise, Carrie is clearly one of the top two or three blockers in the country and perhaps one of the best ever to come out of NDSU."

Recently Jacobson, a senior from Willmar, Minn., became the program's all-time leader in block assists with 573 assists entering the Elite Eight. Jacobson is also second in hitting percentage, third in solo blocks, sixth in kills and ninth in attacks. She is NDSU's all-time leader in total blocks with 700.

Jacobson earned a spot on the All-NCC 1st team for the fourth consecutive season in 1999. She also was the 1996 NCC Freshman of the Year.

## Cosgrove to present Mark Twain program at Science Museum of Minnesota

Bill Cosgrove, professor of English, will present "Mark Twain on the Mississippi River" as part of the grand opening of the new home for the Science Museum of Minnesota in St. Paul. He will present his one-man show eight times Dec. 11 and 12 in the Mississippi River Gallery of the museum.

Cosgrove has performed the show more than 100 times in North Dakota and Minnesota for more than 10,000 people since 1982. It consists of authentic Twain material taken from the humorist's own writings and lectures. The performance will include an account of Twain's travels through North Dakota and Minnesota in 1895.

Other events planned for the grand opening include an appearance by Bill Nye the Science Guy and presentations on Marie Curie and Galileo. The museum also features the first convertible-dome theater in the United States and exhibits on dinosaurs and the human body.
