University Senate considers change in bylaws

The University Senate Jan. 24 gave first reading to a bylaw change to include the University Assessment Committee as a standing committee of the group. The first reading of the proposal, forwarded by the Special Committee on University Governance, was unanimously approved and will be placed on the Feb. 14 agenda for second reading and possible approval.

The committee would consist of a Senate liaison person, one undergraduate student, one graduate student and representatives of the General Education Committee, Division of Student Affairs, NDSU Extension Service and the Office of Assessment and Institutional Research. A representative of the Division of Academic Affairs would be a non-voting, ex officio member.

The committee would periodically review the assessment of student learning in the undergraduate and graduate programs, develop procedures for the annual reporting of assessment activities by departments and other academic units, provide feedback and assistance to departments and other academic units on their assessment activities and provide a yearly summary of assessment activities to the vice president for academic affairs, the Office of Assessment and Institutional Research and the University Senate.

Another proposed change to the bylaws to establish a faculty caucus was referred back to the Special Committee on University Governance for clarification and language changes.

Counselor ed program selected for national initiative

NDSU's Counselor Education Program has been selected by the Education Trust for the National Initiative to Transform School Counseling to help shape school counseling across the United States. NDSU received "companion school" status in a countrywide effort to improve school counseling.

"There are hundreds of counseling programs and to be one of the very few selected is a prestigious honor," said Bob Nielsen, program coordinator and associate professor in the School of Education, noting that NDSU will be a companion school to the original six institutions in the project. "North Dakota has a lot to offer the rest of the United States and we see that as part of our responsibility."

The national initiative, with the support of the DeWitt Wallace-Reader's Digest Fund, takes the approach that school counselors need to work with all students to help prevent problems rather than react to situations.

The NDSU program will work closely with the Fargo School District, offering such things as quarterly in-service for elementary, middle and secondary counselors; guidance lessons in elementary school classrooms each year; and one to three NDSU student intern placements annually. While Fargo will be the central partner, other area schools also will be included to some degree.

Proposals needed for Grant-in-Aid Program

The NDSU Research and Consulting Committee has announced its annual request for proposals for its 1999-2000 Grant-in-Aid Program.

The application deadline is Friday, Feb. 25. Awards will be decided and funding available by approximately May 15. The purpose of the program is to assist faculty in obtaining external funding by providing financial support for the collection of preliminary data that would strengthen a major proposal to an extramural funding agency.

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Mainframe reports go electronic

The Higher Education Computer Network (HECN) is implementing new software that will revolutionize the way administrative batch reports are distributed on campus and save a few trees in the process. This software, called PageCenter, makes its debut at NDSU and UND the first week of February, when a few, previously selected, month-end reports are adapted to make use of this new program.

PageCenter is a report management system that has its own web page where it maintains a mailbox for each department that is accessible with a Web browser. Currently Netscape Navigator 4.07, Netscape Communicator 4.7 and Internet Explorer 5.0 (or higher) are supported.

Reports are delivered electronically to a department's mailbox instantaneously upon completion of the mainframe processing. They can then be viewed, searched, copied to an electronic spreadsheet, printed or stored for later use. PageCenter also will decollate and distribute the various parts of a report to the appropriate departments.

Some other advantages to having the information delivered electronically include:

- Ability to import the data from reports into a spreadsheet for analysis.
- · Electronic searches of data
- · Quick retrieval of archived data
- Capacity to view multiple reports at the same time
- Ability to access the data from almost anywhere
- Capability of simultaneous viewing of reports by persons separated by long distances
- Printing only the parts of a report that are needed

Department mailboxes will be secured by the RACF security system as well as PageCenter's own internal security. A user will be required to have a current CICS or TSO user id and password as well as prior authorization to access a department's mailbox. The mailboxes and access should be ready for the first production run in February.

Two open forums are planned to demonstrate PageCenter and answer questions related to PageCenter and the completion of the Security Access Form. The first forum is scheduled for 2-3:30 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 9, in the Memorial Union University Chamber. The second forum is planned for 10-11:30 a.m. Thursday, Feb. 10, in FLC 319. Department Security Access Forms were sent to department heads last week. If your department has not received its form, it is available at: www.ndsu.nodak.edu/accounting/csforms/forms/pagecenter.pdf.

Training for PageCenter has been arranged for the last week in February and the first week in March. Time and locations will be announced at the open forums.

The acquisition of this software is the result of efforts by the NDSU Administrative Print Committee to explore options for impact printing. The committee is co-chaired by Rosi Kloberdanz, associate director of Information Technology Services, and Jean Ostrom-Blonigen, internal auditor. It consists of members representing both the student and financial systems.

PageCenter will be phased in as quickly as possible. Each department that will be receiving reports through PageCenter

will, at first, continue to receive a printed copy, as well as the electronic distribution. This will allow persons to become familiar with PageCenter and see the correlation between the printed copies and the PageCenter representation. Eventually printed copies will be eliminated, saving time, department and university resources and paper.

Distinguished Professorship nominations due Feb. 4

Nominations for the 20th Chamber of Commerce NDSU Distinguished Professorship are due Feb. 4. The winner will be selected in April and recognized at the annual awards luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce in May. He or she will receive a cash award and will enjoy the permanent title of Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Professor.

Nominees will be judged on the basis of their performance and promise as scholars, teachers and/or artists during their time at NDSU. Substantial professional achievement by nominees leading to recognition, not only at NDSU and North Dakota, but nationally and internationally as well, will play a major role in guiding the committee's deliberations. Other characteristics considered will include the following:

- superior teaching and other types of interaction with students;
- significant publications or other scholarly contributions;
- awards, offices in national organizations and editorships;
- financial and other support for scholarly activities from external sources; and
- substantial community service and/or outreach activity in the region.

The award excludes deans, directors and vice presidents. Nominations will be accepted from any member of the university or Chamber communities. The nomination letter, a three-page resume and no more than three letters of support (one of which should specifically address service and outreach activities) should be sent to Will Bleier, committee chair, Stevens 218, on or before Feb. 4.

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Procedures for winter storms announced by student affairs

The Division of Student Affairs would like to remind NDSU faculty, staff and students of its procedures for winter storms. Normally, snow or low temperatures are not reasons to close the university, but significant amounts of snow might warrant a delayed start. Snow combined with severe windchills and blizzard conditions may warrant closing the university.

The following actions may be taken by NDSU:

- NDSU will be in full operation and all events will take place as scheduled.
- Morning classes at NDSU may be canceled or all classes may be canceled for the entire day. All other aspects of the university will operate as usual.
- NDSU will be closed until noon or a specific time, or NDSU may be closed for the entire day. In this situation, only a few designated emergency personnel are required to report to work, such as power plant employees whose responsibilities require they be on duty. Announcements regarding afternoon classes will be made by 11 a.m.
- Evening classes are canceled or will be held.

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NDSU student receives NASA space grant fellowship

NDSU senior Brett Larson has received a prestigious scholarship through the NASA Space Grant program.

Each spring the program awards funding for research based upon the student's proposed project, grade point average and letters of recommendation from faculty. Larson will use the scholarship funds for his analysis of flight control system manufacturing.

Larson, with team member Steve O'Hearn, will design, manufacture and fly a remote controlled aircraft. The two men, both Aero Manufacturing Engineering Technology (AMET) students, will incorporate a Shape Memory Alloy system into their project. The system utilizes a thin wired system to replace the motor within an aircraft. The aircraft will be used to test smart materials manufacturing research at NDSU's Intelligent Product Realization Center.

"Future AMET students will be able to see the aspects of smart materials through this project in a practical way instead from a textbook," Larson said. "I enjoy putting classroom learning into a practical setting."

Memorial Union Gallery exhibits 'Figures,' wood carvings

The Memorial Union Gallery will host Iowa artist frji echeverria's "Figures" and an exhibit of the work of the Red River Valley Woodcarvers Feb. 4-25. A reception is planned for 4-6 p.m. Friday, Feb. 4

In describing his work, echeverria said, "I have been painting people, usually one person at a time, and exploring how the conversation between us as I paint can affect the work. I started by looking for how the conversation and the visual examination of the person can be co-equal sources of the painting."

While on campus this month, echeverria also will be working with students in the visual arts department. In the Printmaking, Education and Research Studio (P.E.A.R.S.), he will go through the steps of editioning a print. The process involves going from a general sketch of an idea, to planning how the colors will be printed on separate plates, to experimenting with the inks and the order they are printed. After finding the best combination, the artist attempts to print an image on several sheets of paper for an end result of several pieces of art that are identical. The group of prints is called an edition, and each is considered an original.

Funding for this exhibit and artist's visit has been made possible in part by NDSU Student Government.

The wood carvings will be located in the Gallery and the oak display case near the FLC ramp in Alumni Lounge. Featured carvers will include Mike Chapek, Jan Flom, Wayne Hankel, Purcell Hovland, Paul Maassel, Henry McCormick, Marlin Nantt, Vern Nolting, Kevin Roseland and Vern Sogge.

The woodcarvers group was established in 1973 with a membership of eight carvers. It has since grown to approximately 60 members from three states and one Canadian province. The carvers are known for the three-day carving weekend workshop they host in June, which nearly 200 carvers attend.

NIH hopes to enable grant recipients to extend their geographic base of research and training efforts to developing countries and emerging democracies, in support of population issues of mutual priority. Broad objectives are to:

- enhance international and U.S. population research programs through training of foreign nationals and international collaborative studies related to populations, including the study of: a) reproductive processes, contraceptive development, contraceptive and reproductive health evaluation and reproductive epidemiology; and b) demographic processes (including aging, longevity, biodemography, mortality, morbidity, fertility, migration, linkages between health and economic development and other social, behavioral and economic factors that influence population dynamics);
- strengthen the ability of scientists from developing nations to contribute to global population research efforts and advance knowledge in support of population policies appropriate for their home countries and established international guidelines; and
- develop and strengthen centers of research excellence in population-related sciences in developing countries through training and training related research.

The grantee institution must be a U.S. non-profit private or public institution capable of meeting the objectives in this RFA. Applicant investigators (or co-investigators) must be either a U.S. principal investigator (PI) of at least one NIH-sponsored research project grant (R series) or a project director of an NIH-sponsored center grant, program project grant or cooperative agreement (P and U series) related to population studies that will be funded during at least one year of the proposed grant award period.
