NDSU fraternity houses to be alcohol-free under new policy

A series of recommendations to strengthen the Greek Life system at North Dakota State University has been accepted by George Wallman, vice president for student affairs. Wallman said the new substance-free policy will be phased in, with full compliance achieved by Fall Semester 2003. Among the changes are additional institutional support of Greek Life officers and advisers, university consideration of allowing freshmen to live in fraternity and sorority houses, and alcohol in Greek housing will be prohibited in common areas and limited to the private rooms of residents 21 or older who may have no more than three guests who are also 21 or older.

The recommendations were the product of months of discussions between Greek leaders and Prakash Mathew, dean of student life, who submitted the final report to Wallman.

"Alcohol misuse is not uniquely a Greek problem. University's across the nation are struggling to find meaningful ways of dealing underage and binge drinking," said Mathew. "We know from our experience at NDSU that those associated with Greek Life have contributed greatly to the university. But we also know that alcohol abuse carries a series of negative consequences, including drinking and driving, party complaints and decreased academic achievement. These recommendations will strengthen the Greek living experience for everyone."

Two of 10 NDSU fraternities and all five NDSU sororities are already alcohol-free. Under the new policy, those fraternities or sororities wishing to hold events with alcohol could do so in licensed establishments that provide trained servers and assume responsibility for serving alcohol in accordance with local, state and federal law.

"We worked together because we all shared the same goal: to improve Greek life at NDSU," said Greg Clark, a student leader with Sigma Phi Delta. "We wanted to be a part of the solution, rather than having something imposed on us by the university. That these recommendations went through five revisions shows that we had a very good give and take throughout the process."

NDSU requires that freshmen live on campus, with certain exceptions. Under the new policy, freshmen could live in a Greek house in their second semester if the student and the chapter have maintained academic standards and meet other requirements.

"I asked Prakash and the Greek leadership to develop a plan of action that will make all parties proud and that may be considered as a model for others to follow," said Wallman. "I believe these recommendations fulfill that charge."

The recommendations will be reviewed by the university and Greek leadership in the fall of 2006 to determine if they have resulted in improvements in Greek life.

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Schnell receives Blue Key Doctor of Service



Craig Schnell, vice president for academic affairs, received the prestigious Doctor of Service Award at the 67th annual Blue Key National Honor Fraternity honors banquet April 23. The award recognizes leaders and role models who guide and support through action and deeds.

"I was shocked, surprised and delighted," said Schnell of receiving the award which was first presented in 1930. "This is the highest honor students bestow, and I did not expect it."

Schnell was chosen from a list of strong candidates, according to Blue Key president Eric Mairs, a senior majoring in crop and weed science. "We chose Dr. Schnell because of all service, counseling and time he gives to students," he said. "All the weekends and after-hour work he puts in-the extra effort benefits the students, the university as a whole and the state of North Dakota. He is a very worthy individual for this honor."

George Wallman, vice president for student affairs, and Tadd Tobkin, immediate past student body president, gave speeches at the banquet in support of Schnell's nomination.

Schnell joined NDSU in 1985 after serving as the chair of the Department of Pharmaco-dynamics and Toxicology at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, Omaha. His many honors include the Distinguished Alumnus from Purdue University, Burroughs-Welcome Scholar in Toxicology and Outstanding Young Men of America. He also is a past Blue Key adviser.

Schnell received his bachelor's degree at South Dakota State University and his master's degree and doctorate in pharmacology/toxicology at Purdue University.

Blue Key, with a motto of "Serving I Live," is a national honor fraternity that recognizes leadership, scholarship and service. In addition to its awards and scholarships, the organization produces the annual Homecoming Show and the Bison Brevities talent show. The NDSU chapter, organized in 1927, was the 28th chapter to be established in the country.

Miltenberger named Chamber **Distinguished Professor**



Raymond A. Miltenberger, professor of psychology, has been selected the 2001-02 Chamber of Commerce NDSU Distinguished Professor. Miltenberger will be honored at an awards luncheon at noon Wednesday, May 23, at the Holiday Inn, Fargo.

Miltenberger was chosen from a strong field of nominees. "It's a measure of how good Ray is

that he stood out among the many nominees worthy of the honor of this professorship," said Tom Isern, professor of history and chair of the selection committee. "He has international scholarly standing on account of his research, and he uses that expertise to serve his community and state."

The award, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce of Fargo Moorhead, was first presented in 1978. It recognizes NDSU faculty members who have reached an extraordinary level of

distinction. Nominees were judged on their performance and promise as scholars, teachers and/or artists during their time at NDSU. Superior teaching; significant publications; awards; offices in national organizations and editorships; financial and other external support for scholarly activities; and community service also are considered.

"There was a good discussion among the committee members" to identify the candidate to win the award," said David Martin, Chamber public affairs manager and slection committee member. "There are specific criteria and there were a number of strong nominees. Ray's long-standing contribution to the university and the broader region pushed him across the finish line ahead of the other close contenders."

In a letter of nomination, Kevin McCaul, professor of psychology; Margaret Wilson, assistant professor of psychology; and James Council, professor and chair of psychology, praised Miltenberger as "a dedicated and accomplished teacher" and as "an incredibly productive researcher who publishes regularly in the major peer-reviewed journals in his field." They described him as "an award-winning teacher, author and scholar whose work is known throughout the world."

F. Charles Mace, professor of clinical psychology, University of Wales, United Kingdom, wrote, "Ray is one of the field's most productive researchers, with 99 journal articles to his credit. His work spans several topics related to the assessment and treatment of behavior disorders associated with developmental disabilities. However, within this breadth of work, Ray has made a significant and lasting contribution to the treatment of habit disorders."

Brian A. Iwata, research foundation professor in the University of Florida psychology department, wrote, "Ray has made major and lasting contributions to the field of behavior analysis."

An NDSU faculty member for 15 years, Miltenberger also is a clinical associate professor at the University of North Dakota School of Medicine and an adjunct professor for the UND psychology department. He earned his bachelor's degree at Wabash College, and his master's degree and doctorate in clinical psychology at Western Michigan University. He also held a predoctoral internship at the John F. Kennedy Institute, Division of Behavioral Psychology, at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine.

His honors include the 2000 Distinguished Alumnus Award from the Western Michigan University Department of Psychology, 2000 Dean's Award for Excellence in Research, 1995 Dean's Award for Excellence in Teaching, Burlington Northern Foundation's Faculty Achievement Award, Developmental Disabilities Service Managers' Award for Outstanding Research in Staff Management and Mortar Board 1990 Outstanding Adviser Award.

Miltenberger's professional activities include the State Board of Psychologist Examiners, executive committee of the Midwest Association for Behavior Analysis and Therapy, the interdisciplinary advisory council of the North Dakota Center on Disabilities, behavioral consultant for the North Dakota Department of Human Services, research review committee for Fraser Hall Residential Training Program, Fargo, and past board member of the Rape and Abuse Crisis Center, Fargo.

SU Calls from Campus establishes new record

The NDSU Development Foundation's SU Calls from Campus program has set another record. This year the student callers raised more than \$605,000 in gifts and pledges for the benefit of NDSU, marking the fourth straight year the program has surpassed the previous year's record.

Completing its 18th year, SU Calls from Campus continues to be one of the most effective ways NDSU reaches out to its alumni, parents and friends. Sixty-five NDSU students made more than 170,000 calls to visit with prospective donors about the latest activities on campus and to raise money.

The program is part of The Annual Fund for NDSU, which raises private dollars for a variety of campus areas, including academic scholarships, student and faculty programs, and alumni and foundation programs.

In addition to earning an hourly wage, student callers network with alumni, learning valuable communication skills and negotiating techniques. The program has seen a 217 percent increase in dollars raised since 1993-94. NDSU students first picked up the phone in 1983 and raised \$34,000.

Research administration to change name

The Office of Research Administration will be renamed the Office of Sponsored Programs Administration, effective July 1.

"The name is being changed to more accurately reflect the activities of the office, since services involve not only research, but all sponsored programs involving other creative activities as well," said Philip Boudjouk, vice president for research, creative activities and technology transfer.

The office is the central administrative support office for research and scholarly activity at NDSU. It provides services for individuals who are seeking funding for research and other scholarly activities, including forms and assistance for grant applications, compliance review and internal funding programs. It also provides oversight, compiles data and generates reports regarding research and grant-related activities.

A search committee is presently seeking a person to fill the position of assistant vice president for sponsored programs administration, who will lead the office.

Mac Software: Adobe Photoshop will be upgraded from 5.5 to 6.0; Adobe Premier will be upgraded from 5.1 to 6.0; MS-Office will be upgraded from 98 to 2001; Mulberrry will be upgraded to the newest version available; Dreamweaver 4 will be added; Adobe Pagemaker will be removed and users are asked to use Adobe In-Design; Claris Home Page will be removed and users are asked to use Dreamweaver; Hypercard will be removed summer 2002. MiniTab 10X for the Macintosh will not run under MacOS X. If MiniTab does not release a correction prior to March 2002, ITS plans to purchase MiniTab for Windows as a replacement for MiniTab for the Macintosh. Longtime Varsity Mart manager dies

Richard "Dick" Kasper, manager of the Varsity Mart for 39 years, died April 20 at his Fargo home. He was 70.

Born in Turtle Lake, N.D., Kasper graduated from Butte, N.D., High School in 1948. He then served in the Army during the Korean War, receiving two bronze stars and the United Nations Service Medal. He graduated from the North Dakota State College of Science in 1957.

Kasper became Varsity Mart manager in 1958, a position he held until his retirement in 1997. He also earned a degree in business administration in 1975. An avid Bison fan, Kasper enjoyed singing the national anthem at sporting events, and he sang the school song at numerous NDSU Hall of Fame luncheons.

He was active in many organizations, including the Knights of Columbus, Roughriders Kiwanis, Bison Bidders Bowl, Edgewood Men's Club, Holy Spirit Parish Council and Holy Spirit PTA.

Survivors include his wife, Sally, five sons and eight grand-children.

Strommen to retire

Gordon Strommen, associate professor of pharmacy practice and pharmacotherapy specialist at the Veterans Administration Medical Center, Fargo, will retire from his faculty position June 30 after 36 years of service.

Strommen earned his bachelor's degree in pharmacy in 1962 and his master's degree in pharmacology from NDSU in 1965. He received his Doctor of Pharmacy in 1984 from the University of Nebraska.

He joined NDSU in 1965 and has provided didactic instruction in the areas of hematology and endocrine disorders, as well as precepting students on clinical rotations at the VAMC. In addition, Strommen has served as the college's director of experiential programs. He also was the co-editor of the North Dakota Pharmacist journal from 1988 to 1996; chief of the division of clinical pharmacology in the Department of International Medicine, School of Medicine, University of North Dakota, from 1987 to 1998; reviewer for the Annals of Pharmacotherapy; and adjunctive medical staff of the VAMC.

Strommen has served on numerous committees at NDSU including being member, faculty senator and chair of the college's Promotion, Tenure and Evaluation Committee for 11 years. He also served on the North Dakota Blue Cross Blue Shield Formulary and VAMC Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committees since 1992.

His many honors and awards include the Lehn and Fink Gold Medal Award for Academic Excellence in 1962; AFPE Graduate Fellowship in 1964; Fellow of the Dakota Plains Geriatric Education Unit in 1987; and NDSU College of Pharmacy Preceptor of the Year in 1998 and 2000. Strommen and his wife, Pat, have three adult children and live in Fargo.

Mathsen earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics and physics at Concordia College, Moorhead, in 1960, and received his master's degree and doctorate in mathematics at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, in 1962 and 1965, respectively. In 1967-68, he had a postdoctoral fellowship at the University of Alberta, Edmonton, Canada.

In 1973-74, he was a Fulbright lecturer at the University of Liberia, Monrovia, Liberia, West Africa. His research interest and course work involves differential and difference equations.

Corry to publish article

Shauna Corry, assistant professor and facility management program coordinator in apparel, textiles and interior design, will be published in May in the "Universal Design Handbook."

Corry's submission, "Post-Occupancy Evaluation from a Universal Design Perspective," focuses on a research study conducted in the Fargo-Moorhead area to highlight the need for increased communication and awareness between facility designers and managers, and disabled users.
