

State employee suggestion award program announced

North Dakota state employees are eligible to receive an award up to \$2,000 for making suggestions that cut the costs of state government. The program was approved by the 1993 North Dakota Legislature.

Ideas should be submitted on the employee suggestion form (SFN 19291) available from your agency, the Suggestion Incentive Award Committee or use the form on the state forms page at www.state.nd.us/eforms. Suggestions will be reviewed by the committee, and, if approved, will be forwarded to the proper agency administrator for a final decision.

Those who submit a suggestion that is approved will receive 20 percent of the first year's savings realized, up to a maximum of \$2,000. The cash award will be received 12 months after the idea has been implemented.

Stoltenow to provide look at Russia's biological warfare system

Charles Stoltenow, assistant professor of animal and range sciences, is scheduled to present "Obolensk: An Inside Look at Russia's Biological Warfare System" at 10 a.m. Tuesday, Nov. 13, in the Memorial Union Century Theater.

Stoltenow, a veterinarian with the NDSU Extension Service, recently returned from a two-week scientific exchange program in Obolensk, home of Russia's State Research Center of Applied Microbiology. The center is the research unit for bacteria within the Russian biological warfare system, and houses bacteria including anthrax, plague and tularemia.

Stoltenow will discuss his experiences and impressions of the center, and the implications and ramifications of Russia entering a free-market enterprise system.

Interdisciplinary course proposals sought

Warner receives Agri-business Award

NDSU alumnus Michael Warner, BS '72, received the 2001 Agri-business Award during the 28th Harvest Bowl banquet Nov. 2 at the Holiday Inn, Fargo. In addition, honorees from nearly every North Dakota county were recognized.

The Harvest Bowl was established in 1973 to recognize respected community citizens who are dedicated to agriculture as a vocation, and in 1979, the first Harvest Bowl scholarships were awarded to Bison student athletes. The Harvest Bowl has recognized more than 1,700 agriculturists and awarded more than \$50,000 in scholarships to students with agricultural backgrounds.

Warner is a fourth generation farmer in the Red River Valley, who has actively farmed 4,300 acres near Hillsboro, with primary crop production consisting of spring wheat, barley, soybeans, edible beans, sunflowers and sugarbeets.

For almost 30 years, he has been involved in areas of agricultural policy, agribusiness, agricultural research, economic development and agricultural education. Among his many activities was being an original stockholder of American Crystal Sugar Co., helping to start the Dakota Growers Pasta Co., serving on the steering committee of Progold and being chair of the formation of the Spring Wheat Bakers Cooperative.

He has been active in many organizations, including the American Sugarbeet Growers Association, the Red River Valley Sugarbeet Growers Association, Sugarbeet Research and Education Committee, North Dakota Ag Product Utilization Commission, North Dakota Committee of 100, Northern Plains Consortium and the Future of Ag Extension National Task Force.

Local activities have included volunteer service with the NDSU Development Foundation board of trustees, MeritCare Health Service of Fargo board of directors and the NDSU President's Ag Club.

He and his wife, Joanne, have four children.

Stambough book to be published

Stephen Stambough, assistant professor of political science, has co-written the book, "Initiative-Centered Politics: The New Politics of Direct Democracy," investigating aspects of direct democracy across multiple dimensions.

The book's focus is on presenting direct democracy research, extending the research to new policy issues and generalizing the research beyond the state-level initiatives to the local-level initiatives.
