

## Changes announced for bus routes

Some changes have been made in the NDSU shuttle bus route and "Gold Route 20," according to NDSU Police Chief Tim Lee.

The shuttle route will now operate on a 15-minute schedule that adds service along Albrecht Boulevard to 12th Avenue North and proceeds up Bolley Drive to the NDSU Research and Technology Park. Added stops include Morrill Hall and Minard Hall.

Gold Route 20 now will stop at Old Main, University Village, the high-rise residence halls and Reed-Johnson Halls before returning to the Memorial Union.

"The changes come at student requests," Lee said. "They specifically asked for some of these changes to improve service. We are trying to be responsive to their wishes."

## NSF awards REU grant to civil engineering faculty

Kalpana Katti, assistant professor in civil engineering and Dinesh Katti, associate professor in civil engineering were awarded a Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) grant from the National Science Foundation.

The one-year award of \$12,500 will support two undergraduate students in the civil engineering department who will participate in ongoing NSF-funded research on simulation-based materials design of biomimetic nanocomposites.

The project's objectives are to expose the students to frontier research in nanotechnology and to encourage their pursuit of graduate studies. Civil engineering senior Nancy Molick is one of the students named to participate.

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## Friendship doll restored

"Miss Okayama," a 74-year-old Japanese-American friendship doll housed for years in NDSU's apparel, textiles and interior design department, has been repaired by master doll makers in Japan. The Okayama Japanese American Cultural Exchange Society sponsored the doll's restoration.

On Aug. 30, Miss Okayama traveled from NDSU to Japan courtesy of United Airlines, and was featured on Japanese national television news broadcasts upon arrival at the Narita Airport.

Miss Okayama was taken to the 290-year-old Yoshitoku Co., Tokyo, where company president Tokubei Yamada is a highly-respected 11th generation doll maker. Repairs were completed in early December.

Plans call for the doll to be on display at four locations in the Okayama area, starting with the Temmaya Department Store, the largest in Japan.

A farewell ceremony is scheduled for April 7, with the governor of the Okayama prefecture expected to attend. The doll will return to NDSU at the end of April.

Miss Okayama came to this country in 1927 as one of 58 "doll ambassadors" sent by the Japanese government. The dolls came to the United States in appreciation for 12,700 dolls that had been sent to Japanese schools by American youth groups through a 1926 program organized by missionary Sidney Gulick. He considered dolls as a way for children to get acquainted with the customs and culture of another land.

Miss Okayama was first on display in Valley City, N.D., before going to the Masonic Lodge, Fargo. For several years the doll was housed at the Fargo office of the Red Cross. It has been on the NDSU campus since 1973.

The doll is made of a material called gofun, which is ground oyster shell and a binding agent. Over the years, it had degenerated into a fragile condition, with cracks in its head, arms and legs.

### Birmingham named a finalist for architecture and design award

Elizabeth Birmingham, assistant professor of English, has been named one of six finalists for the Milka Bliznakov Prize, an award given in recognition of research that advances women's contributions to architecture and related design fields.

Birmingham advanced to the finals for her project, "Searching for Marion Mahony: Gender Erasure and the Discourse of Architectural Studies."

Finalists have been invited to continue their research in order to be eligible for the \$1,000 cash prize. The six finalists were announced Dec. 1 and the prize is expected to be awarded in December of this year.

## Richardson named agronomy fellow



Jimmie Richardson, professor and acting chair of soil science, was named Fellow of the American Society of Agronomy during the annual meetings of the American Society of Agronomy/Crop Science of America/Soil Science Society of America held in October in Charlotte, N.C.

### Richardson

The award recognizes superior achievement in research, education or work in public service and meritorious service to one or more societies. Candidates for fellowship are nominated by society members, and final selection is made by each society's executive committee.

Richardson is recognized internationally for his contributions to soil hydrology, hydric soils and wetlands. He is the principal soil scientist representing the Soil Science Society of America in the Society of Wetlands Scientists.

Richardson teamed with biologists to develop the HGM system for wetland functional analysis, a procedure mandated by Congress to assist in evaluating jurisdictional wetlands. He has served on the National Technical Committee for Hydric Soils providing technical guidance and procedures for field recognition of hydric soils. He also works with wetland scientists in the U.S. Geological Survey, Fish and Wildlife Service, Corps of Engineers and the Environmental Protection Agency. He is co-editor of the book "Wetland Soils."

## Larew designs ball decorations

Don Larew, professor of theatre arts, designed the room decorations for the Fargo-Moorhead Symphony Guild's 45th annual Symphony Ball and Silent Auction held Dec. 1 at the Fargo Holiday Inn.

Speaking on civil and human rights issues, the presenters will include individuals and groups from the NDSU campus and the community who work to promote a spirit of diversity. "Kundun," scheduled for 7 p.m. in the Century Theater, chronicles the life of the 14th dalai lama, from childhood through the Chinese occupation and his journey into exile. The epic film charts the dalai lama's growth into a figure who raises the world's consciousness about the Buddhist society of the spirit, the plight of Tibet and the sufferings endured by the Tibetan people.

## Summer seminar for teachers planned

A seminar for K-12 teachers from across the country is scheduled for July 1- Aug. 2, at NDSU. The seminar is funded by a grant of approximately \$85,000 from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

"The Great Plains from Texas to Saskatchewan: Place, Memory, Identity" will give teachers the opportunity for study and professional development. Participants, selected from a nationwide competition, will spend five weeks studying great texts of regional literature and traveling to cultural sites on the northern plains.

Each participating teacher will receive an NEH stipend of \$3,250 to defray expenses.

Tom Isern, professor of history, is seminar director. A specialist in regional history and folklore, Isern is the author or co-author of six books about life on the plains and writes a syndicated newspaper column, "Plains Folk." He also is the recipient of NDSU's Peltier Award for Innovative Teaching and has represented NDSU as a Chamber of Commerce Distinguished Professor.

NDSU is home to the Institute for Regional Studies, a major resource for research on regional life and the oldest regional studies center in the Great Plains.
