

Gov. Hoeven tours campus facilities

North Dakota Gov. John Hoeven visited several NDSU programs Feb. 6 as part of his statewide Excellence in Education tour. NDSU was the ninth stop on the tour.

After meeting with President Joseph A. Chapman, Hoeven toured the Main Library, to see how the building has recovered from the June 2000 flash flood. He then visited Minard

Hall to hear about the new communication doctoral program, stopped at Van Es Hall to be informed about the Food Safety Program and was briefed about the Concept Pharmacy at Sudro Hall. Those stops were followed by a visit to the Phoenix International and Research I buildings at the NDSU Research and Technology Park.

He also had lunch with university administrators and student leadership at the Memorial Union.

"I came in with high expectations, and I am pleased to say that they have been exceeded. I'm truly excited about what is going on," Hoeven said as he completed the tour. "Beyond that, there is an attitude, an enthusiasm, that is pervading this campus that is going to not only propel NDSU forward, but the community and the state."

Hoeven said the types of research that are anticipated at the technology park, along with such areas as food security, communication and pharmacy outreach are important to the state. "Those are the things that are going to fundamentally change North Dakota and move us forward," he said.

During his visits around the state, he said he has found that North Dakota is doing "a high quality job in education across the board—K-12 and higher education." He added that each school and community has different strengths.

"How are we going to drive change? How are we going to be on the leading edge? How are we going to do things differently in this new global economy?" Hoeven asked. "The research university is at the heart of that. It's happening here at NDSU, we need to support this effort and we need to continue forward."

Hoeven visited Fargo and West Fargo public schools the day before he came to campus.

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) has introduced its "Building EPSCoR State-National Laboratory Partnerships" program, developed to support collaborative energy-related science and engineering research between DOE laboratory scientists and university faculty members in EPSCoR states.

Applicants should submit an abstract and budget to the EPSCoR office by April 10. Each application requires an endorsement from the EPSCoR office and institutional approval prior to submitting their grant request to the DOE.

Early Entry Program seeks participants

Area high school juniors are encouraged to get a head start on their college careers by becoming involved in the Early Entry Program at NDSU.

Fargo-Moorhead area high school students may take up to seven college credits per semester at NDSU, which can later be applied to a college major. The Early Entry Program is a way for high school seniors to experience college course work and class settings, and, in some cases, continue in particular subject areas that exceed high school offerings. Students also may take advantage of the Dual Credit Program in order to receive both high school and college credit for courses taken at NDSU.

Students who have completed their junior year of high school and have earned a cumulative grade point average of 3.5 or greater are considered ideal for the program. However, any interested student may apply and will be considered on an individual basis. Students in the Early Entry Program pay part-time student tuition and fees.

Exempt W-4's and NDW-R forms due

Employees eligible to claim exemption from federal income tax withholding for the 2002 tax year must submit a new W-4 form to payroll by Feb. 15. Employees should exercise caution when claiming exempt on form W-4.

NDW-R forms for Minnesota residents recently were mailed to eligible employees. Minnesota residents must complete a new NDW-R form each year to continue to have Minnesota state income tax withheld from their paychecks. Failure to submit a new NDW-R form will result in North Dakota income tax being withheld. The completed NDW-R form is due to the payroll office by March 1.

Mitra, Rasmussen receive NSF CAREER awards

Joydeep Mitra, assistant professor of electrical and computer engineering, and Seth Rasmussen, assistant professor of chemistry, recently received CAREER awards from the National Science Foundation.

Mitra received \$375,000 in support of the project "CAREER: Enhancement of Power and Energy System Technology Through Research and Education." The proposed career plan will rebuild the electric power and energy systems program at NDSU through research and education efforts. The program will fully or partially support four undergraduate and seven graduate students who will research state-of-the-art reliability and cost assessment techniques, with a focus on distributed energy resources and microgrid architectures.

Rasmussen received a five-year, \$495,000 grant for the project "CAREER: Metallated Polythieno [3,4-b] pyrazines as Ordered Hybrid Materials." The research will involve undergraduate and graduate students in the design and synthesis of metal-funltionalized organic polymers for electronic and optical applications.

Katti helps design processors for Intel

Rajendra Katti, associate professor of computer and electrical engineering, spent the 2000-01 academic year working with the Intel Architecture Group, Portland, Ore.

The group of 4,000 engineers is responsible for designing all of the Intel Corp. 32-bit computer processors, including Pentium and Xeon.

Katti worked with the cache design group and with testing of the Pentium IV processor. He received an award for his contributions toward the development of Pentium IV production test suites.

He also worked with the group responsible for designing the processor's circuits to improve ease in testing, and on the design of Intel's next generation processor.

"I want to thank the electrical and computer engineering department and NDSU for giving me the opportunity to work at Intel," Katti said. "It was a great experience that will enhance my work here at NDSU in both teaching and research."

Visual arts student receives scholarship to study in Italy

Sophomore Ashleigh Buck recently received a \$3,500 scholarship to participate in the Montserrat College of Art's Summer Residential Program in Viterbo, Italy.

Students spend the month of July living in Viterbo. They have the opportunity to earn up to six credits in courses including art history, figure drawing and painting, landscape painting, landscape photography and journal writing.

Buck was chosen from a pool of visual art students who submitted application proposals stating the importance of the residency to their artistic careers.

She is the daughter of Sheldon and Maggie Buck, West Fargo.

The award was made possible through donations from visual arts alumnus James Falck; the College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences; and Montserrat College of Art.

Bromley receives grant from the North Dakota Council on the Arts

Kimble Bromley, associate professor of art, recently received a \$400 professional development grant from the North Dakota Council on the Arts.

The program is designed to benefit artists by providing financial assistance for information and educational opportunities relating to the arts and arts development. It assists arts organizations with staff, board and volunteer training opportunities, and in hiring consultants and technical or artistic directors.

Bromley will use the grant to help pay for travel to the "Creativity and Madness" conference in Santa Fe, N.M.

The NDCA is the state agency responsible for the support and development of the arts and artists throughout North Dakota. The council receives funding from the National Endowment for the Arts, the State of North Dakota and interest income from the North Dakota Cultural Endowment Fund.

Nursing student wins state award

Senior nursing student LaChelle Lynn has received the prestigious "State Leadership Award" from the Nursing Students' Association of North Dakota. The honor recognizes a senior nursing student with outstanding leadership qualities in the areas of community service, nursing organization participation, service as a strong role model and promotion of the nursing profession.

According to Rebecca Torgerson, assistant professor of nursing, Lynn is a "Valor" student with the Fargo Veterans Administration Medical Center, and has volunteered to work with the homeless community and assisted with several food drives at her church. As a collaborative interagency effort, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), and the National Science Foundation (NSF) announce the availability of grant funds and request applications for the Microbial Genome Sequencing Project (MGSP) for fiscal year (FY) 2002. The amount available for support of this program in fiscal 2002 is approximately \$9 million. The purpose of this interagency program announcement is to solicit applications to conduct high-throughput sequencing of genomes of microbes that are of fundamental biological interest, as well as those that are important to the productivity and sustainability of agriculture and forestry, and to the safety and quality of the nation's food supply. Grant-in-Aid Program accepting applications

The purpose of the annual program is to assist faculty in obtaining external funding by providing financial support for the collection of preliminary data that would strengthen a major proposal to an extramural funding agency.

The program offers two available categories. New Investigator Awards are designed for faculty who have not previously obtained external funding for research exceeding \$10,000, either as PI or co-PI, from any source outside of the university, regardless of length of time of his/her appointment. Inter-disciplinary Awards are designed to encourage new collaborative research activity between faculty from different disciplines who may be from the same or different departments and who have not previously collaborated.

Application deadline is 5 p.m. Monday, March 4. Proposals can request up to a maximum amount of \$8,000. Proposals are evaluated through a competitive peer review process, and awards will be decided and funding available by approximately May 15. Proposals must be clearly research-oriented, and proposed student involvement in the research project is strongly encouraged. Awards are for one-year projects.
