

Ruley to be inducted into Women's Basketball Hall of Fame

The Women's Basketball Hall of Fame announced Amy Ruley, women's head basketball coach, has been selected for induction during ceremonies scheduled for June 11-12 in Knoxville, Tenn. The announcement came Nov. 16 in conjunction with the State Farm Women's Tip-Off Classic, which was telecast on ESPN2.

The hall's sixth group of inductees will include Ruley; Sylvia Hatchell, University of North Carolina women's basketball coach; eight-time AAU All-American Lurlyne Greer Rogers; former Canadian Olympic team player and coach Bev Smith; William L. Wall, the first executive director of USA Basketball; and Marian E. Washington, University of Kansas women's basketball coach.

"This is another distinguished class of inductees into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame," said Jody Conradt, University of Texas women's basketball coach and president of the Hall of Fame's board of directors. "This is a great mix of people who have been so integral to the growth of women's basketball at all levels—in the AAU ranks, in Division I and Division II basketball, and in USA Basketball and international competition."

Voting for the honor is based such factors as moral character, integrity, sportsmanship, record of performance, ability, national or international recognition and contributions to the game of women's basketball.

"I am honored to be included in the 2004 Hall of Fame induction class. I believe it is a testament to the quality of the student-athletes I have had the privilege of coaching and the outstanding commitment by the administration at NDSU and the Fargo community," said Ruley. "I especially thank our assistant coach Kelli Layman and our director of athletics Lynn Dorn who have been a part of all of our major accomplishments. Although I am the fortunate one to receive the recognition, it is truly to be shared by many."

Ruley begins her 25th season with NDSU with a 581-151 record. She has led the Bison to five NCAA Division II national championships, 19 national playoff appearances and nine North Central Conference titles. The first recipient of the C. Vivian Stringer Women's Coaching Award from the United States Sports Academy, Ruley also was named the Division II Coach of the Year by the American Women's Sports Federation in 1986 and 1991 and by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association in 1993.

With the addition of the 2004 inductees, the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame will include 79 members.

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which includes chair David Wahlberg, director of University News; Lynn Dorn, women's athletic director; Karen Froelich, associate professor of management, marketing and finance; Kate Haugen, dean for enrollment management; Kevin Thompson, professor of political science; and Steven Venette, interim director of the Group Decision Statement. Input was provided by the SSSC, two campuswide open forums, the Student Senate, the Staff Senate Executive Committee and the University Senate Executive Committee.

"The current trend is for short mission statements that can be easily quoted or paraphrased. Additional detail is provided in supporting statements of goals and core values," Wahlberg said. "When NDSU has its site visit in February 2006, the consultant-evaluators are likely to talk with people at random, and while they won't expect the memorization of the mission statement, they will look for familiarity with it."

According to Wahlberg, the focus group also has made a presentation to Student Senate, and the request is awaiting action. After receiving on-campus approval, it will be forwarded to the State Board of Higher Education for its consideration. If approved, the mission statement will be used as part of the basic framework for the developing a self-study document that will be the basis for NDSU's request for re-accreditation.

The University Senate approval came during its Nov. 10 meeting, while the Staff Senate voted to endorse the statement on Nov. 12.

American Express corporate travel cards to be discontinued

The American Express corporate travel card program is being phased out by North Dakota state agencies and institutions of higher education, including NDSU. The program will be discontinued at NDSU on Dec. 31.

According to Tom Akers, director of purchasing, there are 523 American Express travel cards issued to NDSU employees. He said those cards will not be in effect after the end of the year. Akers said an option for NDSU employees is to apply for a U.S. Bank Visa Classic card.

Under the American Express program, state employees needed to have \$3 million in annual purchases, but they currently were making about \$1.1 million in purchases. That prompted the company to start charging a \$35 annual fee on each card.

Akers said U.S. Bank offers a similar program and will waive the annual \$20 fee if the card is used to make at least one purchase during the year. He noted that the card is the state employee's own personal credit card and the employee is responsible for all charges made on their card.

New cookbook for Germans from Russia published

The NDSU Libraries has announced the publication of "Cookbook for Germans from Russia." With recipes dating back 200 years, the book also contains humorous and heart wrenching anecdotes from German-Russian history.

The Libraries extend appreciation to Nelly Daes and the Landsmannschaft der Deutschen aus Russland for permission to translate and publish the work. The cookbook was translated from German to English by Alex Herzog, with editing by Janice Huber Stangl.

Herzog was born in 1938 in Lichtenfeld, Ukraine, to German descendants of farmer immigrants from Germany. His family came to the United States in 1953. After a career with IBM, he is now a freelance translator and lives in Boulder, Colo. He has provided volunteer translation work for the Germans from Russia Heritage Collection, including many articles, brochures and pamphlets published on the GRHC Web site.

Huber Stangl is a Germans from Russia descendant, who wrote the book, "Marienberg: Fate of a Village" and is a member of the board of directors of Germans from Russia Heritage Society.
