NDSU Downtown project can be viewed on Web

The progress of the NDSU Downtown project can now be viewed on the Internet. Visitors can watch the renovation of the former Northern School Supply building via a live camera at http://facilities-mgmt.ndsu.nodak.edu/maint const/.

The camera, which provides an exterior view of the building, is located on the southwest corner of the roof of the nearby Fargo Fire Department facility.

The site also will feature drawings, floor plans and a fact sheet about the project.

"The Web camera was used for the first time with the Minard Hall addition, and it was highly successful. We were averaging over 400 hits per week in regards to that project," said Bruce Frantz, director of Facilities Management. "Now, with the downtown Fargo project, there will be a broader audience interested in what is going on. We thought the downtown location was the best next use of a camera."

Frantz also expressed his appreciation to the City of Fargo and the Fargo Fire Department for allowing the camera's placement.

NDSU Downtown will be an interdisciplinary, shared facility that will house the entire visual arts department, major components of the architecture and landscape architecture department and the Tri-College University office. It will include studios, classrooms, a wood shop, computer laboratory, gallery and an outdoor sculpture area. The \$11 million project is expected to be completed in mid-July 2004.

The building was gifted to the university by alumnus Doug Burgum, BS '78, honorary doctorate '00, in collaboration with the NDSU Development Foundation and the City of Fargo. Funding also comes from a historic preservation grant and a Renaissance Zone tax credit.

University Senate approves 'dead week'

The University Senate has given its endorsement to trying a so-called "dead week," which is intended to limit exams during the week before finals week.

Previously approved by the Student Senate, the idea was presented by student body president Dan Mostad to the University Senate on Dec. 8. He called the resolution "a strong suggestion to faculty," and asked that it be implemented on a trial basis.

The University Senate agreed on a 53-to-6 vote, with three abstentions. The motion asked that a dead week experiment be implemented during the upcoming spring and fall semesters. It also said that a decision should be made during the 2005 spring semester on the final status of the proposal.

According to the resolution, a dead week is intended to reduce stress for students. It also asks that only one exam or quiz be given, per course, during the last two weeks of the semester, including finals week.

Exceptions include summer classes, self-paced or correspondence course, make-up exams, courses in which a laboratory is incorporated with a lecture, one-credit courses, quizzes that account for less than 5 percent of the student's overall grade and block-taught courses.

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NDSU to offer equine studies night class

NDSU plans to offer an introduction to equine studies evening class spring semester, according to Clare Purdy, equine studies lecturer. The course is scheduled for 6-7:50 p.m. Tuesdays and can be taken for college credit or non-credit through continuing education.

"The course is an overview of the equine industry," Purdy said. "Students will learn about the different breeds, management practices, health management, anatomy and the horse business. I anticipate that we will continue to add these kinds of courses as community interest in our program grows."

NDSU's equine program is now in its third year and offers a major and minor in equine studies. A certificate program designed for the non-traditional student or others pursuing an active interest in horsemanship also is available.

The program is designed to provide students with in-depth knowledge of horses as recreational and commercial livestock, provide practical experience that allows them to develop proficiency in horsemanship and animal care, and give students a broad understanding of the horse industry as business, recreational and production entities.

Construction of a 600-foot by134-foot horse barn adjacent to the North Dakota Horse Park was completed last summer, and students began classes in the barn in mid-September. The barn has the capacity to house up to 400 horses. There currently is a small arena at the site, and there are long-range plans for a large indoor arena.

The program also is linked to the Dickinson Research Extension Center. "Our program is part of our continuing effort to provide assistance to people in the many different phases of agriculture," said Kris Ringwall, director of the Dickinson center. "There is a growing number of horse enthusiasts in the region, and we want to address their needs."

Neis, BS '65, MS '73, was a radio color commentator for NDSU football broadcasts from 1979-85. He also was the head coach at Fargo South High School for eight seasons. He later worked for Northern Improvement Co., Fargo, and the Greater North Dakota Association.

Soccer team receives academic award

The NDSU women's soccer team has received a College Team Academic Award from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA). NDSU received the award for the sixth time in seven years.

With a 3.17 grade point average, the team was one of 37 Division II women's programs and 336 schools overall to receive an NSCAA College Division Team Academic Award. To be selected by the NSCAA, a team must have a minimum 3.0 grade-point average on a 4.0 scale.

Research Opportunities

Community of Science (COS) is a Web-based service that helps NDSU employees and students find funding opportunities for different scholarly activities or find particular faculty expertise at NDSU or elsewhere. COS is available not only for the sciences, but for all disciplines. COS is available on the Web from any NDSU desktop computer, or by using a username and password when accessing from off-campus.

Information from experts can be searched at http://expertise.cos.com, and funding opportunities can be searched at http://fundingopps.cos.com.

Key words must be used in one or more fields when conducting a search via the COS Web site. Some search tips include:

- Search words are not case-sensitive.
- The Boolean operators 'and,' 'or' and 'not' apply to COS searches and allow users to combine words or terms in the search.
- Use of the word 'and' between two search words will find records containing both words. For example 'wind and energy.' Searches using two words in a field without typing 'and' will be treated as though there is an 'and' between the words.
- Use of the word 'or' between two search words will find records containing either one of the words. For example, 'wind or energy.' The search will produce more results than would a search using 'and' between the search words.
- To search for an exact phrase, quotation marks must be used around the phrase. For example "wind energy."
- * The symbol * is a "wild card" and can be used to search for words with various endings. For example, a search using 'TECHNOLOG*' will find records containing 'TECHNOLOGY,' 'TECHNOLOGIES,' 'TECHNOLOGIST' and any other word endings for 'TECHNOLOG' that might be found in the database.
