In Excellence in Fundraising Materials, NDSU received a silver for fundraising videos or DVDs.

NDSU also received a gold for special events organized around special occasions in the Excellence in Fundraising Special Events category.

"The judges of the CASE District VI contest recognized the quality of the work produced by NDSU," said Jim Miller, NDSU Development Foundation executive director and the CASE district representative on the national board of directors. "The organization serves development officers, alumni organizations and campus communicators, and we did well in all areas."

Sellnow named journal editor

Deanna Sellnow, professor of communication, has been selected to serve as editor of Communication Teacher, a publication of the National Communication Association. The journal, which is published quarterly, focuses on innovative pedagogical practices and systematic assessment research of such practices in communication classrooms.

Sellnow said she is honored by the opportunity to serve the profession in ways that contribute directly to the improvement of teaching and learning in the field.

Sellnow's tenure as editor will run from 2008-10, and she will begin accepting manuscripts Feb. 1.

Jauhar honored in India

Prem P. Jauhar, research geneticist with the USDA–Agricultural Research Service, Cereal Crops Research Unit, Northern Crop Sciences lab and adjunct professor in plant sciences, was recently honored by T.V. Rajeswar, governor of the Indian state of Uttar Pradesh and chancellor of Chandra Shekhar Azad University, Kanpur, India.

On Nov. 27, Jauhar received the Robe of Honour and the University Momento for his outstanding research contributions. He also was named an Honorary Fellow of the Indian Society of Biotechnology.

"I have previously received several international awards, but it was indeed a pleasure to be recognized in India, my motherland," Jauhar said. "I felt most honored to be recognized by Gov. Rajeswar."

During his visit, he gave a plenary lecture on "Biotechnology as an Important Tool for Incorporating Value-Added Traits in Cereal Crops," at the International Conference on Biotechnology. He also served on the conference's international advisory committee.

Jauhar traveled to India in November, and also gave lectures at several universities, including Delhi University, Delhi; Indian Agricultural Research Institute, New Delhi; Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi; National Botanical Research Institute, Lucknow; Punjab University, Chandigarh; Rajasthan University, Jaipur; and Jai Narayan Vyas University, Jodhpur.

Jauhar's research embraces diverse areas of classical cytogenetics and biotechnology, and their relevance to plant breeding. He discovered the genetic control of chromosome pairing in polyploid species. Jauhar's current research focuses on wheat germplasm enhancement using both classical cytogenetic and modern biotechnological tools. His lab produced the world's first transgenic durum wheat in 1995 and standardized the procedure for genetic transformation.

Jauhar is an associate editor for the Journal of Heredity, an international journal of genetics. He is a Fellow of the Crop Science Society of America, the American Society of Agronomy and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Harvey receives Charles A.Weyerhauser book award

Mark Harvey, professor of history, received the Charles A. Weyerhauser Award for his book, "Wilderness Forever: Howard Zahniser and the Path to the Wilderness Act."

The Forest History Society in Durham, N.C., gives the award annually for the best book in forest and conservation history. The author must exhibit fresh insight into a topic and must provide a narrative analysis that is clear, inventive and thought provoking.

"I am delighted to be the recipient of the Weyerhauser award," Harvey said. "It is one of the top book awards in the field of environmental history."

The University of Washington Press published "Wilderness Forever" in 2005. Harvey's biography tells of Zahniser's efforts to defend threatened wilderness areas by lobbying for federal legislation to protect primitive areas in national forests.

The Forest History Society prefers to keep judges for the award confidential. One unidentified judge wrote: "Harvey does an excellent job of bringing Zahniser's life into perspective and reconstructing the pivotal role he played in the early formation of the Wilderness Society, and most importantly, the passage of this landmark legislation."

"Having served as a judge for this award in past years, I know that the competition is stiff," Harvey said. "Being honored with the award this year is something I will always cherish.

Agricultural Technology Expo planned

The 59th annual Agriculture Technology Expo is scheduled for 9 a.m.-4 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 10, in the Agriculture and Biosystems Engineering building.

"Fueling the Future" is the theme for the one-day event allowing students to display new technology in agriculture and engineering. It also is an opportunity for the public to attend and gain an understanding of agriculture and its technology. A student team, assisted by faculty advisers, is responsible for putting the show together.

More than \$1,000 in scholarships will be awarded to the top project winners in the divisions of power; machinery; structures; electrical power and processing; soil; water and environment; and precision agriculture.

Presentations will include alternative fuels and improvement of fuel efficiency, a quarter-scale tractor, hydro mulching, compaction, advantages of no-till, laser leveling and auto steer, seed priming, residue tillage, recommended storage and usage of biodiesel, floor trusses, types of grain elevators and implements.

The show is free and open to the public.

Radiation safety course scheduled

Gary Stolzenberg, radiation safety officer, is scheduled to present a course titled "Laboratory Use of Radioactive Material," from noon-5 p.m. Monday, Feb. 5, in the Family Life Center 319.

The course is designed for users of radioactive materials in a laboratory or in a field application. Successful completion of the course is required in order to use radioactive materials on campus. Stolzenberg will cover the basic theory of radioactivity, biological interactions with radiation, radiation protection, minimizing exposure levels of radiation, rules and regulations of radiation, safe handling of radiation, decontamination and lab procedures.

Registration is required. The course fee is \$25 for NDSU and cooperative agreement institutions and \$50 for all other participants.

Registered students must attend the full session. Students should bring a scientific calculator. People in the class will not pass unless the entire class is completed and they receive a passing quiz score.
