

Hoeven signs NDSU ag budget, renewable fuels bills



Gov. John Hoeven came to the NDSU campus April 27 to sign legislation that calls for a 34 percent budget increase for NDSU Agriculture and enacts a comprehensive \$42 million renewable energy plan for the state.

In the signing ceremony at the NDSU Pilot Plant, Hoeven signed the general appropriation bill for the Experiment Station, the Extension Service, Northern Crops Institute and the Upper Great Plains Transportation Institute. It includes \$7 million in new funding toward a research greenhouse complex and \$700,000 in biomass research and education. According to Hoeven's office, NDSU's total agriculture budget is \$186 million.

"Agriculture is our No. 1 industry, and renewable energy and value-added food and fiber offer unprecedented opportunities for our producers," Hoeven said to the gathering attended by NDSU officials, area legislators, media and members of the public. "The incentives we worked to pass this session will help us develop new and better products for larger and broader markets than ever before."

"This is really an incredible day not only for NDSU, but for the university system and the whole state," said President Joseph A. Chapman, noting that NDSU is ranked 24th in the nation in overall agriculture research out of the top 600 institutions. "This is going to have a huge impact nationally and locally. As an institution we have made the decision that we cannot be a great land-grant university without great agriculture, and many of these programs have a direct bearing on our ability to maintain our leadership in that critical field for the state of North Dakota."

D.C. Coston, vice president for agriculture and university extension, said, "The bill allows us to grow our capability and the number of program areas as well as launch new programs, and also to improve the infrastructure so that we can do what we do even better."

The renewable energy bills do a number of things, including creating an energy independence council; a \$5 million Biofuels PACE Fund; \$3 million renewable energy grant fund; Biomass Demonstration Project; tax credits for the installation of geothermal, solar and wind energy devices; and property tax deduction for wind generation units.

Higher education fares well with legislature

NDSU officials are pleased with the final budget bill approved during the 2007 legislative session. The final compromise package called for NDSU's biennial operating budget to be \$99,027,336.

The final figures for the university system represent a 0.25 percent across-the-board reduction from Gov. John Hoeven's executive budget. For NDSU, that puts the operating budget at \$224,545 below what the governor requested.

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"NDSU had a very successful session, and the entire system budget was well presented," said Keith Bjerke, vice president for University Relations. "Everyone would have been appreciative of even more money, but the fact that there was a significant increase in our budgets across the system for the first time in at least this decade, our appreciation is sincere."

Bjerke said the legislature's action endorses the system's efforts for economic development for North Dakota "The legislative support validates that they understand and appreciate that," he said.

Bjerke also explained that through a new State Board of Higher Education-approved funding formula, NDSU made "tremendous progress" in the equity distribution model.

At NDSU, the Minard Hall renovation project was funded with a 10 percent local match, meaning the legislature appropriated \$4.5 million, with an additional \$500,000 to be raised locally.

In addition, the legislature approved salary increases of 5 percent each year of the biennium for faculty and staff. In response, the system will hold tuition increases to 5 percent for the next two years.

"We have a very positive budget with great numbers," Bjerke said.

ITS computers for sale

Information Technology Services (ITS) has a number of personal computers and Macintosh computers available for campus departments to purchase to replace older computers assigned to faculty and staff.

The computer sale is part of a larger computer life-cycle initiative. The initiative also includes preferred computer configurations and disposal management. A preferred computer configuration with special pricing from the Varsity Mart is listed at www.ndsu.edu/its/professional_services/desktop_support/hardware/its_hardware_standards/.

The primary objective of the sale is to reduce support costs by replacing old departmental computers and operating systems. The ongoing refurbishing and disposal program is conducted by ITS in conjunction with the Purchasing Department's surplus property process. This program promotes reuse while providing effective removal of institutional information from surplus computers.

To request a used ITS computer for an older computer trade-in, determine which computer will be traded to ITS. For a computer to be eligible to use as a trade-in, it must be in use by an employee in the department and it must be connected to the NDSU network. After determining which computer will be traded, complete the request form by the end of the business day on May 16. Departments offering old computer trade-ins will be given preference. If there is no computer system to trade in, there still may be systems available.

Computers are no longer under manufacturer's warranty unless otherwise noted. ITS will test the computers to determine that they are in good working condition. Some computers may not be available until the end of July. Individuals cannot purchase the computers; they must remain part of NDSU's inventory. Billing will not be initiated until after July 1.
