

## Rules, procedures outlined for student e-mail lists

The NDSU Student Senate has approved permanent guidelines for the student ANNOUNCEment e-mail listserv. Complete rules and procedures for the listserv can be found at [www.ndsu.edu/bisonweb/tech/announcerrules.php](http://www.ndsu.edu/bisonweb/tech/announcerrules.php).

Under the new guidelines, most campus departments are permitted to send one message per week to the ANNOUNCEment listserv. Messages for the ANNOUNCEment list may be submitted to [techcomm@ndsubisonweb.com](mailto:techcomm@ndsubisonweb.com).

In addition, NDSU has an "official" student e-mail list moderated by the registrar and the University News director. The listserv is reserved for official notices that broadly impact academic progress, status or well-being of students, such as messages from university administration, announcements regarding weather-related closings, health alerts, general safety messages or access matters. The official listserv may be accessed at [NDSU-student-official@listserv.nodak.edu](mailto:NDSU-student-official@listserv.nodak.edu).

Faculty members also may establish their own e-mail lists for classes or advisees, as may organizations that rely on e-mail to communicate with members.

## Nominations sought for Cooke Foundation scholarships

The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation has invited NDSU to nominate two students for its Graduate Scholarship Program.

NDSU college deans have been asked to establish college committees to solicit and choose candidates for consideration. A campus committee will then review those applications, starting March 6.

Committee members include Paul Homan, chair of modern languages; R.S. Krishnan, associate vice president for academic affairs; Jim Venette, associate dean of agriculture, food sciences and natural resources; and Donald Schwert, dean of science and mathematics.

The deadline to forward NDSU nominations to the foundation is May 1. The foundation will provide up to 65 scholarships this year, with a maximum \$50,000 award available per student.

The foundation was established in 2000 by the estate of Jack Kent Cooke to help young people of exceptional promise to reach their potential through education. It began awarding graduate scholarships in 2001. The foundation has received about 1,000 applications each year, and has awarded 209 scholarships totaling \$29.9 million.

## Policy Updates

The following policies have recently been added or revised. To see the complete policy, go to [www.ndsu.nodak.edu/policy](http://www.ndsu.nodak.edu/policy).

### Policy 129—Salary Administration Policy

Removes the salary ranges in Section Six. Reflects the new titles of the Human Resources/Payroll office, and the Office for Equity and Diversity.

### Policy 212—Overtime

Reflects the new title of the Human Resources/Payroll office. Adds better explanation in Section Four regarding compensation when an employee is called back to work after regular hours, with guaranteed minimum pay stipulated whether they are actually called back on site or if they can provide the required services via telephone.

### Policy 241—Position Classification

Reflects the new title of the Human Resources/Payroll office. Deletes reference to establishing pay ranges for all staff in Section One, updates the NDSU forms Web site and reflects the new title of the Human Resources Council (HRC).

### Policy 350.1—Board Regulation on Academic Freedom and Tenure; Academic Appointments

Changes indicate that new appointments will be given “information” rather than “a faculty handbook” on faculty evaluation process and tenure/promotion expectations in Section Six. Most of the information given to new faculty is online.

### Policy 515—Travel-Employees

Changes the in-state and out-of-state mileage allowances and meal rates. Gives procedures for reimbursement when a room rate is over the new \$45 in-state lodging rate. Canada, Alaska and Hawaii are now considered “Non-Continental United States and Overseas Non-Foreign Areas,” with Guam also included in the group. The change identifies new rates for meal allowances in these areas.

### Policy 718—Public/Open Records

Institutions should adopt a public/open records policy per 34 CFR Section 99.7. Clarifies which campus police records are open and can be disclosed, and which are confidential and are exempt from the open records law. Clarifies how responses to open records requests should be routed, and that such requests should be given high priority.

## Development Foundation accepting grant applications

The NDSU Development Foundation Grants and Awards Committee is accepting applications from faculty and staff for grants from four funds for the 2006-07 academic year. The application deadline is Friday, Jan. 20.

The Centennial Endowment Fund can provide maximum awards of \$5,000, with a total of \$15,560 available. It supports professorships, scholarships, biotechnology, faculty development, libraries and cultural arts.

The NDSU Development Foundation Board of Trustees Endowment can provide maximum awards of \$1,000, with a total of \$3,000 available. It supports general programs across campus.

The NDSU Development Foundation Libraries Endowment has \$2,238 available. It supports requests from any academic unit on campus for materials that will enhance the collections or operations of university libraries.

The NDSU Development Foundation Gordon A. Larson Agricultural Research Fund has \$9,715 available. The fund has no maximum award amount and supports competitive grants for agricultural research efforts conducted at NDSU.

## People

### NCI crop quality specialist named

Mehmet Tulbek began his duties as crop quality specialist at Northern Crops Institute on Jan. 3.

He will provide technical assistance to processors and end-users of non-cereal crops, such as soybeans, corn, lentils, dry peas, flax, chickpeas and dry edible beans. He also will conduct educational programs that identify market opportunities to promote the sales of non-cereal crops.

“Mehmet comes to us with excellent experience that enables him to provide technical assistance and promotion of non-cereal crops,” says Pat Berglund, NCI director.

The new position developed in response to the increasing diversity of crops produced in the four-state region. Tulbek's research includes evaluation of North Dakota chickpea quality, and the characterization of fermented chickpea for dough and bread. He has evaluated physical, chemical, microbiological and sensory properties of roasted flaxseed, and the use of flaxseed oil in yogurt making. His additional research has been in the evaluation of roasted durum wheat quality and field pea roasting applications for dairy calf breeding.

Tulbek is expected to complete requirements for his doctoral degree in cereal science at NDSU this spring. He has a bachelor's degree from the University of Ankara, Turkey, and a master's degree in food engineering from the Istanbul Technical University. He is a member of the American Association of Cereal Chemists and the Institute of Food Technologists.

### Miller chosen national college store trustee

Carol Miller, Varsity Mart bookstore director, has been elected trustee for the Plains states executive board by the National Association of College Stores (NACS). NACS trustees are responsible for the association's leadership, direction and governance. Miller will be inducted to the three-year position at a ceremony set for February in Houston.

Miller has been at NDSU since 1999. She previously was assistant director at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee bookstore. Miller has been the chair of the NACS general book committee and has been an education instructor for the NACS College Retailing series.

## Alumnus soldier killed in Iraq

Alumnus Stuart Anderson was killed Jan. 7, while serving in Iraq. A major in the Iowa National Guard, Anderson died while aboard a Black Hawk helicopter that crashed and killed 12 people. He was on his second tour in Iraq.

Anderson, of Dubuque, Iowa, was a 1985 graduate in agriculture education. According to Alumni Association records, he participated in Student Government, Little Country Theatre and Alpha Gamma Rho while on campus.

A native of Hoffman, Minn., Anderson is survived by his wife, Tori, and daughters Keely and Kirsten.

## Patnode invited to saxophone conference

Matthew Patnode, associate professor of music, has been invited to perform at the North American Saxophone Alliance National Conference scheduled for Feb. 15-19 at the University of Iowa, Iowa City.

The NDSU Saxophone Quartet, under Patnode's direction, also is scheduled to perform at the conference. In addition, they will perform as part of a master class presentation.

The North American Saxophone Alliance is an organization where members share a common enthusiasm for the saxophone, and include professional performers, university professors, public school teachers and students.

Patnode also is scheduled to present "The Jazz Ensemble Saxophone Section: Creative Teaching Techniques to Send Them Off Swinging," a clinic designed for high school jazz educators, at the Minnesota Music Educators' Association conference set for Feb. 18 in Minneapolis.

Planned topics include rehearsal techniques, jazz articulation and forming a high school saxophone jazz group. As part of the clinic, the NDSU ensemble Saxology will demonstrate the saxophone section's role in the modern jazz ensemble.

Patnode is the president of the North Dakota chapter of the International Association of Jazz Education.

## Ambrosio article published

"The Third Side? The Multipolar Strategic Triangle and the Sino-Indian Rapprochement," an article by Thomas Ambrosio, assistant professor of criminal justice and political science, recently was published in *Comparative Strategy*.

The article examines attempts by Russia to align itself with India and China into a "strategic triangle," with the goal of balancing American power and influence in the international system. According to Ambrosio, previous attempts at such a policy were stymied by poor relations between New Delhi, India, and Beijing. The article asserts that without closer ties between these two powers, the "third side" of the strategic triangle would be impossible, but that the recent rapprochement between India and China and resuscitated the possibilities of such an alliance.

## Holocaust survivor to speak on campus

Holocaust survivor, author and speaker David Faber is scheduled to give a presentation about his experiences in the Polish Nazi concentration camps at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 25, in Beckwith Recital Hall.

Faber survived internment in eight Polish Nazi concentration camps between 1939-45. He witnessed the murders of his parents, brother and five of his six sisters. When he was liberated from the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in 1945, he was 18 years old and weighed 72 pounds.

Faber also is scheduled to speak at 1 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 28, at the Heritage Hjemkomst Interpretive Center, Moorhead, Minn. Both presentations are free and open to the public, and copies of Faber's autobiography "Because of Romek: A Holocaust Survivor's Memoir," will be available for purchase. Faber also plans to speak at area schools.
