HLC accreditation team completes campus visit

A 10-member team of consultant-evaluators concluded a three-day visit to NDSU on Feb. 15 as a part of the university's efforts to obtain reaccreditation from the North Central Association's Higher Learning Commission (HLC).

The team, led by John Campbell, president emeritus of Oklahoma State University, gave a preliminary report to President Chapman before leaving campus.

"Members of the team said they were very impressed with the enthusiasm of NDSU students, faculty and staff for the direction NDSU is headed," said Chapman. "One consultant-evaluator said he had never seen such broad campus unity in all his years doing similar campus visits. The team was also genuinely impressed with the quality of the information prepared by our accreditation team and the friendliness and willingness to help of everyone they met during their time with us. My appreciation goes to Dr. Bob Harrold and the members of the NCA core team who worked very hard and very well to prepare for this visit."

The team will send a draft report to Chapman within 30 days for fact checking, and a final determination on accreditation from the HLC will be made by this fall.

NDSU was first accredited by the NCA in 1915. It received full accreditation 10 years ago and Chapman said he expects the final NCA report will grant accreditation for another 10 years.

Steinhaus-Rhinehart Scholarship applications sought

Applications are being accepted for the NDSU Development Foundation Steinhaus-Rhinehart Scholarship. Students with a senior standing as of fall 2006 are eligible to apply for the \$500 scholarship.

The endowment was established in 1994 by Mrs. Mabry C. Steinhaus in honor of her late husband, Dr. Edward A. Steinhaus, an NDSU alumnus, and his parents, Alice Rhinehart Steinhaus and Arthur A. Steinhaus.

It provides scholarship assistance to students in the College of Science and Mathematics or College of Agriculture, Food Systems and Natural Resources, who are majoring in biological sciences, including animal and range sciences, biochemistry, biotechnology, botany, crop and weed sciences, horticulture, microbiology and zoology, and who plan to do research and continue their education in biological science at the post-baccalaureate level. Students must have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or greater.

Steinhaus was a native of Max, N.D., and graduated from NDSU in 1936 with a major in bacteriology. He went on to receive his doctorate from Ohio State University in 1939, focusing on bacteriology with a strong interest in entomology.

Applications are available in the Office of Student Financial Services in Ceres Hall until the March 24 deadline. A committee of faculty members from each of the two colleges will monitor applications. The recipient will be determined by April 10 and the award will be made during the fall 2006 semester.

Minnesota resident income tax form reminder

Students give snow removal advice to NDDOT

The North Dakota Department of Transportation's (DOT) Fargo district recently received advice on its snow removal routes from NDSU transportation and logistics graduate students.

Canan Bilen-Green, assistant professor of industrial and manufacturing engineering, said the students in her quantitative modeling course also received a real-world introduction to applications for the theories they are learning in class. The course is required for students earning a doctorate in transportation and logistics.

"I wanted to bring a real modeling problem to the class for them to work on," said Bilen-Green. After consulting with program director Denver Tolliver and research assistant Kurt Johnson at NDSU's Upper Great Plains Transportation Institute, Bilen-Green approached the NDDOT and asked if the class could apply their modeling techniques to snow removal in the Fargo district.

Troy Gilbertson, maintenance coordinator for the district, met with the students and gave them a tour featuring stockpiles of sand and salt and snow removal equipment. He also provided information on plowing routes, plowing priorities, equipment types and capabilities, and equipment and stockpile locations.

"I look forward to meeting with anyone who has a different perspective on how we do things," Gilbertson said. "And the students came up with some pretty interesting ideas."

Bilen-Green said the students researched approaches to snowremoval modeling, divided the issue into segments and developed modeling codes for their particular segment. At the end of the class, the students presented their results to Gilbertson and others at NDDOT.

"This was basically a good start," said Bilen-Green. "This is a complex modeling problem and we have not solved it completely by any means. We did show the students how to approach a problem like this and apply the techniques they're learning in class. The interaction with the DOT was good for the students. They could see how to work with a real problem and see the limitations of some of the techniques we were studying."

Gilbertson agreed that much of the students' work will not have a direct application to NDDOT operations, but it was an opportunity to familiarize students with real-world DOT maintenance and operation challenges. "Hearing their presentations gets you thinking about how we might do things differently," he said.

Responsible printing initiative update

Information Technology Services' Responsible Printing Initiative (RPI) is nearing the end of its initial testing phase, and ITS plans to expand testing to other sites on campus.

According to Marty Hoag, ITS associate director and RPI project manager, Help Desk staff members reported little or no wasted paper in the IACC computer cluster when the GoPrint print management system was in operation.

Although users will be required to swipe their Bison Bucks cards to release print jobs during the continued testing phase, no charges will be made to users' accounts. ITS and Bison Card Services will use information gathered from card swipes to configure the GoPrint system.

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Pharmacy faculty awarded AHEC grant

Todd Johnson, adjunct professor of pharmacy, and Mark Dewey, assistant professor of pharmacy practice, have received a \$100,000 grant for inter-professional practice and education development in geriatric care at Lake Region Healthcare, Fergus Falls, Minn.

Provided by the Central Minnesota Area Health Education Center (AHEC) to stimulate long-term partnerships in interprofessional practice and education, the grant is intended to integrate an educational experience that puts into practice the theories of inter-professional education for future health professionals.

Johnson will serve as project coordinator for an inter-professional practice and education development program. Johnson and Dewey are clinical preceptors in geriatrics and psychiatry for NDSU seniors living in Fergus Falls.

The program will utilize pharmacy students from NDSU and the University of Minnesota, medicine, and nursing students and preceptors under a team concept to focus on underserved or frailer elderly and/or those elderly with multiple medical problems and significant medication use. Team members will be involved in joint educational sessions and medication assessments of seniors.
