NCI pasta short course attracts international attendance

Twenty-three pasta manufacturers from Brazil, Nigeria, Singapore, the United States and Venezuela visited the Northern Crops Institute (NCI) April 5-7 to learn the finer points of producing high-quality pasta.

"Our participants had hands-on access to pasta extrusion equipment, allowing them to process pasta, dry it and test it for cooking quality and color," explained Brian Sorenson, NCI technical director. "We also added sessions on refrigerated pasta and microbiology issues associated with pasta."

Among the scheduled speakers were Carl Anderson, director of quality assurance for Monterey Gourmet Foods, Salinas, Calif.; Elias Elias, NDSU's durum wheat breeder; Frank Manthey, associate professor of plant sciences; and Charlene Wolf Hall, associate professor of veterinary and microbiology sciences.

NCI supports regional agriculture and value-added processing by conducting educational and technical programs that expand and maintain domestic and international markets for northern-grown crops.

Fulbright awards vary from two months to one academic year or longer. The Fulbright Senior Specialists Program, a short-term grants program, offers two- to six-week grants in a variety of disciplines and fields.

While foreign language skills are needed in some countries, most lecturing assignments are in English. Approximately 80 percent of the awards are for lecturing.

The application deadline for 2007-08 Fulbright lecturing and research grants is Aug. 1. The Fulbright Senior Specialist Program has a rolling deadline.

Recipients named for Odney, Waldron, Peltier Awards

Three NDSU faculty members have been selected for prestigious annual campus awards. Mark Nawrot, associate professor of psychology, was chosen for the Odney Award for Excellence in Teaching; Neil Gudmestad, professor of plant pathology, will receive the Waldron Award for Excellence in Research; and Eric DeVuyst, associate professor of agribusiness and applied economics, was selected for the Peltier Award for Innovation in Teaching.

The awardees will be honored during the ninth annual "Celebration of Faculty Excellence," scheduled for 3 p.m. Thursday May 4, at the Alumni Center Atrium. The awards are sponsored by the NDSU Development Foundation.

"The three honorees are outstanding selections. Each of them demonstrates the quality that NDSU is noted for in our land grant mission to provide excellent teaching, leading research and innovative educational techniques," said Craig Schnell, provost and vice president for academic affairs. "The awardees are great representatives of NDSU's commitment to excellence in all areas."

Nawrot was chosen to receive the Odney Award, which is selected primarily on comments from students that describe a faculty member's ability to stimulate interest in subject matter, demand rigorous thought, generate enthusiastic responses and demonstrate distinctive competence. The award has been presented since 1972 in honor of the late Robert Odney, a former Fargo businessman and longtime supporter of NDSU.

"Dr. Nawrot is more than just an exceptional professor, he is also a mentor," wrote psychology student Megan L. Frankl in one of the 12 letters of nomination for Nawrot. "He has taught me how to be an excellent scientist, to question everything. I've learned that things will never be easy, I will always have to work for them and that's a good thing. He has taught me that quality should be my number one priority."

Pharmacy student Angela M. Thompson wrote, "Dr. Nawrot's visual research was (and still is) focused on pushing the envelope of neuroscientific advancement. His patience, encouragement and vision for the future convinced me to continue my education in the same field as well."

Psychology student Nikki K. Lysne wrote in a letter in nomination, "He has truly raised the bar for his peers. Dr. Nawrot has blocked the path to the easy way out and inspired me to rise above the rest."

Nawrot also received support from his department chair. "His efforts go beyond the classroom to insure that students have the opportunity to get a broad, balanced and quality education at NDSU," wrote Paul D. Rokke, professor and chair of psychology. "I strongly recommend Dr. Nawrot for this award."

Nawrot earned his bachelor's degree at the University of Alberta, Edmonton; his master's degree at Northwester University, Evanston, Ill.; and his doctorate at Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tenn. He held a post-doctoral position at the College of Medicine, University of Iowa, Iowa City. His honors include being named a James A. Meier Professor, 1998 Mortar Board Preferred professor and the 2004 College of Science and Mathematics Award for Excellence in Teaching.

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Gudmestad was selected to receive the Fred Waldron Research Award, which was established to recognize outstanding faculty research. An accomplished researcher, he is considered by many to be one of the world's foremost authorities on potato pathogens. He has been invited to speak about his research findings on nearly every continent, including three invited presentations at Cambridge University.

"Dr. Gudmestad has a highly visible and productive research program at NDSU," wrote Jack B. Rasmussen, professor and chair of plant pathology, in a letter of nomination. "By my count, Dr. Gudmestad is PI or co-PI on grants, contracts, gifts and other research awards that total over \$1.4 million in the last three years alone."

Gudmestad received the Research Scientist of the Year-Early Career in 1991 from the North Dakota Agricultural Experiment Station. He also received the Meritorious Service Award from the Red River Valley Potato Growers Association, the 2000 Researcher of the Year from the National Potato Council and the 2001 Eugene R. Dahl Excellence in Research Award from the North Dakota Agricultural Experiment Station. Since he joined NDSU in 1985, he has published 59 refereed journal articles, 10 book chapters and more than 160 short communications, abstracts, extension articles and popular articles.

"Neil is highly respected in the college, well liked by fellow faculty and staff and is willing to work tirelessly for NDSU," wrote Ken Grafton, Agricultural Experiment Station director."

Gudmestad earned his bachelor's degree at Valley City State College, and his master's and doctoral degrees from NDSU.

The Peltier Award, established by Joseph and Norma Peltier to recognize outstanding innovation in teaching, will be presented to DeVuyst. He leads an experiential-based capstone farm management course that integrates accounting, economics, finance, marketing, management and production sciences with applications to real farms. Students serve as consulting teams to area farmers recruited by DeVuyst.

"Comments from students frequently commend Dr. DeVuyst for his emphasis on student learning in a classroom atmosphere that encourages active student involvement," wrote David K. Lambert, professor and chair of agribusiness and applied economics. "Students often report that his are among the best courses they have taken at NDSU."

DeVuyst earned his bachelor's degree and master's degree at Michigan State University, and his doctorate in agricultural economics at Purdue University. Among his honors are the 2000 Earl and Dorothy Foster Excellence in Teaching Award-Early Career, the 2001 Bison Ambassadors Apple Polisher Award, 2002-03 Preferred Agriculture Instructor Award, honorary member of the Golden Key International Honour Society and the FISH Award from the Council of State Employees.

NDSU student wins technical writing competition

Mitch Keller, a senior majoring in industrial engineering and management, recently won the technical writing competition at the Institute of Industrial Engineers (IIE) Region 6 conference, held at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. Keller is the son of Sam and Joyce Keller, Bismarck, N.D.

Keller's paper, "Methods Improvement for a Window Shade Assembly Process," was selected over submissions by students from South Dakota School of Mines and Technology, Rapid City; University of Wisconsin, Madison; Iowa State University, Ames; and the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. Region 6 includes North Dakota, South Dakota, Iowa, Minnesota, Illinois, Nebraska and Wisconsin.

As the regional winner, Keller has been invited to the national competition at the National IIE Conference scheduled for May 20-24, in Orlando, Fla.

In the competition, students submit technical papers discussing a project or study related to the field of industrial engineering. They also give a 15-minute presentation at the conference about their project or study.

"Winning the IIE Region 6 technical paper contest demonstrates both the quality of NDSU's IME program and the quality of our engineering students," said John Cook, associate professor of industrial and manufacturing engineering and the adviser of the NDSU student chapter of IIE. "Mitch has an active, inquisitive mind and is always looking for problems to solve. He has done a great job of integrating and extending course content taken at NDSU with actual engineering problems he encountered in two co-op assignments."

NDSU is scheduled to host the 2007 Region 6 IIE conference.

Entomology students win regional quiz bowl, awards

A team of entomology graduate students took top honors in the Linnaean games college quiz bowl competition. The games were held as part of the annual Entomological Society of America's North Central Branch meeting held March 26-29 in Bloomington, Ill. The North Central Branch includes 14 states, Manitoba and Ontario.

This is NDSU's second Linnaean Games regional championship in the last four years. The team will receive a \$1,000 stipend and will travel to Indianapolis in December to complete for the national championship.

Graduate students Ankush Joshi and Ayanava Majumdar received individual awards at the meeting. Joshi received first place honors in the doctoral competition for his poster, "Post-Establishment Monitoring and Habitat Occurrence of *Aphthona* Flea Beetles." Denise Olson, assistant professor of entomology, is Joshi's adviser. Majumdar also took first place honors in the doctoral competition for his oral presentation, "Prevalence and Pathogenicity of a Native Fungal Pathogen to the Sugarbeet Root Maggot (Diptera: Ulidiidae)." Mark Boetel, assistant professor of entomology, is Majumdar's adviser.

Evan Lampert, graduate student, recently was awarded a trip to Washington, D.C. by winning an essay contest sponsored by the Ecological Society of America. Lampert had the opportunity to learn about the federal science funding process, and meet with representatives of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, National Science Foundation and the Department of Agriculture.

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Steinhaus-Rhinehart scholarship recipient announced
