

NDSU recognized for support of Guard, Reserve

NDSU, Bethany Homes and Cass County Electric Cooperative were recognized July 20 for their strong support of the Army National Guard, Air National Guard, Army Reserve, Naval Reserve and Marine Corps Reserve. The three institutions are the first in North Dakota to sign a "Five-Star" letter of support.

During a signing ceremony, NDSU President Joseph A. Chapman; Ray Weisgarber, executive director of Bethany Homes; and Scott Handy, president of Cass County Electric Cooperative, signed "Five-Star" statements, the highest level of support through a campaign by the National Committee for Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR).

North Dakota Adjutant General Michael Haugen said, "This is a great day and a great thing from all three of you. Thank you for what you do for our military members. Thank you for what you do for the nation."

"In their creative, enthusiastic and steadfast support for the Guard and Reserve, NDSU, Bethany Homes and Cass County Electric have set the standard for all employers in the state of North Dakota," said Vern Fetch, ESGR executive director. "These employers have taken a lead that we hope other employers in North Dakota will follow."

President Chapman said, "I am very proud of NDSU's association with the Guard and Reserve. NDSU students, employees and alumni have served nobly in this country and overseas, and I am pleased to sign the statement of support. The world has changed, and it is critical for all of us to support those who serve in the defense of the United States."

To receive "Five-Star" status, the university reviewed its human resources policies to insure that they comply with the Uniformed Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act, trained managers and supervisors to effectively manage Guard and Reserve member employees, adopted "Over and Above" policies and demonstrated support for ESGR.

Faculty receive grants through Water Resources Research Institute program

Three NDSU faculty members have received two grants totaling \$213,120 to study water issues in North Dakota and Minnesota awarded by the National Institute for Water Resources and the U.S. Geological Survey through the North Dakota Water Resources Research Institute (NDWRRI) 104(G) program.

Bob Hearne, assistant professor of agribusiness and applied economics, received a three-year grant of \$150,392 for a project titled "Assessing the Effectiveness of Local Water Institutions in Water Management." Steven Shultz, associate professor of natural resource economics, and Jay Leitch, professor in the College of Business Administration, were awarded a two-year grant of \$62,728 for a study about "The Impact of Rural Water Supply Systems on Property Values."

Under the 104(G) program, awards are available only to water research institutes or centers established pursuant to the provisions of section 104 of the Water Resources Research Act. NDWRRI is one of the 54 institutes throughout the nation, one per each state and territory organized under the National Institute for Water Resources.

The state institutes run an annual base grant program 104(B) and a national competitive program 104(G), with funding coming from the U.S. Geological Survey.

Section 104(G) of the Water Resources Research Act requires that the competitive grant program focus on water problems and issues of a regional or interstate nature and relate to priorities identified jointly by the Secretary of the Interior and the water resources research institutes. Objectives of the 104 (G) program also include promoting collaboration between the Geological Society and university scientists in research on significant national and regional water resources issues; promoting the dissemination and application of the research results; and assisting in scientific training in water resource fields.

Libraries offer Scopus science database

The Scopus database providing research in scientific information is now available from the NDSU Libraries.

Produced by Elsevier, Scopus provides access to more than 25 million citations, abstracts and full-text links to articles from more than 14,000 titles. Researchers are able to search by subject, author or cited reference.

NDSU's three-year subscription to Scopus is made possible through a cooperative agreement with the NDSU Libraries, the University of North Dakota and funds provided by the N.D. INBRE project, NDSU INBRE and the provost and vice president for academic affairs.

Schwert named dean

Craig Schnell, provost and vice president for academic affairs, has announced the selection of Donald Schwert, professor of geology and director of the Center for Science and Mathematics Education, as dean of the College of Science and Mathematics. Schwert was appointed for a one-year term, effective Aug. 1.

"After an internal search, Dr. Schwert's candidacy emerged as the logical choice. Don has a long history at NDSU, and he is well connected across the state," Schnell said. "In addition, he was our Distinguished Lecturer this last year, so he has achieved at a high level. I look forward to working with him."

Schwert, who joined the NDSU faculty as a visiting assistant professor in 1978, said he is excited about the position.

"I view this as a significant opportunity for professional development for myself, but I also view it as an opportunity to serve a college that has served me very well over the past 27 years," Schwert said. "This is going to be a fun year. I'm doing this because I'm really interested in the position. I'm really interested in learning more about the college and learning about what this type of position holds. I'm interested in working with people I've really enjoyed working with in the past, but at a little different level."

Active in the World Wide Web Instructional Committee, Schwert is the program coordinator of the North Dakota IDEA Network for Biomedical Research Excellence (ND-INBRE). He also is director of the master's degree program in science education.

Among his honors are the 2005 Faculty Lectureship Award, 2001 Peltier Award for Innovation in Teaching, 1998 College of Science and Mathematics Distinguished Service Award, 1998 River-Keepers Education Award, 1997 college Outstanding Teacher Award and the 1992 Odney Award for Excellence in Teaching.

Schwert earned his bachelor's degree at Allegheny College, his master's degree in zoology at SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry at Syracuse University and his doctorate in earth sciences from the University of Waterloo (Canada).

His vita lists 32 refereed publications, 33 book chapters and reviewed proceedings and 52 presented papers. He is a member of the Geological Society of America, National Science Teachers Association, National Association of Research in Science Teaching, American Quaternary Society, Coleopterists Society, North Dakota Academy of Sciences and the North Dakota Mathematics and Science Alliance.

In addition, Schnell said he will soon name a committee to conduct a national search for a permanent dean.

A graduate of Dickinson, N.D., High School, Boehm was active in NDSU Student Government and the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity. He also was a Bison Ambassador.

Amanda Viola Kongsli, 21, died July 11 near Velva, N.D., from injuries sustained in an ATV accident while spraying fence lines. She was a senior studying animal and range sciences.

At NDSU, she was active in the Pre-Vet Club, Post-Secondary Agricultural Students, Collegiate FFA, Saddle and Sirloin, livestock judging and archery club.

Survivors include her parents, Lynn and Susan Kongsli, Towner, N.D.

Student body president attends seminar in Israel

Student body president Kevin Teigen was selected to participate in Project Interchange's 12th annual Student Body Presidents Seminar held July 30-Aug. 7 in Israel. He traveled with 13 other student body presidents from universities in Oklahoma, Montana, Idaho, Iowa, Minnesota, South Dakota and Utah.

The seminar, designed for first-time visitors to Israel, provides student leaders with a first-hand introduction to Israeli politics and society. Participants attend in-depth briefings with Israeli and Palestinian academics, journalists and government officials. They also tour sites of historic and religious significance.

The award acknowledges a certifying official for extraordinary contributions that significantly impact veterans and veteran service providers. In addition, he has been involved in the set-up, testing and training related to NDSU's conversion to Campus Connection (PeopleSoft).

"Neil's contributions to the Office of Registration and Records and the entire NDSU community are numerous and valuable," Wold-McCormick said. "He has remarkable historical perspective and solid understanding of student records, and so many people learn from him on daily basis. He is a strong student advocate and very worthy of this recognition by the state."

Hinderliter to receive Biophysical Society award

Anne Hinderliter, assistant professor of pharmaceutical sciences, was named the recipient of the Biophysical Society's Margaret Oakley Dayhoff Award.

Presented in memory of a former society president, the award recognizes a woman of "very high promise" who has not yet reached a position of recognition within the structure of the academic society.

Hinderliter will receive the \$2,000 cash award at the society's annual meeting scheduled for Feb. 18-22 in Salt Lake City.

The Biophysical Society was founded in 1957 to encourage development and dissemination of knowledge in biophysics. It has more than 7,000 members who work in academia, industry and government agencies worldwide.

Collins authors World War I narrative

Ross Collins, associate professor of communication, published a 250-page examination of World War I, including narrative of events from the August 1914 outbreak to the June 1919 Treaty of Versailles.

His contribution to this two-volume work in the Greenwood Library of American War Reporting included a 5,000-word introduction to the study of the war and excerpts from approximately two dozen U.S. newspapers.

Guo receives NIH grant

Bin Guo, assistant professor of pharmaceutical sciences, has received a two-year, \$245,000 grant from the National Institutes of Health (NIH-R21) to conduct research into the molecular mechanism of cancer cell apoptosis.

The proposed research will center on "bax," one of the two key proteins that control the mitochondrial pathway of apoptosis. Bax exists in an inactive state, and is activated by anti-cancer drugs, killing cancer cells through apoptosis by an unknown mechanism. The project's focus will aim to determine the molecular mechanism by which apoptotic stimuli activate bax.

Guo also recently received a \$106,000 grant from the Department of Defense breast cancer research program to conduct research on a novel membrane-permeable, breast-targeting pro-apoptotic peptide for treatment of breast cancer.
