Kyle Mack, associate professor of music, will be inducted into the hall of fame at St. Mary's High School, Bismarck, N.D., in ceremonies scheduled for Sept. 9-10. A St. Mary's graduate, Mack is being recognized for his accomplishments in the fine arts in the school's inaugural hall of fame event.

Mack has been a member of the NDSU music faculty since 1993, serving as director of jazz studies and teaching low brass and music education. He directs the jazz programs, trombone ensemble and Varsity Band, and assists with the Gold Star Marching Band and Concert Band.

Before coming to NDSU, Mack directed elementary through high school band programs and taught at the college level. He has been an active clinician, adjudicator and guest conductor throughout the region.

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## Norris article on sugar beet laborers published

"Growing Up Growing Sugar: Local Teenage Labor in the Sugar Beet Fields, 1958-74," an article by Jim Norris, associate professor of history, was published in the summer 2005 issue of *Agricultural History*.

The article examines a program supported by North Dakota and Minnesota state governments, community groups and American Crystal Sugar Co. to replace Mexican migrant sugar beet workers in the Red River Valley with local teenagers.

According to Norris, the Youth Beet Program (YBP) grew out of two perceived threats that spawned anxiety in the region during this time period. "Valley residents, like many in the nation, feared local youths would succumb to juvenile delinquency if they were not kept occupied," Norris said. "Employment in the sugar beet fields in the summer months would help keep them out of trouble.

"The second fear was directed at Mexican migrants who came to the region during the summer. Valley residents associated these workers with crime, especially as these Mexican migrants had begun to settle in the area. The YBP, many argued, would serve as a barrier to any further Mexican community growth."

The article is part of a study conducted by Norris on the relationships between the sugar beet industry, migrant workers and growers during the period of World War I and the 1970s.

## Lifton to research fifth century play

Paul Lifton, associate professor of theater arts, plans to spend two weeks in India this winter to complete research on the classic Sanskrit play "The Recognition of Shakuntala," by the fifth century playwright Kalidasa. Regarded as the pinnacle of Indian dramatic writing, the play is compared to the English-speaking theater's "Hamlet." Lifton is considering a production of the ancient play by NDSU's Little Country Theatre.

Traveling on a fellowship from the Asian Cultural Council of New York City, Lifton plans to meet with performing arts faculty and attend performances relevant to the performances of Sanskrit drama.

The Lively Arts Series and the Association of Students from India are scheduled to present "URJA—the Artistic Zeal of India," at 6 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 10, in Festival Concert Hall.

The music and dance production will showcase some of the major Indian festivals that celebrate many faiths and languages. Festivals are described by color, gaiety, enthusiasm, feasts and a variety of prayers exchanging goodwill, decorating houses, wearing new clothes, music and dance.

Some of the festivals to be featured are Holi, celebrating good harvests and fertility of the land; Baisaki, a Punjab festival where farmers perform their own prayers and rejoice; Eid, which marks the end of the holy month of Ramadan and centers around prayers, feasts and family gatherings; Onam, a bright and colorful festival that celebrates the bounties of nature and a year of good harvest; Navratri, a festival of worship, dance and music; Durga Pooja, a national Hindu festival taking place in September and October; Diwali, a nationwide festival leading Indians into truth and light celebrated in October and November; and New Year, a national celebration of Nav-varsh marking the beginning of the year according to local traditions and customs.
