NDSU takes steps to assist students displaced by Katrina

NDSU is taking steps to assist students displaced by Hurricane Katrina continue with their studies. To date, the university has had inquiries from four students looking for alternatives to storm-closed universities and additional contact is anticipated.

For students displaced by Hurricane Katrina, NDSU will waive application and matriculation fees, waive first term tuition and assess in-state tuition for the second term. In addition, university housing will be made available as space permits and, as needed, the university will work with the greater community to locate off-campus housing. Regular room and board rates will apply for on-campus housing.

"We will also provide a condensed orientation and support resources through our Office of Orientation and Student Success," said Catherine Haugen, dean of Enrollment Management. "We will work with faculty to find classes for both graduate and undergraduate students and work on a case-by-case basis so these students can continue with their studies until their home campuses can again offer classes."

Using new national standards to assist displaced students, NDSU Student Financial Services will help students who have been awarded financial aid at their original campus access that aid. Information for displaced students will be available at www.ndsu.edu or by contacting Haugen at 1-7052.

ITS warns of Katrina Internet scams

Several new Internet scams promising news and relief opportunities about Hurricane Katrina are circulating, according to Information Technology Services.

Some scams appear as e-mails claiming to contain news and photos of Katrina's devastation or promising donations to those affected by the hurricane. The attachments and links to the "full news story" in these e-mails may be malicious and may exploit computer vulnerabilities. Clicking the links or opening the attachments included in the e-mail can give an attacker complete control of the targeted computer.

ITS also has reported "chain letters" hoaxes that claim a certain monetary amount will be donated to hurricane relief for every copy of the e-mail forwarded. Scammers may are using these forwards to build new e-mail lists for spamming and phishing.

A report by the Washington Post stated that several fraudulent Web sites have been established claiming to be hurricane relief organizations requesting charitable donations. ITS advises that any financial information provided to those sites may be used for identity theft, and the money "donated" may be collected by scammers.

Internet users can protect their personal and financial information and their computers, while retaining the ability to donate to disaster relief by visiting only trustworthy news sites, and never opening attachments from unsolicited e-mail. Users also are advised not to reply to e-mails or pop-up messages asking for personal information, to click any links in the messages, to respond to an e-mail request for a donation or to send personal or financial information to anyone through e-mail.

ITS also advises that Internet users keep their antivirus software updated. Antivirus software is available for download at http://its.ndsu.nodak.edu/software_licensing/software_index.shtml.

Finalists named for vice president position

Five finalists have been named for the position of NDSU's vice president for business and finance. George Wallman, vice president for student affairs and search committee chair, made the announcement Sept. 8.

The finalists include Bruce Bollinger, director of NDSU's Agriculture Budget Office; Thomas Faecke, director of finance and administration for Higher Colleges of Technology, Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates; Stacie Heiden, chief financial officer for Innovis Health, Fargo; Leonard Kogut Jr., senior associate controller at the University of Kentucky, Lexington, Ky.; and Sheila Peterson, director of the Fiscal Management Division of the North Dakota Office of Management and Budget, Bismarck, N.D.

"This is an outstanding list of candidates, and I look forward to their visits to campus," said President Joseph A. Chapman. Chapman will select a new vice president from the list. "I deeply appreciate the fine work of the search committee."

According to Wallman, the candidates will visit NDSU for interviews and an open forum beginning the week of Sept. 19, with the last visit completed by the end of October. "We started with a pool of over 50 applicants. It is one of the strongest pools that I have worked with, and it is very diverse. Our finalists are all outstanding individuals with diverse experience within and outside higher education," he said.

Bollinger is responsible for assisting in the development of the biennial budgets for NDSU's agricultural and extension activities. He joined NDSU in 1987, and has held a number of positions, including director of Restricted Fund Accounting and director of Cost Accounting. Bollinger earned bachelor's and master's degrees from NDSU. His professional affiliations include membership in the National Association of College and University Business Officers and the Society of Research Administrators.

Faecke serves as the chief financial and technology officer for a system of 12 colleges located throughout the United Arab Emirates. He previously was the vice president for administrative affairs at Bemidji State University, Bemidji, Minn., and controller at Washington State University, Pullman. He earned a bachelor's degree at Bemidji State University and a master's degree from Sonoma State University, Rohnert Park, Calif.

Heiden joined Innovis Health in 2000, after serving as operations finance director for Banner Health System, Fargo. A Certified Public Accountant, Heiden earned a bachelor's degree from NDSU. Heiden is a member of the American College of Healthcare Executives, North Dakota Hospital Association, North Dakota State Society of CPAs and Healthcare Financial Management Association.

Kogut is responsible for the oversight of accounts payable, benefit financial management, financial systems and payroll at the University of Kentucky. His previous work experience includes positions as controller at Western Kentucky University, Bowling Green, Ky., and auxiliary enterprises director at Ferris State University, Big Rapids, Mich. He is a Certified Public Accountant and Certified Internal Auditor. Kogut earned his bachelor's degree at Ferris State University,

his master's degree at Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant, and his doctorate at Michigan State University, East Lansing.

Peterson has worked for the Office of Management and Budget since 1988. As director of fiscal management, her principal responsibility is to develop the governor's budget and present it to the legislature. She earned bachelor's and master's degrees from NDSU. Katti gives presentation at biomechanics symposium

Kalpana Katti, associate professor of civil engineering and construction management, presented "Investigating the Role of Molecular Interactions on Mechanics of Bone Biomaterials: Molecular Dynamics and Fourier Transform Infared Spectroscopic Studies," at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's conference on computational fluid and solid mechanics held recently in Boston.

The presentation featured Katti's recent work on interfacial molecular behavior in composites for bone replacement through molecular dynamics simulations, and the specific nature of interactions between polymers and minerals used in composites for bone replacement.

A new "synthetic biomineralization" process that mimics the mineralization of natural bone also was investigated.

The award was given to the team as "a testament to the level of esteem Apple Computer has for the work the team has accomplished," and in recognition of North Dakota as the only state with an implementation and support team.

North Dakota team members each received a certificate and will participate in the PowerSchool reference program, promote the product to future customers and participate in application trials. Other team members are Melissa Bitz and Jane Hovda, Valley City, and Sarah McFadden, Killdeer.

PowerSchool is present in 50 states and some foreign countries, with approximately 5,000 school districts participating. All districts except North Dakota's receive support directly from organization, which is based in Folsom, Calif.

EduTech began supporting PowerSchool in North Dakota in 2002, with two schools using the system. A total of 69 North Dakota schools now use the system.

Radiation safety, lab and chemical safety courses scheduled

Two separate classes of "Laboratory Use of Radioactive Material" have been scheduled for 8 a.m.-2 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 20, and 11 a.m.-5 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 27, in the Memorial Union Prairie Room.

The course is designed for new or potential users of radioactive materials in the laboratory or field applications. It also serves as a refresher course for anyone currently using radioactive materials. Topics include basic theory of radioactivity, biological interactions with radiation, radiation protection, minimizing exposure level, rules and regulations, and safe handling, decontamination and laboratory procedures. The instructor is Gary Stolzenberg, radiation safety officer.

Course fee is \$25 for NDSU and cooperative agreement institutions, and \$50 for all others. Participants should bring a scientific calculator.

In addition, laboratory and chemical safety courses are scheduled for 8 a.m.-noon, Thursday, Sept. 15, and noon-4 p.m. Monday, Sept. 19, in FLC 319. The course is required for new laboratory workers, and serves as a refresher course for anyone currently working in laboratories.

Topics will include knowledge about chemicals, personal protection, fire safety, electrical safety, hazard communication standards, physical and chemical hazards, chemical spills and waste handling. There is no fee. The instructor is Ted Jirik.
