New spam filtering capability available

Information Technology Services has implemented an updated spam filtering capability for NDSU and North Dakota Higher Education Computer Network (HECN-South) e-mail users that is expected to significantly reduce the amount of spam e-mail received.

The opt-in service allows users to select from four levels of spam protection. Users also may build user-defined "Safe Sender" lists, which allow e-mail from specified, trusted e-mail addresses, and "Block Sender" lists, which identify undesired e-mail addresses. Mail from addresses on a blocked list will be deleted.

Ashley volunteers in Republic of Georgia

Roger Ashley, extension agent and agronomist at the Dickinson Research Education Center, recently participated in Winrock International's volunteer Farmer-to-Farmer program, completing a two-week assignment in the European Republic of Georgia.

Ashley trained Georgian barley producers on improved barley production techniques including crop rotations, soil testing, fertility requirements, seed testing, improved varieties, post-harvest handling, chemicals and new technologies. According to Ashley, producers in Georgia use barley primarily to feed livestock.

Ashley also worked with the Environmentally Sound Livestock Farming project to reduce negative impact on biodiversity in Borjomi-Kharagauli National Park through the adoption of environmentally sustainable livestock management practices.

Cooper attends Golden Key convention

Bonnie Cooper, Graduate School disquisition editor and Golden Key International Honor Society chapter adviser, was NDSU's delegate to the organization's international convention held Aug. 11-14 in Los Angeles. Approximately 750 members were in attendance.

Cooper was co-presenter of the workshop, "Alumni Involvement: A Golden Opportunity for Chapter Success," outlining some ways the NDSU chapter successfully engages Golden Key alumni in its activities. Cooper also was part of the five-member Golden Key alumni panel. Cooper also serves as the Region Six representative to the society's council of advisers.

The society has 350 chapters in Australia, New Zealand, Puerto Rico, Canada, the Virgin Islands, Malaysia, South Africa and the United States. The NDSU chapter was chartered in 1996.

RFID conference scheduled

"RFID: Tools for Business Success," a one-day conference on radio frequency identification (RFID) is scheduled for 7:30 a.m.-5 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 12, at the Fargodome.

The conference, coordinated by NDSU, will offer timely information to students, faculty and area businesses on the RFID industry, demonstrate ways in which companies use RFID technology and provide strategies and tools to implement RFID.

RFID technology automatically identifies data, and captures and transmits information about an object wirelessly using radio waves. Large retailers including Wal-Mart Stores Inc. and the Department of Defense mandate that their suppliers use RFID. Other industries such as automotive, manufacturing, food suppliers, transportation, health care and pharmaceuticals also use RFID. The world's largest RFID tag manufacturing facility, Alien Technology Corp., is under construction at NDSU's Research and Technology Park.

Planned conference speakers include representatives from AbeTech Inc., Alien Technology Corp., Beaver Street Fisheries, IBM Corp., Institute for Scientific Research Inc. (ISR), Killdeer Mountain Manufacturing Inc., Microsoft Corp. and Pedigree Technologies. Conference sponsors include Alien Technology Corp., the Greater Fargo Moorhead Economic Development Corp., Microsoft Corp. and the NDSU Research and Technology Park.

IT security conference slated

The second annual K-20 Information Technology security conference, "IT Security: "A Call to Action for the Education Community, 2005," for education and IT professionals is scheduled for Nov. 3, at the Doublewood Inn and Conference Center, Fargo.

Featured topics this year are information assurance; spam; spyware; wireless security; incident response/forensic investigation; and security standards, guidelines and best practices. Conference speakers include Tracy Mitrano, Cornell University; Huirong Fu, Oakland University; Jack Suess, University of Maryland, Baltimore County; John B. Weaver, JBW Group Inc. (Information Security Consulting); and Kevin Streff, Dakota State University. The conference will include panel discussions, information booths and vendor visitation.

NDSU and several other college counseling centers across the country will offer the free screenings. All screenings are anonymous. Persons showing symptoms of depression will be encouraged to obtain a full evaluation.

Common symptoms of depression include feelings of hopelessness, worthlessness, restlessness and irritability, changes in sleep and appetite, loss of energy and thoughts of death or suicide.

According to the National Institutes of Mental Health, depression affects approximately 1.5 million young adults in the United States each year. Although treatment can help nearly 90 percent of those affected, less than half actually seek treatment.

Appointments are suggested but not necessary, and can be made by calling Counseling and Disability Services at 1-7671. The screening process takes approximately 30-45 minutes. Online screenings also are available at www.ndsu.edu/counseling.
