NDSU seeks public comment on re-accreditation

NDSU is inviting public comment as the university seeks re-accreditation. The university will undergo a comprehensive evaluation visit by a team representing the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, scheduled for Feb. 13-15. The HLC is one of six accrediting agencies in the United States that provide institutional accreditation on a regional basis.

For the past three years, NDSU has been engaged in a process of self-study, addressing the commission's requirements and criteria for accreditation. The evaluation team will visit NDSU to gather evidence that the self-study is thorough and accurate, and will make a recommendation to the commission on the university's continuing status.

Public comments should address substantive matters related to the quality of the institution or its academic programs. Individuals with a specific dispute or grievance should request a separate "Policy on Complaints" document from the commission office.

Written and signed comments must be received by Jan. 12, 2006. The HLC cannot guarantee that comments received after the due date will be considered. Submissions should include the name, address and telephone number of the person providing the comments. Comments will not be treated as confidential.

NDSU's initial accreditation by the commission was in 1915. Current accreditation includes permission to offer B.A., B.S., M.S. and Ph.D. degrees and programs throughout North Dakota. NDSU currently has approval to offer courses electronically to students in various locations.

The accreditation process evaluates an entire institution and accredits it as a whole. Other agencies provide accreditation for specific programs. Accreditation is voluntary. The HLC, which is recognized by the U.S. Department of Education, accredits approximately 950 institutions of higher learning in a 19-state region.

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NDSU business VP search extended

The search for a new vice president for business and finance at NDSU will be extended. In the meantime, President Joseph A. Chapman announced that Broc Lietz will continue as interim vice president and that he has been promoted to associate vice president for business and finance.

Lietz, who has served as NDSU's human resources director since May 2002, will continue to provide leadership to the human resources department and assume additional duties.

"I want to thank the members of the search committee for their efforts in this search," said Chapman. "They did an outstanding job and their work attracted a pool of applicants with each individual possessing unique strengths. In the end, however, we did not find a candidate whose overall strengths matched the broad and unique needs of this vice presidency."

The search will resume after the holiday season. George Wallman, NDSU vice president for student affairs, who had served as search committee chair, earlier announced his retirement at the end of December so a new search committee under a new chair will be appointed.

Theater department to participate in 'Herd About the Prairie'

The NDSU theater department has been selected to participate in "Herd About the Prairie: A Visual Art Stampede." The regional public art project was established as a fundraiser to bring together art, business and community in Cass and Clay counties.

The theater department will decorate a life-size bison that will be on display on campus in spring 2006. The NDSU bison, along with 49 others, will be auctioned and presented to businesses in the Red River Valley. Proceeds will be invested in local arts organizations and projects.

The project is sponsored by the Lake Agassiz Arts Council.

SERW committee sponsors tree for underprivileged family

The Fargo chapter of the State Employees Recognition Week (SERW) committee, a sub-committee of the Council of State Employees (COSE), sponsored a Christmas tree for a local underprivileged family as part of a fundraising project by Fraser Ltd., Fargo.

Through donations by state employees, the committee purchased the tree, decorations and gift cards for a family of five. Of the \$390 raised, \$375 came from NDSU employees. The decorated tree was delivered to the family Dec. 3, after having been on display at Innovis Health, Fargo, for two weeks.

Policy Updates

The following policies have recently been added or revised. To see the complete policy, go to www.ndsu.nodak.edu/policy/.

Section 150—Commercial and Fundraising Activities

Adds language that "recognized student organizations" must register fundraising activities, and that these activities must be consistent with university policies. Changes the permission criteria for those organizations not affiliated with NDSU to advertise, sell, conduct a business or raise funds on the campus or university residences. The policy adds the Wellness Center and "all other areas" to the notification process. The policy prohibits leaflets to be placed on vehicles parked on the NDSU campus.

Section 154—Distribution of Literature

A new Section Six has been added to the policy concerning distribution of literature in the classroom. The subsequent sections were renumbered accordingly. A new Section Eight was added to the policy regarding the organization of, participation in and registration of any protest, rally or demonstration.

Section 190—Employee Responsibility and Activities: Intellectual Property

The current NDSU Policies 340—Copyrights; 341—Patents; and 342—Ownership of Work Products of Teaching Assistants will be deleted. The primary purpose of this policy is to encourage and promote research and scholarship based on the traditional principles of the academic profession.

Policy 231—Appeal Procedure for Disciplinary and Reduction in Force Actions

Changes the language on the selection of member appointments to specific boards by the Staff Senate. Clarifies that the president will assign the members for staff personnel board for a specific grievance. Previously the policy stated that two members would be assigned, but did not specify who assigned them.

Section 336—Examinations and Grading

Adds the "Dead Week Policy," adopted by the University Senate Feb. 14. Language was changed to conform to the university converting to the semester system, and with the policy of instructors loading their own grades. Language was changed to conform to new terminology, i.e., "NAID" is now "university-generated identification," and the Registrar's Office is now the Office of Registration and Records. The timeframe for recording grades of "Incomplete" were updated and simplified.

Policy 703—Bison Card Terms and Conditions (formerly "ID Card Terms and Conditions")

Changes and adds language to the policy, emphasizing the fact that the Bison Card is to be treated like cash, credit card or a key. This policy expounds on the length of card validity; billing for first and subsequent replacement cards, balances on the card and the amount a cardholder is liable for if the card is stolen.

Policy 714—Policy Coordination Committee

Adds language that the president has the authority to adopt interim policies and procedures concerning matters for which legislative authority delegated by the State Board of Higher Education to campus legislative bodies.

Bergman receives 'Williston Ambassador' award

Jerald Bergman, center director of the Williston Research Extension Center, has received the Williston, N.D., Ambassador Award. Bergman received the award from Williston mayor Ward Koeser at the annual Williston economic development appreciation luncheon held Dec. 2.

Koeser recognized Bergman as instrumental in fostering cooperation between communities throughout the Montana-Dakota region. Bergman also is superintendent of the Montana State University Eastern Agricultural Research Center, Sidney.

"Having a talent of Jerry's caliber in the region has been a real asset in attracting processors from the ag industry to study, visit and locate their operations in the Mon-Dak region," said Koeser. "This award is made in grateful appreciation for your vision and leadership in building the Mon-Dak Region through strategic community and business partnerships, agricultural research, irrigation development, the introduction of new crops and value-added agricultural businesses."

Bergman joined the Sidney station in 1974 and assumed leadership of the two stations in 1994. During his tenure, both stations have experienced significant improvements and expanded into overhead irrigation research.

Mack selected for fine arts education 'Who's Who'

Kyle Mack, associate professor of music, was selected for inclusion in the AcademicKeys' "Who's Who in Fine Arts Higher Education." The publication is regarded as the most comprehensive and authoritative online source of information available on leading and influential experts and scientists in higher education fine arts education.

Mack has been a member of the NDSU music faculty since 1993, serving as director of jazz studies and teaching low brass and music education. He directs the jazz programs, trombone ensemble and Varsity Band, and assists with the Gold Star Marching Band and Concert Band.

Before coming to NDSU, Mack directed elementary through high school band programs and taught at the college level. He has been an active clinician, adjudicator and guest conductor in throughout the region.

Zimmerman named to academic team

NDSU linebacker Kole Zimmerman was named to the ESPN the Magazine University Division Academic All-America Football second team as selected by College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

Zimmerman, a senior from Windom, Minn., holds a 3.78 grade point average majoring in history education with an anthropology minor.

The Academic All-America Teams program honors 816 male and female student-athletes annually who have succeeded at the highest level on the playing field and in the classroom. To be eligible, a student athlete must be a varsity starter or key reserve, maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.20 on a scale of 4.00, have reached sophomore athletic and academic standings at his/her current institution and be nominated by his/her sports information director.

Engebretson Lecture Series to present biochemistry lecture

"Biochemical and Computational Approaches in Predicting the Benefits and Perils of Sulfation in Drug Metabolism," presented by Michael Duffel, University of Iowa, is scheduled for 10 a.m. Tuesday, Dec. 20, in Sudro Hall room 26. The presentation is the second installment in the College of Pharmacy's Engebretson Lecture Series.

Duffel is a professor of medicinal chemistry at the University of Iowa College of Pharmacy. His research interests include the biochemistry of enzymes involved in mammalian conversion of drugs to reactive metabolites that mediate toxic and therapeutic effects.

His research includes studies on the specificity, mechanisms and regulation of sulfotransferases involved in drug metabolism and chemical carcinogenesis.

The series is named in honor of benefactors Duane and Glenn Engebretson who had a passion to see research collaboration developed and strengthened at the NDSU College of Pharmacy, University of Minnesota and the Mayo Clinic. The series features six speakers from the United States and abroad. The first presentation, held Nov. 2, featured James Weisshaar, University of Wisconsin-Madison.
