

Most recent NDSU graduates find employment

Nearly 93 percent of recent NDSU graduates are employed or furthering their education, according to the new "Annual Employment Report—2003" prepared by the NDSU Career Center.

The report is based on responses from 1,305 graduates who earned bachelor's degrees for the terms ending in December 2002, May 2003 and August 2003.

According to the report, 72.3 percent reported being employed, 20.5 percent reported "Post Baccalaureate and Professional" status and 7.2 percent said they are still active in a job search.

"In this challenging labor market, it is heartening to know NDSU graduates are successfully securing employment, a strong indicator that employers value the quality of education at our institution," said Jill Wilkey, Career Center director. "Another significant factor in this data is that over half of the employed respondents reported accepting jobs in North Dakota, up slightly from last year."

A total of 492 employed respondents, or 52.1 percent, reported accepting employment in North Dakota, and 263 graduates, or 27.9 percent said they have accepted employment in Minnesota. Overall, graduates reported accepting employment in 39 states and three foreign countries.

The report also said that 85.3 percent of employed respondents have positions in or related to their major or minor area of study. In addition, the average annual reported salary was \$33,108, with the highest reported salary being \$72,000.

Located in Ceres Hall, the NDSU Career Center is a comprehensive employment information and resource center that connects students and alumni with employers. During the reporting period, 67 companies visited the NDSU campus to interview 572 seniors for full-time positions, and the center posted 420 full-time opportunities on its electronic job board.

The center helps coordinates such events as the Engineering and Technology Expo, Tri-College Graduate School Day, Tri-College Career Fair, Design Expo, North Dakota Education Connection, Spring Career Fair and Meet the Firms.

Faculty, staff assistance program available

The Village Family Service Center provides services for faculty and staff through the NDSU assistance program. The program provides problem assessment, short-term counseling and referral to community resources for NDSU employees at 15 offices in North Dakota and Minnesota. Service also is available nationwide.

Benefited faculty and staff and their immediate family members are eligible to receive services. Assistance is available for marital and parenting concerns, emotional crises, financial and legal difficulties, substance abuse evaluations and work-related problems.

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'NDSU from the Air,' first 'Prospectus' added to Archives Web page

The NDSU Archives Web site has added an intriguing aerial perspective on how the campus changed over the course of seven decades. In addition, researchers have included a rare look at the university's first recruiting booklet.

The aerial photos exhibit, called "NDAC/NDSU from the Air—1920s-1990s," includes 26 photographs from 1922-1993. During that time period, NDSU grew from 20 buildings and slightly more than 600 students to 88 buildings and nearly 10,000 students. Today, NDSU's campus includes 110 buildings and a student enrollment of more than 11,600 students. The link to the exhibit is www.lib.ndsu.nodak.edu/archives/aerial/index.html.

The other exhibit features the entire June 1891 edition of the North Dakota Agriculture College Prospectus, the university's first recruiting booklet. The material provides brief biographies of the first faculty members, winter courses available for 1891, background and purpose of the institution, admission requirements, expenses, resources, proposed four-year course of study, daily routine and a calendar. "These two exhibits provide additional evidence of the growth and expansion of NDSU over its almost 115-year history," said Michael Robinson, archivist. "These online exhibits give us an opportunity to showcase NDSU's rich history with some of our rare and unique material, which otherwise would not be possible."

Robinson credits student Dan Hamre, a senior majoring in computer science, with providing the technical expertise for the Web exhibits. Robinson said Hamre has participated in several NDSU Archives projects that attempt to bring NDSU historical materials to the public's attention.

Cooke Foundation graduate scholarship applications sought

The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Graduate Scholarship Program is seeking applications from college seniors and recent graduates. According to R. S. Krishnan, associate vice president for academic affairs, NDSU has been invited to nominate two students for the program.

Now in its third year, the award provides funding for tuition, living expenses, fees and books. The maximum award available per student is \$50,000 per year, and the maximum length is six years. The award may be used to attend any accredited graduate school in the United States or abroad in pursuit of a graduate degree or professional degree in medicine, law or business.

To be eligible, a candidate must be a senior or recent graduate, have a cumulative college grade point average of 3.5 or better, begin a full-time graduate program at an accredited university in fall 2004 and be nominated by his or her undergraduate institution.

An NDSU committee, consisting of Krishnan; Paul Homan, associate professor and chair of modern languages; Jim Venette, associate dean of agriculture, food systems and natural resources; and Alan White, dean of science and mathematics, will review scholarship applications beginning March 1.

In a letter to deans, Krishnan asked that no more than two names of graduating seniors from each college be forwarded to the committee. He suggested colleges appoint small committees for the purpose of soliciting and choosing candidates from each college.

The deadline for NDSU to forward nominations to the foundation is April 30.

NDSU Penny Wars effort raises \$1,500

The 2003 "Penny Wars," sponsored by Residence Life, raised \$1,500 for the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots program. The annual event is a competitive fundraiser among the university's 11 residence halls.

In the competition held Dec. 7-10, each donated penny counted as one positive point, while other coins and bills were listed as negative points. Students try to give other residence halls negative points, while contributing pennies to their own hall's collection jar.

"The competition was a real success," said Jodie Filpus, Penny Wars spokesperson and Weible Hall director. She said NDSU students, faculty and staff are dedicated to helping out the Fargo-Moorhead area, both through monetary contributions and donated toys that were collected on campus.

The Toys for Tots program was established in 1947 with the support of members of the Los Angeles Marine Corps Reserve Unit. Expanded to include the entire nation in 1948, the program is a leader in looking after America's needy children at Christmas. Eide to retire

Wallace "Wally" Eide, will retire at the end of January after more than 28 years with the NDSU Extension Service.

Eide began his career with the NDSU Extension Service in 1975 as a livestock specialist. He established its computer services department in 1983, and became a district director in 1985. Eide has been director of the Institute for Business and Industry Development (IBID) since its inception in July 1989.

"IBID provides one-on-one consulting to identify and solve business and technical problems with the help of NDSU researchers and students," Eide said. "IBID also performs the role of 'matchmaker,' finding the needs of urban manufacturers and then matching those needs with the capabilities of suppliers, particularly those in the more rural areas of the state."

During his tenure with IBID, Eide focused on taking university resources to North Dakota citizens. "We've provided business and technical assistance to hundreds of North Dakota inventors, entrepreneurs, businesses and rural communities," he said. "It was great working with those people because they are always so enthusiastic and are the type of people that like to think out of the box. It was also exciting to work on new products or services."

Eide graduated from high school in Tioga, N.D. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from NDSU, specializing in reproductive physiology in animal and range sciences. Eide is retiring to pursue other interests.
