

## Chancellor field narrowed to six candidates

Six candidates for chancellor of the North Dakota University System will be offered interviews Feb. 21-March 10. The field of candidates was narrowed from 14 applicants during the State Board of Higher Education's chancellor search committee meeting Jan. 20 at Bismarck State College.

The candidates include Kendall Blanchard of Fort Lewis College, Durango, Colo.; Barry Dorsey, president of the University of Rio Grande, Rio Grand, Ohio; Daniel T. Layzell, deputy director of the Illinois Board of Higher Education; Charles M. Lyons, president of the University of Maine at Augusta; Brian Pitcher, most recently acting president of University of Idaho, Moscow; and Robert Potts, president of the University of Northern Alabama, Florence.

The board hopes to have a new chancellor on duty by June 1 to replace Larry Isaak, who resigned last fall.

## Rogowski receives best student paper award from Desert Fishes Council

David Rogowski, graduate student in biological sciences, received the Carl L. Hubbs Award for best student paper at the international meeting of the Desert Fishes Council held in November in Death Valley, Calif. More than 200 members representing approximately 40 universities attended the meeting.

Rogowski's paper was recognized by the awards committee for its originality, experimental control and immediate relevance to the conservation of a threatened species.

In his paper, Rogowski reported the results of an experiment evaluating the potential impacts of two exotic species on the White Sands pupfish, a protected species found only in four isolated habitats in southern New Mexico.

Rogowski's research included information supporting negative effects of introducing the two exotic species to the White Sands pupfish population. His study incorporated the use of experimental pupfish populations at NDSU.

Craig Stockwell, assistant professor biological sciences, is Rogowski's adviser and paper co-author.

The Desert Fishes Council is an international scientific organization dedicated to the study and conservation of fish species that occupy rare and threatened aquatic habitats in the world's deserts.

### Iceland geology and photography field course planned

"Volcanoes Inside and Out: A Geological and Landscape Documentation Field Experience to Iceland," a field course to Iceland led by the departments of geosciences and art, is scheduled for July 24-Aug. 8. An informational meeting is scheduled for 1 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 28, in the Memorial Union Plains Room.

The trip will focus on photographic landscape documentation and geology of Iceland. Travelers will make a complete ring around Iceland, including parts of the remote interior areas, and the nearby Westmann Islands. The tour is designed to provide an understanding of Icelandic landscapes, volcanism and history and methods of representation.

Participants will contribute to either a field guidebook assembled prior to the trip, or to a photographic documentation completed after returning.

Scheduled trip leaders are Bernhardt Saini-Eidukat, associate professor of geology, and Wayne Gudmundson, professor of mass communications at Minnesota State University Moorhead.

The trip is open to students, alumni and interested community members, and may be taken for credit. ## Research Opportunities

### COS personal profile update reminder

Faculty and professional staff are reminded to regularly update their personal expertise profiles in the Community of Science (COS) database.

To update a profile, go to [www.cos.com](http://www.cos.com) and complete the username and password fields. When the personal "Workbench" page loads, users should click on "My Profile" to complete the update.

It is suggested that individuals should update at least the "Qualifications" area, which includes educational background and degrees, and the "Expertise and Research Interests" area. Users may copy and paste information from other areas to include in the updates. Other update options include "Grants Received" and "Publications."

Some purposes for which COS profiles are used include administrator identification of expertise to create teams of individuals to work on large campus initiatives; identification of experts for media interviews; identification of experts for news stories in various publications; location by faculty of potential research collaborators; student identification of faculty with particular expertise; informational purposes to assist in recruiting new faculty and students; use on department Web sites to provide Web links to faculty profiles; use as personal Web page by including the Web address in email signatures; an alternative campus directory; and creation and printing of a customized curriculum vitae.
