Memorial service planned for student killed in Iraq

A memorial service for NDSU student Sgt. Keith Lee Smette is scheduled for 2 p.m. Monday, Feb. 9, in the Memorial Union ballroom. Smette was one of two Army National Guard soldiers killed Jan. 24 when their convoy struck a roadside bomb north of Fallujah, Iraq.

The Rev. Bruce Krogstad of the University Lutheran Center will officiate the memorial service, and members of Smette's family have indicated they plan to attend. A scholarship honoring Smette will be established through the College of Human Development and Education, and the campus community is invited to participate.

Smette, 25, a senior university studies major from Makoti, N.D., and staff Sgt. Kenneth Hendrickson, 41, of Bismarck, were members of the Bismarck-based 957th Multi-Role Bridge Company. They were traveling with the 82nd Airborne Division.

"It is difficult for a campus to lose one of its own. Through this time of grieving and sadness, we can remember with pride Keith's ultimate sacrifice and his service to his country," said President Joseph A. Chapman. "Our deepest condolences go to Keith's parents, family and friends."

Gov. John Hoeven said all North Dakotans mourned the loss of the two soldiers. "These brave soldiers will be remembered for their courage and devotion to duty," Hoeven said. "As we grieve and pray for Kenneth and Keith, our thoughts and prayers continue to be with the men and women of our National Guard, Reserves and active duty military who have been called to serve and are still in harm's way."

George Wallman, vice president for student affairs, met with news reporters on Jan. 26. "Keith Smette died doing what he believed was an honorable thing in serving his country and serving us," Wallman said, noting that the Student Senate held a moment of silence honoring Smette during its Jan. 25 meeting. He said Smette is the first student killed in action during Wallman's years as vice president for student affairs.

As a freshman, Smette was a student in a class taught by Bradford Strand, chair and professor of health, nutrition and exercise sciences. Strand described him as an outgoing, friendly student. "I remember Keith as always having a smile on his face. He was one of those guys that is nice to have around," Strand said. "Keith would see me in the hall and say, 'Dr. Strand, how are you doing? It's good to see you.' He was a guy that you really liked and somebody you remember.

"In this class that I teach, there are 170 students. You don't remember everybody," Strand said. "But, I certainly remember Keith."

Smette withdrew from classes at NDSU in February 2003 as his unit was called to active duty, and he volunteered to go to Iraq. While in Iraq, he changed his studies from physical education in the College of Human Development and Education to university studies.

An estimated 100-120 NDSU students have been mobilized by Guard and Reserve units for service in Iraq. The deaths of Hendrickson and Smette bring the number of North Dakota Guard soldiers killed in combat in Iraq to three.

Libraries offer increased scientific databases access

NDSU Libraries now offers access to more than 50 databases published by Cambridge Scientific Abstracts (CSA) and its publishing partners.

CSA databases provide indexing and abstracting for millions of citations in the areas of life sciences, environmental and aquatic sciences, computer sciences, materials science and engineering, aerospace, social sciences and humanities.

Recent additions include the CSA technology research database which includes METADEX, civil engineering abstracts, engineered materials abstracts, and an aerospace and high technology database; biological sciences which includes the life sciences database; and pollution abstracts.

All CSA databases feature separate "Quick" and "Advanced "search options, easy to set search limits, thesaurus searches, links to full-text, document delivery, NDSU's library catalog and inter-library loan, saved search histories, search alerts, multi-lingual interfaces and context-sensitive help.

The CSA databases may be accessed through the "Cambridge Scientific Abstracts" link on the Libraries home page catalog. The databases are available from any on-campus location. Off-campus access is available through the "My Library Login" link on the Libraries home page or through the NDSU modem pool. For more information, or to schedule training, call 1-8886.

Sponsored programs compliance reminder notice

NDSU is committed to complying with federal regulations and guidelines regarding the use of human subjects, animals and recombinant DNA, infectious agents and human blood, tissue and bodily fluids in research and teaching activities. Faculty, staff and students conducting projects in these areas are required to have the projects reviewed and approved by the applicable compliance committee prior to initiation.

Recently updated policies require documentation of training for all investigators, co-investigators, students and key personnel involved with projects in these areas.

Several training sessions are offered on campus each semester allowing investigators to fulfill the requirements. The spring semester training schedule is as follows:

- Animal Welfare and the IACUC—2 p.m. Tuesday, March 2, Memorial Union University Chamber; 2 p.m. Wednesday, March 3, Memorial Union Meadow Lark room
- Human Subjects and the IRB—3 p.m. Tuesday, March 2, Memorial Union University Chamber; 3 p.m. Wednesday, March 3, Memorial Union Meadow Lark room

The sessions are an introduction to the applicable federal regulations, ethical principles, institutional policies and procedures in each area. The Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC) is responsible to oversee NDSU's animal program, facilities and procedures, and reviews the proposed use of live vertebrate animals in any research, teaching, testing or exhibition projects. The Institutional Review Board (IRB) is responsible to review all proposed research involving human participants to ensure that the rights and welfare of the participants are protected. The Institutional Biosafety Committee (IBC) reviews protocols for the safe use of recombinant DNA, infectious agents and human blood, bodily fluids and tissues in research or teaching projects. NSF, FIPSE, Research Foundation grants listed

Brian Slator, professor of computer science; Lisa Daniels, assistant professor in the School of Education; and Curt Hill of Valley City State University received a three-year National Science Foundation (NSF) grant for \$263,000 for their project "Accelerating Computer Science Education" to study computer science education and learning using experimental curricular materials.

Alan White, dean of science and mathematics; Phillip McClean, professor of plant sciences; Slator; and Daniels received a \$495,400, two-year grant from the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE) for the project "Visualizing Molecular and Cellular Biology Processes. The project goal is the development of a dynamic dissemination procedure for education software, particularly the Virtual Cell (VCell), an interactive, multi-user 3-D environment designed for active learning of modern cell biology.

G. Padmanabhan, professor and director of civil engineering; Robert Pieri, professor of mechanical engineering; and Daniels received approximately \$100,000 in NSF funding for their planning grant "A State University-Tribal Colleges Partnership to Initiate Systemic Changes to Increase STEM Content in K-12 Education." The one-year grant will be used to help connect pedagogy between NDSU's College of Engineering and Architecture and School of Education, and the North Dakota tribal colleges and reservation high schools.

Daniels; Dogan Comez, professor of mathematics; William Martin, associate professor of mathematics; Lisa Montplaisir, assistant professor of biological sciences; and Donald Schwert, professor of geology and director of the Center for Science and Mathematics Education, received a one-year, \$10,000 grant from the NDSU Research Foundation to conduct a pilot study addressing a science and mathematics teacher education program.
