

Campus remembers fallen student-soldier

The NDSU campus remembered Sgt. Keith Smette as a friend and war hero during a memorial service held Feb. 9 in the Memorial Union ballroom. Smette, 25, a senior university studies major from Makoti, N.D., was one of two Army National Guard soldiers killed Jan. 24 when a roadside bomb exploded as their convey passed by north of Fallujah, Iraq.

An estimated 300 people attended the service, officiated by the Rev. Bruce Krogstad of the University Lutheran Center. Speakers recalled Smette as a caring friend who was usually smiling or laughing.

Gov. John Hoeven described Smette as a person who had a vitality and love of life, a person who gave the ultimate sacrifice. "Our hearts are broken, but at the same time they are filled with gratitude and pride," Hoeven said. "He was truly an American hero."

Former roommate Chris Haman emotionally remembered his long-time friend. "On Saturday, Jan. 24, I received a phone call that will forever stain my heart. I was told Keith Smette was killed," he said. "No explanations, just words on the other end of the phone saying, 'He's gone. He's gone.' I never understood what it meant to question the death of a loved one until that moment."

Student body president Dan Mostad presented the Smette family with an NDSU flag that was flown near the Memorial Union for one week following his death.

"I can speak for everyone at NDSU when I say we truly lost a member of our family," Mostad said. "From what I've been told, Keith was an extraordinary young man. His service to his world, country and community are to be commended. The crowd gathered here today is a testament to his life."

"Sgt. Keith Smette, the student-soldier, we of the North Dakota National Guard are so very, very proud of you," said Brig. Gen. Jerald Engelman, assistant adjutant general, North Dakota Air National Guard. "May he forever be remembered in our memories as he so clearly, with deliberate focus, lived life."

Bradford Strand, professor and chair of health, nutrition and exercise sciences, said Smette took two of his courses. He said Smette is missed by many people on campus.

"I remember Keith as always having a smile on his face, very polite," Strand said. "He was one of those guys that is just nice to have around. He would greet you in the hallway with a hello and a smile. He was a guy that you really liked, and someone that you remember."

During the service, the NDSU Army ROTC color guard presented the colors and the NDSU Concert Choir sang the selection, "In Remembrance." The Rev. Paul Duchshere of the Newman Center assisted with the service. Judy Dietzler provided music before and after the service.

Later the same day, the University Senate honored Smette's memory with a moment of silence and approved a motion to present a posthumous degree during May commencement ceremonies.

Internet classical music service offered by NDSU Libraries

The NDSU Libraries now offer the Classical Music Library, a streaming Internet service available from *Classical.com*.

Funded through a technology fee grant, the Classical Music Library delivers classical music via the Internet to students, faculty and staff on their campus or home computers. Researchers have access to a multimedia research site that includes more than 17,000 classical music recordings, program notes, composer biographies and images. Users can search for music by composer, title of work, recommended play lists and genre. The Classical Music Library is a fully licensed and legal service using licensed recordings.

Other features include an advanced search engine with the ability to research music and reference material in a range of ways suited to level of knowledge; recommended classical music play lists sorted by theme and category; a user-friendly interface enabling patrons to organize, create, save and share their own selections; optional download and custom CD functions allowing users to purchase any recordings found through the service in digital or CD format; and the latest classical music news, information and features.

The Classical Music Library database can be accessed from the database link on the NDSU Libraries home page, or directly at <http://nds.classical.com>. The database is available from any on-campus location. Off-campus computers can access the database through the "My Library Login" link on the Libraries home page or through the NDSU modem pool. Olfert to present at directors conference

Warren D. Olfert, assistant professor of music, is scheduled to present "A Unique Repertoire: Music of the American Wind Symphony Orchestra" at the North Central regional conference of the College Band Directors National Association scheduled for Feb. 19-21 in Cincinnati. The conference and includes lectures, presentations and concerts by several university bands in the region.

Olfert's lecture will address the influence of the American Wind Symphony and its conductor, Robert Austin Boudreau, on commissioning original music for winds. Originated in Pittsburgh in 1957, the American Wind Symphony Orchestra is recognized as one of the most prolific musical organizations in creation of new music for winds.

The presentation will include results of Olfert's research on the origins of American Wind Symphony performances, their role in the expansion of the wind literature and successful solutions to performances of the music.

Olfert is NDSU's director of bands, responsible for the Gold Star Marching Band and Concert Band.
