# NDSU joins Great West Football Conference

NDSU is among seven institutions to establish the new Great West Football Conference. The NCAA Division I-AA football alliance is scheduled to begin competition in 2004, with full round-robin play set to begin during the 2005 season.

In addition to NDSU, charter conference members include California Polytechnic State University; University of California, Davis; University of Northern Colorado; St. Mary's College of California;

South Dakota State University; and Southern Utah University. Administrative services will be provided through a contract with the Mid-Continent Conference office.

President Joseph A. Chapman said, "Every unit across the NDSU campus has been asked to find ways to move to the next level, and for Bison Athletics, that step is NCAA Division I. The announcement is another indication that NDSU is becoming a model of the contemporary metropolitan land-grant university. It is another important development for NDSU's efforts to grow, progress and transform."

At a Feb. 25 news conference, Gene Taylor, director of athletics, said the conference has applied for formal recognition by the NCAA, which is expected to consider the application in April. "This league ultimately will be one of the finer leagues in Division I-AA football. If you do things right in your league and beat teams outside your league, you're going to have an opportunity to qualify for the I-AA playoffs," Taylor said.

According to Taylor, the conference plans to award several honors, including Great West All-Conference and Academic All-Conference teams, Player of the Year and Coach of the Year.

Head football coach Craig Bohl said it is exciting and challenging for his team to compete against excellent football programs. "This is a great day," he said. "This is an example of forward-thinking institutions that are moving forward. NDSU is certainly at the cutting edge in a lot of ways—this is another example of our administration's vision. We are excited about the opportunity."

The seven member schools are located in five states and three time zones, which is anticipated to give schools added exposure. The conference affiliation also is expected to generate interest within the schools' alumni base, which has a combined total of more than 400,000 people.

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## NDSU to give returning troops assistance

NDSU has implemented special procedures to assist returning students who have been activated in the National Guard and Reserves.

According to George Wallman, vice president for student affairs, military students will receive priority when registration begins on April 5. In addition, their financial aid deadline will be waived and they will be given housing priority.

He said military students can register online by using the "Returning Military Re-enrollment Form," found at www.ndsu.edu/registrar and by clicking on "Forms" under "Quick Link."

"Our goal in developing these procedures was to make it as simple as possible for them to get back into the world of being a college student," Wallman said. "We recognize that some of our returning students will come back with a different perspective on life after having served in such difficult conditions. We appreciate their commitment to serve and look forward to their return."

## Staff recognition nominations sought

The Office of Human Resources seeks nominations for individual and team recognition awards.

The awards recognize individual staff members or teams who demonstrate outstanding achievement on the job; exceptional contributions towards the effectiveness and efficiency of operations; outstanding service to other employees, students or visitors; and provide distinguished efforts in staff development.

Up to 10 individual awards are presented annually to broadbanded staff in the administrative/professional, technical paraprofessional, office support, crafts/trades and service categories. Each recipient receives a \$250 cash award.

## NDSU signs new exchange agreements

NDSU has signed exchange agreements with five overseas universities. They include the Aarhus School of Business, Aarhus, Denmark; Charles Sturt University, New South Wales, Australia; Leeds Metropolitan University, Leeds, United Kingdom; University of Burgos, Burgos, Spain; and University of Southern Queensland, Toowoomba, Australia. Similar to other exchange agreements, these agreements will allow undergraduate students to pay their tuition and fees to NDSU and only costs of living and books at the host institution.

Aarhus School of Business features the Faculty of Business Administration and the Faculty of Modern Languages, and offers courses in business administration, finance, marketing and business communication. Aarhus, with a population of 280,000 people, is situated about two hours from Copenhagen. The school is the second largest business school in Denmark and has more than 6,000 students. Courses are taught in English.

Charles Sturt University is open to agriculture students, specifically in agronomy studies such as crop science, weed science and cropping systems. The university has a network of campuses throughout the state of New South Wales, with main campuses located in Albury-Wodonga, Bathurst, Dubbo and Wagga Wagga. Including all campuses, the university has approximately 12,500 students.

Leeds Metropolitan University offers academic programs similar to NDSU, including such areas as architecture, business, engineering, tourism and hospitality management. The university, with more than 35,000 students, can be reached via a two-hour train ride north of London.

The University of Burgos includes the Faculty of Science, Faculty of Economics and Business Science, Faculty of Law and the Faculty of Humanities and Education. Students wanting to study Spanish may take courses in the language. Students with upper-level Spanish can take regular academic courses. The university has an enrollment of 11,000 students. The city of Burgos is the provincial capital and can trace its history back 1,100 years.

The University of Southern Queensland includes the Colleges of the Arts, Engineering and Surveying, Business, Education and Sciences. Students may take classes in such areas as agricultural engineering, tourism and hospitality, biotechnology, early childhood and information technology. With an enrollment of about 23,000 students, the university is located 90 minutes from Brisbane.
