

Campus climate results available online

The full report on the campus climate survey is available on the Diversity Council Web page. Go to www.ndsu.nodak.edu/diversity/ and click on "news." The report is in .pdf format.

The report includes analysis of results for all items on the survey, as well as appendixes with the survey instrument, the consultant's model for change, data tables and a content analysis of the narrative comments.

In addition, two PowerPoint presentations are at the same site. One is a brief overview of the survey results that has been presented to a variety of campus groups and in two open forums. The second is a more extensive report on the survey results. Additional information that was posted earlier continues to be available as well.

The council will work on a strategic plan with Rankin and Associates Consulting during the spring semester and into the summer. The council wishes to involve the campus community in developing the plan, and it encourages interested persons to contact a council member. A list of members is available on the Diversity Council Web page.

The current timetable calls for the plan to be in draft form by this fall, so that it can be discussed with campus constituents during the fall semester and then finalized.

Learning Community mentors sought

Bone health study participants sought

Researchers at the USDA-ARS Grand Forks Human Nutrition Research Center are seeking post-menopausal women ages 51-80 to take part in a study on bone health. The study will compare the effectiveness of a combination of mineral and calcium supplements versus supplements of calcium only.

Participants will receive calcium and multivitamin supplements free for two years, and can earn up to \$750 for participating. In addition, they will receive either a copper/zinc supplement or a placebo. Follow-up tests will be conducted every six months at the Biosciences Research Laboratory on the NDSU campus.

Medications that do not interfere with calcium absorption, such as synthroid and statins, are acceptable.

Hegland, Hough to participate on rural transportation panel

Small Urban and Rural Transit Center researchers Gary Hegland, associate research fellow, and Jill Hough, director, are scheduled to participate in a panel discussion on rural transportation issues at the annual Transportation Research Forum scheduled for March 21-23 at Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill. The center is part of the Upper Great Plains Transportation Institute.

The annual forum features presentations on transportation research and advances from university and industry professionals.

Hegland will present the results of a research project on transportation needs of the disadvantaged in North Dakota. Hegland and Hough gathered information on ways in which disadvantaged individuals use public transportation, and their evaluations of existing services.

Hough will discuss a study of rural road user needs in North Dakota, South Dakota and Montana comparing perceptions of rural road users with those of decision makers.

The Transportation Research Forum is an independent organization of transportation professionals established to provide a forum for the discussion of ideas and research techniques applicable to economic, management and public policy problems involving transportation.

Student recruitment partnership announced

The Office of Admission and the College of Pharmacy have announced a partnership for student recruitment purposes.

Jaclynn Davis Walette, Native American Pharmacy Program (NAPP) coordinator, will have a part-time appointment in admission to assist with recruitment focused on prospective American Indian students.

“These two areas complement one another in providing information and opportunities at NDSU for Native American students, so the collaboration is a natural one,” said Kate Haugen, dean of enrollment management. “Ms. Walette has work experience at Turtle Mountain Community College in addition to NDSU, and brings valuable knowledge and background to the position which will benefit the entire university.”

Civil engineering students take top honors at regional competition

NDSU civil engineering students took first place overall at the recent American Institute of Steel Construction (AISC) regional steel bridge competition. The competition was held in conjunction with the 2004 American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) Mid-Western Regional Conference, hosted by the University of Minnesota Feb. 26-28.

More than 20 members of NDSU's ASCE student chapter traveled to Minneapolis to participate in the conference proceedings and compete in the bridge competition. This year's competition required that the students build a 25-foot long, two-span steel bridge that would safely carry 2,500 pounds.

Trophies were awarded for the top three overall winners and six individual categories: construction economy, structural efficiency, lightness, construction speed, stiffness and aesthetics. NDSU students won three trophies in the areas of aesthetics, structural efficiency and stiffness.

NDSU's construction team included graduate student Mitch Okeson, team captain, Detroit Lakes, Minn.; senior Jeremy Freihammer, Baxter, Minn.; senior Jesse Freihammer, Baxter, Minn.; senior David Blommel, Willmar, Minn.; junior Brian Lintgen, St. Cloud, Minn.; and sophomore Nathan Hoffmann, Leeds, N.D.

Having won the regional competition, the NDSU team has been invited to the national competition in Golden, Colo., in May.

Ken Kellogg, assistant professor of civil engineering and faculty adviser to the students, said, “These students truly deserve to compete at the national level. Their overall regional score was a factor of two better than their nearest competitor. They have worked very hard, and I'm very proud of them.”

The regional competition included nine universities: Iowa State University, Minnesota State University-Mankato, South Dakota State University, NDSU, University of Iowa, University of Minnesota-Twin Cities, University of North Dakota, University of Wisconsin-Platteville and Lakehead University, Ontario, Canada.

Slobin elected to international office

Kathleen Slobin, associate professor and chair of sociology, was elected to a four-year term as deputy treasurer of the Sociologists for Women in Society (SWS), an international organization of social scientists. She will take office as treasurer in 2006.

The group's mission is to improve the position of women within sociology and society through the promotion and dissemination of research about women, education, support and political action.

Oyola-Yemaiel and Wilson publish in international journal

Arthur Oyola-Yemaiel and Jennifer Wilson published “Terrorism and System Failure: A Revisited Perspective of Current Development Paradigms” in the International Journal of Mass Emergencies and Disasters, November 2003. Oyola-Yemaiel and Wilson are co-directors of NDSU's new emergency management program in the Department of Anthropology and Sociology.

The International Journal of Mass Emergencies and Disasters is considered one of the world's leading journals in disaster research and is the official journal of the Research Committee on Disasters of the International Sociological Association. First established in 1983, it is concerned with the social and behavioral aspects of relatively sudden collective stress situations typically referred to as disasters or mass emergencies.

Oyola-Yemaiel and Wilson have been involved on several other projects. They are editing a monograph series through NDSU's Institute of Regional Studies on emergency management in higher education; the first in the series will be published in September. They initiated the NDSU emergency management program as a technical secretariat for the Organization of American States on issues of disaster prevention and mitigation. They also established a sponsorship from the North Dakota League of Cities/Association of Counties for an emergency management graduate student to coordinate the establishment of a collegiate Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) on campus. In addition, they have been invited to organize a panel for FEMA's conference on “Challenges of New Emergency Management Programs” June 8-10 in Washington, D.C.

Martens and Ramsay to give architecture presentation

Steve Martens and Ronald Ramsay, associate professors of architecture, are scheduled to present research about North Dakota buildings during a joint meeting hosted by Preservation North Dakota and the State Historical Society of North Dakota. Their slide presentation is scheduled for 3 p.m. Saturday, May 1, at the Masonic Lodge auditorium, Grand Forks.

During the past three years, Martens and Ramsay have traveled to every county in North Dakota and have photographed more than 2,000 buildings. From that collection, they will select a representative sampling of images that are the basis of their analysis of North Dakota buildings as reflections of socio-cultural values and community heritage.

Martens and Ramsay are working on a book titled "Buildings of North Dakota," which is being developed along a four-year timeline, with publication currently projected for 2005. It is a part of the Buildings of the United States series co-sponsored by the Society of Architectural Historians and Oxford University Press. The 58-volume series is envisioned as the first, comprehensive, nationwide series of books examining the nation's architectural heritage.

Drawing on their experience with regional architecture, Martens and Ramsay recently completed a book chapter on "Great Plains Architecture," expected to be published by Greenwood Press in 2004.

Their work on "Buildings of North Dakota" has been presented to national and regional audiences at meetings of the Society of Architectural Historians and the American Institute of Architects North Dakota chapter. The Grand Forks presentation is intended to make their fieldwork better known to a statewide audience of historians and preservation activists.
