

## Scrapbook gives look at NDSU's past

A new exhibit on the NDSU Archives Web site offers a fascinating look at campus life in the 1920s, through the keepsakes of a student at the time.

Alumna Helen Barke, BS '25, who died in 2000 at age 97, kept a meticulous scrapbook of her many experiences during 1922-25 at what was then called the North Dakota Agricultural College. The pharmaceutical chemistry graduate kept numerous materials that have been scanned for display on the Web site.

The exhibit shows items related to her involvement in Kappa Delta sorority, Pharmacy Club, Inter-sorority Council, YWCA, Co-ed Prom and other campus activities. Included are 300-400 images from 72 pages of Barke's scrapbook.

"The scrapbook is filled with a wealth of information on what happened on campus during this period of time," said Michael Robinson, archivist, noting that the materials were donated to the university by Barke's nephew and his spouse, Christie and JoAnne Barke, Fargo. "The dances they had, the menus, the people who attended—this is just a wonderful picture of what campus was like all those years ago. It supplies a real connection between today and yesterday."

Barke was a pharmacist in Montana and Wyoming until 1934, followed by a lengthy career with the Federal Emergency Relief Administration in Montana. Later in life, she established an employment agency. An avid conservationist and fly fishing enthusiast, she also helped establish ZooMontana.

## Students conduct research in zero gravity

Three NDSU electrical engineering students have returned from the Johnson Space Center, Houston, where they conducted experiments on how the human heart reacts to a reduced gravity atmosphere.

During spring break, seniors Reese Weber, Corey Schwartz and Elisabeth Quistad participated in NASA's Reduced Gravity Student Flight Opportunities Program, which allows selected undergraduate teams to conduct an experiment of their choice in a reduced gravity environment. The NDSU group was one of 69 student teams selected to be part of this program out of 150 applicants.

The student program is part of NASA's Reduced Gravity Research Program that was started in 1959 to investigate human and hardware reactions to operating in a weightless environment. Originally only used by astronauts to support NASA missions, the weightless environment has more recently been made available to researchers in government, academic and commercial areas.

At Johnson Space Center, the reduced gravity environment is achieved by using a specially modified KC-135 turbojet transport, which flies parabolic arcs to produce weightless periods of 20-25 seconds. The student teams flew 60-80 minute flights for two consecutive days. During each flight they experienced approximately 30 zero-gravity parabolic maneuvers over the Gulf of Mexico.

Graduate student Jeff Wandler accompanied the student researchers on their nine-day trip to Houston, but did not participate in the experiments.

### Radiation safety, lab and chemical safety short courses scheduled

"Laboratory Use of Radioactive Material" is scheduled for 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Tuesday, April 13, in Thorson Maintenance Center's Green conference room.

The course is designed for new or potential users of radioactive materials in the laboratory or field applications. It also serves as a refresher course for those currently using radioactive materials.

Topics include basic theory of radioactivity, biological interactions with radiation, radiation protection, minimizing exposure level, rules and regulations, safe handling, decontamination and lab procedures. The instructor is William Diamanti, safety officer. Course fee is \$25 for NDSU and cooperative agreement institutions, and \$50 for all others.

In addition, a laboratory and chemical safety course is scheduled for 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Thursday, April 8, in the Memorial Union University Chamber.

The course is required for new laboratory workers, and serves as a refresher course for anyone working in laboratories.
