

Awards for engagement available

President Joseph A. Chapman has announced the availability of three awards designed to support and enhance the engagement of NDSU with Fargo and the state of North Dakota. Each award carries a stipend of up to \$20,000.

The Ozbun Economic Development Award was established to stimulate NDSU faculty to assist the state in the area of economic development. In recognition of the presidency of Jim Ozbun, award applicants must be a full-time faculty member at NDSU with the rank of assistant, associate or full professor, and be employed at NDSU when award payments are made.

Possible projects could be studying the impact of tourism relative to wildlife, fisheries and other related environment issues, water movement of Red River or work force evaluation of displaced farmers.

The Efficiency in Government Award sponsors studies to increase efficiency in state, county or city government in North Dakota. Applicants should partner with individuals in government.

Individuals or entities from NDSU or outside of NDSU may make proposals and receive funding. Proposals are restricted to projects within the State of North Dakota; and all funds are to be spent in North Dakota. Possible projects could be to study ways to obtain better results from economic development funds or extension pilot studies.

The Community Projects Award sponsors studies for community betterment in areas of social concern such as MADD, crime stoppers, graffiti removal or alcohol-related issues.

Individuals or entities from NDSU or outside of NDSU may make proposals and receive funding. Community projects are restricted to the City of Fargo.

To apply for the awards, submit a one-page proposal to the Office of the President by April 26.

NDSU publications win district silver 'Addy' awards

Publications by NDSU design staff were recognized with silver "Addy" awards by the American Advertising Federation District 8 in judging held March 12-13 in Appleton, Wis.

The NDSU Magazine received the award in the Product or Service Sales Presentation category, and a brochure designed for an architecture fundraiser mailing received the award in the Direct Marketing Flat Consumer, Single category.

Both entries received gold awards from the Fargo-Moorhead Advertising Federation, advancing them to the district competition.

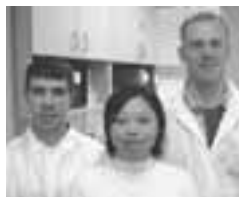
Jo Ann Miller, professor of music, was named president of the North Dakota American Choral Directors Association (ND-ACDA) at the association's annual state conference held recently in Jamestown, N.D.

As president, Miller will represent the six-state region of North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin and Nebraska. She also will serve on the national ACDA organization's leadership committee.

Founded in 1959, the American Choral Directors Association is a nonprofit music education organization intended to promote excellence in choral music through performance, composition, publication, research and teaching. In addition, ACDA strives through arts advocacy to elevate choral music's position in American society.

Miller has been the director of choral activities at NDSU since 1989. She received her undergraduate musical training at NDSU, has a master's degree from the University of North Dakota and a doctorate in choral conducting from the University of Cincinnati's College Conservatory of Music. A frequent clinician and conductor for festivals and workshops around the Midwest and Canada, Miller directs the NDSU Concert Choir and Women's Chorus and teaches classes in conducting and choral literature.

Huo article listed in chemistry journal's top 10

"Controlled Functionalization of Gold Nanoparticles Through a Solid Phase Synthesis Approach," a research article by Qun (Treen) Huo, assistant professor of polymers and coatings, was published in a recent issue of *Chemical Communication*. Co-authored by graduate students James G. Worden and Andrew W. Shaffer, the article

was listed as one of the journal's top 10 most accessed for February 2004, receiving approximately 500 hits on its online version during the month. The article also appears at www.facultyof1000.com.

The article describes a result of Huo's research using solid phase synthesis strategy to develop nanoparticle materials with a controlled number of chemical functional groups. Huo's research is currently supported by a National Science Foundation "CAREER" award.

According to Gordon Bierwagen, professor and chair of polymers and coatings, the project's success could lead to a significant and broad impact in the field of nanoscience and nanotechnology.

"I am extremely pleased that Treen's excellent work is being recognized by the rest of the scientific community," Bierwagen said. "She is directing and performing research in an extremely competitive area—nanomaterials and nanotechnology. With this and other high quality publications, she is making a definite name for herself, for this department and for NDSU among some real 'heavy hitters.'"

Pharmacy graduate students earn honors

Akanksha Gupta, doctoral student in pharmaceutical sciences, recently received a \$560 Graduate Student Travel Award from the American Society of Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics. Gupta will use the award to give a presentation at an experimental biology meeting scheduled for April 17-21 in Washington, D.C. Graduate student Hongmei Chen has been invited to present the poster "Health Disparities in Diabetes: Genetics and Therapeutic Applications" at the meeting.

Chang presents papers

Sam K.C. Chang, professor of cereal and food sciences and interim director of the NDSU Value-Added Food Processing Center, was invited to give a symposium speech on the "Influence of Storage on the Quality of Soybean" at the Seventh World Soybean Research Conference in conjunction with the Fourth International Soybean Processing and Utilization Conference in Foz do Iguassu, Brazil.

At the meeting, Chang reported significant changes in soybean biochemical components that lead to deterioration of food quality if soybean is stored under undesirable conditions. North Dakota has become one of the major soybean producing states in recent years.

Chang has been invited to give a lecture on the science and technology of tofu making at an international soy food symposium in May in Taiwan. He also has been invited to deliver a keynote speech at the annual Nutrition Society Convention in Taiwan. In addition, he has been invited to give speeches at two universities and to visit Taiwan soy food industries. The trip is sponsored by the American Soybean Association through Providence University in Taiwan.

According to Chang, soy has been found to contain bioactive ingredients for health promotion. He said soy milk and tofu are two major soy-based foods used in Asia for thousands of years that have gained a substantial market in Western countries.

Institute of Food Technologists (IFT) fellow Catharina Y.W. Ang is scheduled to visit NDSU April 13-15. Ang is a research chemist at the FDA National Center for Toxicological Research (NCTR), Jefferson, Ark.

While on campus, she will deliver a seminar titled "Challenges in Assessing Bioactive Botanical Ingredients in Functional Foods," set for 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 14, in Harris Hall room 11.

Ang has served in many positions at the IFT, including chair of the International Relations Committee and Fellows Affairs Committee, member of Constitution and Bylaws Committee and Awards Committee and chair of the International Division. She also was appointed chair of the AOACI Methods Committee on Drugs and Related Topics and served as a member of the editorial board of the Journal of Food Processing and Preservation.

Ang received a bachelor's degree in agricultural chemistry at National Taiwan University, a master's degree in food science at North Carolina State University and a doctorate at Michigan State University. Her recent research projects involve chemical characterization of active constituents of botanicals and development of efficient extraction and analytical methodologies for active components in dietary supplements and functional foods.

Italian class to be offered at NDSU

NDSU will offer "Italian for Beginners," a three-credit summer course May 18-June 11 that provides an introduction to the language and culture. According to Paul Homan, associate professor and chair of modern languages, this is first time in at least 15 years that an Italian class has been offered at NDSU.

Offered through NDSU's Departments of Modern Languages and Continuing Education, the course is designed for a variety of students, from the casual traveler to music or art enthusiast, or for persons who wish to begin to speak and understand the Italian language. The course focuses on grammar, writing and practical conversation, while also providing insight into Italy's history, dialects and diverse regions.

The instructor will be NDSU alumnus Michael Nelson, Fort Collins, Colo., who is a study abroad adviser with International Studies Abroad. Nelson received his formal training in Italian at Florence from the Centro Linguistico Dante Alighieri and the Universit-di Siena. He also spent an academic year as a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar at the University of Padua in northeastern Italy.

"It's easy to fall in love with one of the world's most beautiful languages," Nelson said. "At the same time, you're getting a taste of this amazing culture and history. I think anyone who has visited Italy can tell you why someone would want to learn Italian."
