# Aid sent to Bahamas hurricane victims

The NDSU athletics department and community members on Sept. 18 assisted with loading clothing and items to aid hurricane victims in the Bahamas. The items were expected to arrive in the Bahamas on Sept. 29.

Bellerud Trucking, Fargo, provided transportation, while Stone Container, Fargo, donated 500 cartons marked "NDSU Hurricane Relief." Many of the Bison athletic teams, including the men's and women's basketball, men's and women's track and field, and men's and women's soccer squads, assisted with collecting and loading the donated items.

Former Bison men's basketball player Ray McKenzie, a native of Nassau, Bahamas, contacted his former head coach and current NDSU associate athletic director Erv Inniger to ask if NDSU and the Fargo-Moorhead community could help persons in need. "The Fargo-Moorhead community has always come through during a time of need and has always stepped up to the plate to help others," said Inniger.

McKenzie will assist in the distribution of the donated items through the Red Cross and the Salvation Army in the Bahamas.

# Insurance open enrollment underway

Open enrollment for employees in the NDPERS health, life, dental, vision and long-term care insurance plans is available through Nov. 15.

Complete information and necessary forms are available on the NDPERS Web site at www.state.nd.us/ndpers. Forms also are available in the Office of Human Resources, Old Main 205. Change forms must be received in human resources by Monday, Nov. 15.

Life and long-term care coverage plans are effective upon completion of the necessary medical underwriting.

NDPERS also has announced increases in dental insurance premiums. Employee rates will increase from \$29.64 to \$32.56 per month, employee plus spouse rates will increase from \$57.09 to \$62.70 per month, employee plus children rates will increase from \$66.45 to \$73.02 per month and family rates will increase from \$93.90 to \$103.20 per month.

Health, dental and vision coverage will be effective Jan. 1, 2005, and dental and vision premiums will be withheld from Dec. 31 paychecks. Any plan-specific questions should be directed to NDPERS.

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# Policy updates listed

The following policies have recently been added or revised. The complete policies are available at www.ndsu.nodak.edu/policy.

## Policy 122—Payroll Checks-Distribution

• The revisions are based on board policy changes that reflect the change to payroll processes that took effect July 1. The changes are associated with the conversion to PeopleSoft.

#### Policy 135 — Family Medical Leave-Uncompensated

• The revisions are based on changes in board policy. They include a change in the calculation for determining FMLA eligibility, a change in the maximum length from 16 to 12 weeks and the addition of a requirement that the FMLA must conclude (rather than begin) within 12 months of the event.

## Policy143—Sick/Dependent Leave

• The revision is based on changes in board policy and affects the accrual method for sick leave. The new accrual is based on rate per hour at a rate equivalent to 12 days per year.

### Policy 212—Overtime

• The revision changes "will" in section 1.1 to "shall" to make the language consistent with NDUS Human Resource Policy, Section 12.3.

#### Policy 223—Reduction in Force

• The revisions are based on board policy, and they add the phrase "not on probation when" to sections 7 and 8 in order to make the policy more clear.

#### Policy 332—Assessment of Courses and Instruction

• The revision reflects action that was taken by the University Senate some time ago, but never was added to the official policy. The change provides for formative assessment by peers, as well as students, and includes other minor editorial changes.

## Policy 339—Communication Proficiency

• The revision reflects an editorial change approved some time ago by the Graduate Council but not added to the official policy until now (see section 2.2.2.1).

## Policy 350.3—Board Regulations on Non-renewal; Termination or Dismissal of Academic Staff

• The revision adds NDSU interpretation in italics to section 5 to indicate that generally accepted professional ethics require prompt notice of resignation or retirement.

# Art quonsets to be razed

The NDSU building commonly called "the art quonsets" is scheduled to be demolished on Monday, Oct. 11. Constructed in 1948, the structure had served art, architecture and land-scape architecture students before the completion of NDSU Downtown, which opened this fall.

"This was originally a Naval Reserve Armory," explained Bruce Frantz, Facilities Management director, noting that there was a decommissioning ceremony earlier this fall for the building. "The quonsets served the campus well for about 50 years, but now that NDSU is moving to the next level, they are just not compatible with the next level."

The structure, which is 140 feet by 120 feet, was built to house the Naval Reserve headquarters for the Fargo division. The quonsets contained offices and training facilities, including the deep-sea program.

According to the NDSU Archives, it is uncertain when the Navy moved its headquarters, but in 1990, the armory was renamed the Art Building. In the years before its demise, it housed the art department, a student art gallery, an architecture studio and the archaeology laboratory.

The demolition contractor is Northern Improvement Co., Fargo.

The new NDSU Downtown, a \$10 million facility, is the former Northern School Supply building. Located at 650 NP Ave. in Fargo's downtown, it houses the university's visual arts department, major components of the architecture and landscape architecture department and the Tri-College University office.

The 75,800-square foot NDSU Downtown is a five-story facility that includes studios, classrooms, a wood shop, digital media room, gallery and sculpture area.

# Entrepreneur scholarships awarded

Five freshmen have been awarded new scholarships established to attract young entrepreneurs to NDSU. The NDSU Entrepreneurial Scholarships are \$2,000 for four years.

This year's recipients, their hometowns and majors are Kaylee DeGraff, Maple Grove, Minn., animal science/pre-veterinary medicine; Seth Froyum, Zumbrota, Minn., mechanical engineering; Luke Keller, Mandan, N.D., animal science; David Larson, Andover, Minn., electrical engineering; and Jessica Ryant, Mahnomen, Minn., food science and biochemistry.

Recipients of the scholarships must maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 to remain eligible for the scholarships. They also must be active in the 5:01 Entrepreneur Society.

"I feel very honored to have been chosen as one of the recipients of the Entrepreneurial Scholarship," DeGraff said. "I am looking forward to being involved in the 5:01 Entrepreneurial Society. I am very excited to learn more about the society and have the opportunity to be involved with it."

Froyum said, "I feel honored to be one of students to receive the entrepreneurial scholarship, and I am excited about becoming involved in the 5:01 Society."

The scholarships are funded through an anonymous donation. Five scholarships will be awarded per year.

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# NDSU starts collegiate scholars chapter

NDSU has established a chapter of the National Society of Collegiate Scholars (NSCS). The NDSU chapter inducted 244 members at a convocation ceremony Sept. 26.

NSCS, a member of the Association of College Honor Society, is the nation's only interdisciplinary honors organization for first- and second-year college students. With 375,000 lifetime members in 205 chapters in 49 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, the society helps members with career objectives and provides leadership and service opportunities at the local, regional and national levels. Membership is by invitation only, based on grade point average.

"First and foremost, this is an academic scholars group," said Jeanne Hageman, associate professor of modern languages and chapter adviser. "The organization also combines scholarship, leadership and service. There's a program where they mentor junior high and high school students by helping them work toward the requirements they need for getting into college and teaching them the study habits needed for becoming scholars. That's a really good project for students of this caliber."

In the past 10 years, NSCS has given out \$400,000 in scholarships; had more than 500 members selected for the Teach for America Corps; and, in 2003, recorded more than 450,000 hours of community service.

"We're pleased to recognize the outstanding academic accomplishments of the students at NDSU," said Steve Loflin, NSCS executive director. "NDSU students now have the opportunity to join other high achieving college students across the United States in developing leadership skills and engaging in community service activities."

# NCI grain short course held

Crop buyers from 12 countries and four continents were at the Northern Crops Institute (NCI) Sept. 27-Oct. 6 to study the U.S. grain marketing system. They attended the "Grain Procurement Management for Importers" short course.

The 17 buyers came from China, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Italy, Latvia, Malta, Poland, Sweden, Trinidad, Turkey, USA and Yemen, and represented large and small food processing, feed manufacturing and trading companies that import HRS wheat, durum wheat, corn, soybeans, barley and other commodities. A number of the participants were sponsored by U.S. Wheat Associates or the USDA Foreign Agriculture Service Cochran Fellowship Program.

Pat Berglund, NCI director, said, "The course provides valuable information to assist international buyers in purchasing grain from our region. In addition, we include opportunities for contacts with major trading companies. This year, we also added speakers from specialty grain trading companies, as there is more interest in buying specific qualities and crops."

Among the study topics were the U.S. grain handling and transportation system, cash and futures markets, grain grading standards, commodity analysis, quality specifications, alternative sources, financing imports and the grain situation and outlook.

NCI supports regional agriculture and value-added processing by conducting technical education and services that expand and maintain domestic and international markets for northerngrown crops. People

#### **Horizon Award**

The Horizon Award is given in recognition of individuals who graduated from NDSU within the past 10 years and have distinguished themselves in their professional fields and/or service to their community.

The award recipient is Donald F. Brophy, who received a bachelor's degree in pharmacy in 1992, and a doctorate in pharmacy in 1994, both from NDSU. Currently an associate professor of pharmacy and internal medicine at Virginia Commonwealth University/Medical College of Virginia, Richmond, Brophy is recognized as an expert in nephrology pharmacotherapy. One of the youngest pharmacists to be elected fellow of the American College of Clinical Pharmacy, FCCP, has received VCU's pharmacy clinical teacher of the year award, and has several pieces in biomedical literature. He is board certified in pharmacotherapy.

Brophy completed post-doctoral residency training at The Ohio State University and Purdue University, where he specialized in internal medicine and nephrology.

## Heritage Award for Alumni Service

The Heritage Award for Alumni Service signifies outstanding volunteer service to NDSU.

The honoree is Nancy Johnson Jordheim, who graduated from NDSU in 1971 with a bachelor's degree in English and speech education. Jordheim also received a master's degree in education from Arizona State University, and a master's degree in guidance and counseling from Minnesota State University Moorhead.

Jordheim's career has included teaching, counseling and administration. She has been the Fargo Public Schools' assistant superintendent for human resources since 1995.

Currently serving on the NDSU Foundation board of trustees, Jordheim has been a member of the Alumni Center building committee, NDSU presidential search committee and the Alumni Association board of directors. She is involved with the National Association for School Personnel, the Society for Human Resource Management and the Teacher Education Accreditation Council. Her honors include the Warren E. Schull-North Dakota Student Council Adviser of the Year and the YWCA Woman of the Year in Education.

### Alumni Achievement awards

Alumni Achievement awards are given to alumni who have excelled in their chosen profession. Awards for 2004 go to Don Laskowski and Dr. Thomas P. Moyer.

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Laskowski received a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from NDSU in 1960. The founder of Wood-Mizer Products Inc., a woodworking equipment company, Laskowski holds several patents for woodworking equipment. His career began at Universal Electric Co, in Michigan, later joining Kooltronic Fan Co. and Emerson Electric Co. In 1973, Laskowski and his four teenage sons formed Gerbil City, a company that produced gerbil cages.

Wood-Mizer Products started with two employees in 1978 and grew to 650 employees over a span of 24 years. It includes six U.S., four Canadian and seven European locations, and numerous selling agents in more than 100 countries worldwide. Laskowski retired from active management in 1996.

His honors include the Ernst and Young Entrepreneur of the Year and Indiana's International Business Person of the Year. He is actively involved in mission work.

Moyer earned a doctoral degree in biochemistry from NDSU in 1977. He is a member of the medical staff in the department of laboratory medicine and pathology at the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minn. He also serves as chair for the division of clinic biochemistry and immunology, professor of laboratory medicine in the Mayo College of Medicine and director of the drug and pharmacogenomics laboratory.

Moyer's academic interests have focused on therapeutic drug monitorig and pharmacogenomics. He has developed and implemented 94 diagnostic laboratory tests and published more than 220 scientific articles, books and chapters on topics in laboratory medicine.

Moyer is president of the American Association for Clinical Chemistry, and is chair of its board of directors.

The McNair Scholars program was named after Ronald E. McNair, a member of the Challenger space shuttle crew.
