

State system sets enrollment record

Fall enrollment on the North Dakota University System's 11 campuses set a record. In addition, a separate report said more graduates are staying in the state.

According to the official enrollment count, a total of 42,414 full-time and part-time students were enrolled at the state's public colleges and universities, compared with 41,620 one year ago.

The Follow-Up Information on North Dakota Education and Training (FINDET) report said about 56.7 percent of 2002 college graduates remained in the state, an increase of 3.5 percent from the previous year.

"These numbers reflect several positive trends in our state," said chancellor Robert L. Potts. "The increased enrollment is a reflection of the quality of our programs and the responsiveness of our institutions, in spite of a lower number of North Dakota high school graduates. I believe the fact that more college and university graduates are staying in state is a reflection of North Dakota's increasing competitiveness and attractiveness to graduates."

ND WRRRI graduate research fellowship applications sought

The North Dakota Water Resources Research Institute (WRRRI) is accepting applications for its 2005 graduate research fellowship program.

NDSU and University of North Dakota graduate students who are conducting or planning research in water resources areas may apply for the fellowships. Fellowships vary in length from a three-month summer program to one year, with monthly stipends ranging from \$800-\$1,400. Fellowship funds must be used between March 2005 and February 2006.

Projects proposed for fellowship support should relate to water resources research issues in the state or region. Regional, state or local collaborations and co-funding proposals are encouraged.

NDSU nursing department receives monitoring equipment

NDSU's learning laboratory for nursing students has received state-of-the-art oxygen monitoring equipment and additional educational resources valued at more than \$5,000 from a national collaboration of two nursing associations and a leading healthcare technology manufacturer.

The American Association of Critical-Care Nurses (AACN) and the American Organization of Nurse Executives (AONE) partnered with Nellcor to donate advanced-technology Nellcor pulse oximeters and educational resources to 70 schools of nursing in 42 states, the District of Columbia and U.S. Virgin Islands. Each selected school also will have access Nellcor's field-based team of hospital clinical consultants.

Pulse oximeters are routinely used in critical care units and increasingly in many other patient care areas. Pulse oximeters offer a cost-effective way to measure a patient's heart rate and the amount of oxygen in the blood non-invasively, or without needing to pierce the skin.

"When students use the oximeter prior to encountering it in an actual patient care setting, their ability to understand its use is facilitated and their effective use of the instrument in assessment of patient status is enhanced," said Maggie Lee, assistant professor of nursing. "We are very grateful that we have the oximeter to use as a teaching tool."

The AACN is the largest specialty nursing organization in the world, with approximately 65,000 members. The AONE was founded in 1967, and is a national organization of more than 4,500 nurses who design, facilitate and manage care. Its mission is to represent nurse leaders who improve healthcare. Nellcor is a business unit of Tyco Healthcare.

Pharmacy, nursing scholarships exceed \$200,000

More than \$214,000 in scholarships was presented to 177 pharmacy and nursing students at the College of Pharmacy's annual student recognition awards ceremony held Sept. 23.

Held in conjunction with the college's pharmacy and nursing career fair, the program brings together students, faculty, staff, parents and donors to recognize scholarship recipients' academic achievements and to thank donors for their support.

According to Charles Peterson, dean of pharmacy, scholarship dollars grew more than \$81,000 from last year's total, and had an increase of approximately 50 awards.

"This year we had unprecedented growth in scholarship dollars awarded to students," Peterson said. "Our program has grown from \$38,200 in 1996, to its current level of \$214,000."

Peterson added that during the last eight years, the number of scholarships awarded has increased by 114 students.

"I am excited about the progress we have made in providing financial assistance to our students," Peterson said. "Hopefully, we can keep the momentum going in the years ahead."

Approximately 60 exhibitors from all areas of pharmacy and nursing professional practice participated in the career fair.

Ethics institute to host 'Patriot Act' forum

The Northern Plains Ethics Institute is scheduled to host "The Patriot Act and Its Ramifications: A Panel Discussion" at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 17, in the Memorial Union's Century Theater. It will be the institute's inaugural public forum.

Panelists will be Judge Kermit Bye, Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals; Andrew Conteh, Minnesota State University Moorhead professor of political science; David Rogness, Cass County Emergency Management director; Drew H. Wrigley, North Dakota U.S. Attorney; and Jack Zaleski, opinion page editor for The Forum newspaper.

Organizers say each panelist will give a 10-minute presentation about the controversial Patriot Act. Questions will then be taken from the audience.

"The institute has two theme questions: 'What kind of world do we want to live in?' and 'How do we get there?'" said John Helgeland, institute director and professor of history and religion. "The institute's questions lead to an understanding of ethics as a public concern and responsibility. Accordingly, the Patriot Act is a powerful piece of legislation that requires balance. In the broadest sense, the panel will address the issue of balance between the safety of the American people, on the one hand, and the maintenance of our civil liberties on the other."

The discussion is the first of a series of forums for the institute. A spring semester open forum is scheduled to be "The Ethics of Numbers."
