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
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### Introduction

MR. SALTY is a prediction program for crop yield reduction due to soil salinity (soluble salts). The program was developed by Dr. E.H. Vasey using one year's data collected in North Dakota by Dr. Alex Maianu.

There are over 1 million acres of saline soils in North Dakota.(3) These occur in all parts of the state. Most of the saline acres in North Dakota have been in existance for many years. Saline soil areas caused by seepage have been a growing concern in more recent years. (1,2,5)

The reclamation of highly saline soils usually is not practical under dryland farming conditions. (3,4) These soils probably are best suited for grassland use. Cost inputs toward reclamation hardly ever give paying returns on these types of saline soils.

Better management of slightly to moderately saline soils for dryland field crop production can improve yields, thus increase profits or at least reduce cost inputs for producers.

## **User's Guide**

To use MR. SALTY, when the computer is off place the diskette into drive A and turn on your system. If your system is on, insert the diskette into drive A and re-boot the system by simultaneously depressing the Ctrl and Alt keys, then press the Del key. The program will automatically load and run.

Screen 1 in MR. SALTY is introductory remarks. The screen provides information on what crops the program has data for, where the data for the prediction equations came from and a general outline of other information available in the program. Pressing any white-colored key will move the program to screen 2.

Screen 2 begins by asking for a field identification. This should be some name or symbol so that you can identify the field where the soil salinity readings or estimates were taken. Soil salinity estimates can be made using data contained in soil survey publications. The field identification can be any combination of letter, numbers and punctuation marks you desire up to 25 characters in length. If you try to enter more than 25 characters, the program will beep and truncate or cut off the attempted entry at 25 characters. After entering the field identification, the screen will prompt you for a soil salinity reading for the designated field. This reading should be obtained by the common laboratory method for estimating the soluble salt content of the soil, which is determining the electrical conductivity of a 1:1 soil-water suspension. This is the method used at the soil testing laboratory at North Dakota State

University. You can see this information plus some general soil salinity guidelines in the HELP function ([F1] key to this prompt.

Following input of the soil salinity reading or estimate, screen 2 will present the seven crops you presently have the option of using in the program. You may elect to see only one crop or may compare all seven crops and the yield reduction due to soil salinity on each.

To select a crop, enter its corresponding number from 1 to 7 and press the enter key. You will then be prompted for your normal yield of that crop. A check mark will appear to the left of the crop chosen to indicate it has been selected. When you have entered the desired crop or crops, you may see the results by striking the [F3] key. If you select all seven crops, the program will automatically move to screen 3. Additionally, you may abort (return to DOS) the program at any time during this prompt by depressing the [F2] key or use the HELP function by depressing the [F1] key.

Screen 3 will present a graphic display of the percent yield reduction you can expect at the selected salinity level in the given field. The left hand side of the graph will present the name of the crop and the expected normal yield you inputed into the program. Line 25 will display four options:

- [F1] Continue Program moves the program to the next series of screens and prompts.
- [F2] Printer sends the data to the printer. The data will not be in graphic form; you may obtain a copy of the screen in graphic form by using the PC's PrtSc (Print Screen) function.
- [F3] Stop abort the program and return to DOS.
- [F4] More Crops return to screen 2 and repeat the process as described in the paragraph above.

Electing to continue the program ([F1]) will present a prompt on guideline information on if cropping attempts are likely to be profitable. Answering "Y" will display the information. Responding "N" will present the next prompt concerning information on saline soil management. Responding "Y" to the saline soils management prompt will present Summary Comments and a prompt asking if you would like further details on any of the comments. If you respond "Y," you will be asked if you want a printed copy of comments. You must then enter "Y" or "N." You will then be prompted to give the number of the comment you desire further information on (a check mark will appear by the comment(s) selected). Striking the enter key will end this prompt and display the requested comments. If you plan to select more than four expanded comments then you should probably send the comments to the printer since the first comments may scroll off the screen. Responding "N" to the prompt regarding Summary Comments

will move the program onto the next screen pertaining to sources of additional information.

Continuing, you will be prompted to see a listing of sources of additional information. These are publications available to you to further assist in management of soil salinity problems.


The final prompt asks if you would like to see soil salinity figures for another field. Responding "Y" will return you to the field identification prompt (screen 2) and the program repeats itself from there, responding "N" returns you to DOS.
