The plan is part of the intensive war on tuberculosis begun recently in co-operation with the North Dakota Anti-Tuberculosis association. In making the announcement, Dr. Smith expressed the hope that everyone eligible would take advantage of this spe-

The process will take only a few moments of each person's time, it is pointed out, as the most up-to-date mobile equipment using 70 mm. film will be employed for the task.

The film can photograph through clothing and the equipment is capable of handling 100 persons an hour.

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#### Union Now?

When an editorial writer proposed in a recent issue of the Spectrum that a Student Union building be erected on this campus, he was posing a red hot issue. While opponents of the whole project are in the minority, interested students, faculty members and former Aggies are divided into two definite camps on methods of securing a building. Let's get down to issues:

First of all, the proposed union will be more than a dance hall and a couple of pool tables. Such a structure, to fill the needs of this college would include an auditorium and several lounges for seminar rooms. These rooms, by providing not only a space for classes of all kinds to hold special discussions, but also would fill a gaping hole in the present educational program

Supporters of the program have formed two distinct factions:

1. One group goes along with President Eversull in his announced suggestion that the YMCA building be rebuilt to house the Union. group is of course strongly opposed by the members of the three sororities who are now using that building as a meeting place. A further objection to using the "Y" is that the building, having been endowed for the use of that organization, must remain a YMCA building, ethically.

2. The other camp advocates the building of a "modest edifice" exclusively for Student Union purposes.

This could be accomplished through one of three methods: student subscription, through an increase in the quarterly fees, an appropriation from the state legislature, or through a combina-

tion of the two methods.
What's the solution? We can take the suggestion of one militant nucleus of veteran students who are supporting the proposal to construct some fellas handy with hammer an entirely new building. The building would be used as a dormitory for the duration of the housing emregency, being converted into a Student Un-

The advice of this group is: "Write your state representative, or contact him personally. Let him know that a militant and intelligent student body at NDAC has recognized the need for a Student Union.

#### Painter Attends Chemical Society Convention Today

Dr. Edgar Painter, agricultural chemist and professor of biochemistry at NDAC, will have presented three technical papers when the 109th spring meeting of the American Chemical society being held this week in Atlantic City, N. J., closes tonight.

On Tuesday, Dr. Painter addressed the division of agricultural and food chemistry on the subject of nitrogenous constituents of flaxseed. III. On the separation of protein from flaxseed. His paper dealt with methods of removing the protein fraction from the rest of the meal.

Speaking before the division of biological chemistry today, Dr. Painter will present two papers on selenium discussing progress which has been made on the chemical nature of the selenium compounds in plants.

Dr. Painter came to the chemistry department, N. D. Experiment station, NDAC, in 1940. He received his Bachelor's and Master's degrees at South Dakota State college and his Ph. D. in chemistry at the University of Minnesota. Aside from local publications, he has had one or more papers published in 14 different scientific journals
