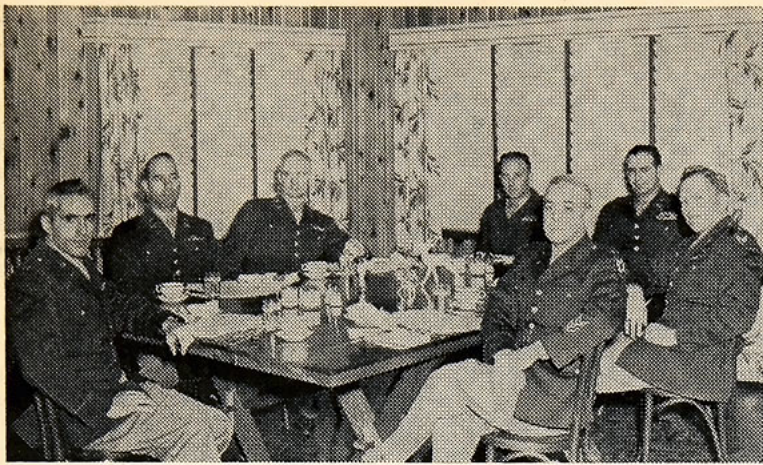


Army Surveys Campus In Anticipation Of ROTC Expansion

Here this week to conduct a survey of the campus in anticipation of expanding the ROTC department was a board of officers from the Seventh Service Command Headquarters at Omaha. The facilities of the institution were investigated in view of their possible use to accommodate ROTC units in several arms and services. "The units considered acceptable by the college include air corps, armored force, cavalry and an enlarged infantry unit," Dean C. A. Sevrinson declared. Conferences were held with Dean Sevrinson and Erling Thorsen, superintendent of buildings and grounds, concerning available classroom space, storage room for heavy equipment, barns for horses and maneuvering areas for such equipment. Col. Zeck indicated that the board was favorably impressed with the setup here as a whole. He was particularly pleased with the easy accessi-

bility of the airport to the campus. "This survey was purely a preliminary matter. No commitments have been made by either the college or the war department," Sevrinson emphasized. "The boards visit here was part of general inspection of all the colleges in the Seventh Service Command for an overall plan of expansion," Sevrinson said. The group was headed by Co. Luke D. Zeck, General Staff Corps, and included Col. Wray B. Avera, Field Artillery; Lt. Col. Paul Johnson, Air Corps; Lt. Col. Kishnar, Armored Force, and Maj. Carl L. Killian of the Air Corps. The group left here by plane for Brookings, S. D. to visit the South Dakota State College. Upon concluding the survey Col. Zeck will report his findings to the War Department. No immediate action may be expected on the matter.

'Skin Of Our Teeth' Set For January 31 By LCT

"The Skin of Our Teeth" is a modern, symbolic play by Thornton Wilder which will be presented January 31 by an all-college cast. Briefly, the story of the play is described as follows: "Here is a comedy about George Antrabus, his wife and two children, all of Excelsior, New Jersey. George Antrabus is John Doe or George Spavin or you — the average American at grips with his destiny, sometimes sour, sometimes sweet. Alternately bewitched, befuddled and becalmed, they are

the stuff of which heroes are made—heroes and buffoons. They are the true off-spring of Adam and Eve, victims of all the ills that flesh is heir to. They have survived a thousand calamities by the skin of their teeth. Here is a tribute to their indestructibility." Smith Confirms ROTC Allowance

"Under a recent war department circular, immediately effective, all veterans enrolled in advanced ROTC will receive a monetary allowance in addition to benefits authorized by the Serviceman's Readjustment Act of 1944," Capt. Irving L. Smith, head of the NDAC Military department announced Monday. "This means that any veteran in college under the GI Bill will receive an additional check each month during the school year. In addition, expenses to and from summer camp plus an increased allowance for camp duty will be furnished by the government," Smith explained. "A clarification of this matter has been the subject of much concern among many veterans interested in taking the course," Smith said. "Another revision in the advanced course permits students to delay the first six weeks summer camp until the end of their second year in the program, thus consolidating the two six-week camp periods into one of three months duration," Smith revealed.

Bill Krivosha will be general chairman. Assisting him with the publicity work are Elizabeth Christian, Marilyn Roovaart, Beverly Erickson, Syretta Hoffman. Admission will be under the direction of Peter Fog and Don Knott. Melba Maston, Verna Grage, and Wilma Taylor are the general assistants to all of the committees. Chaperons will be Mr. and Mrs. Hardaway. Also on the schedule for the Independent Students is an Open House Monday, January 14 from 6:30 to 10:00 p.m. at the YMCA. Special arrangements are being made to entertain all who wish to attend.

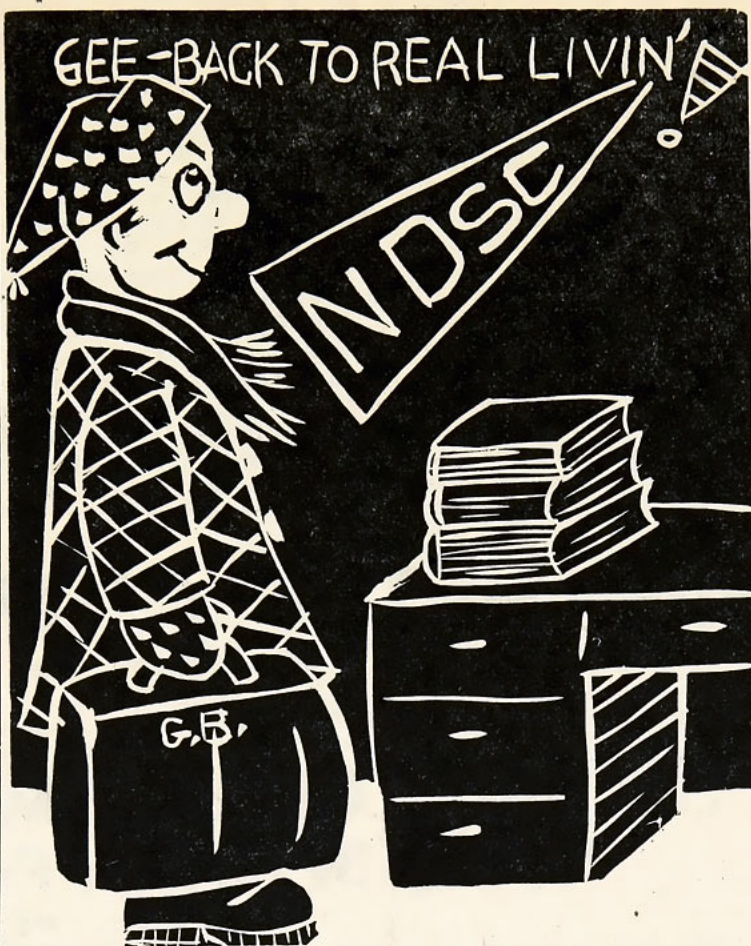

Bison To Face Cobbers Here

Looking for its second win of the season over Concordia college's Cobbers, NDAC's Bison basketball team will face the Moorhead quintet Tuesday night at 8 on the fieldhouse floor.

Coach Bob Lowe's team previously scored a 41-35 triumph over the Cobbers on the Moorhead junior high school court.

Since that time, Concordia has piled up two victories over its inter-city rival, MSTC's Dragons, and was victorious in a four-team invitational tournament held by the University of North Dakota at Grand Forks. The Cobbers eked out a one point win over the Sioux in the tourney's finale.

On the following night, Wednesday, the Herd will entertain a member of the North Dakota Intercollegiate conference when they tangle with Valley City State Teachers college on the fieldhouse hardwood. The Valley City quintet also was included in the roster of teams participating in the Sioux meet at Grand Forks, losing to Concordia in the opening round.

Facing Minnesota's tall Gopher squad on Dec. 29, the Green and Yellow team made a contest of it throughout although the height and experience of the Gophers proved too much for the Bison in the end and Coach Dave Mac-

Millan's Big Ten contenders won, 69-46. The Herd constantly pushed the winners and at halftime the Gophers were only out in front by a 33-26 count. Marvel Deike paced the Bison both offensively and defensively with fifteen points and a fine floor game throughout the contest.

Last weekend the Herd journeyed to Bozeman, Mont., for a two-game series Jan. 4 and 5 with the Montana State Bobcats. The western team won the opener, 63-53, but NDAC came back to win the second contest, 54-44.

Dick Hilden was the big gun in the Bison attack the first night when he dropped in six from the floor and five gift shots. Deike and Bruce Warner played fine

floor games as well as adding their share to the Herd's final score.

Deike and Dennis Drews teamed up in the second fray to tally more than half of the NDAC total. Deike managed to get 16 counters while Drews was right behind him with 15 points on seven field goals and a single free throw.
