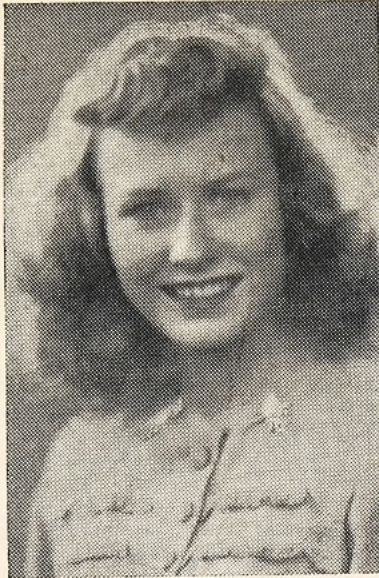
Board Announces Spectrum And Bison Heads

Adelaide is Rushing Chairman and Scholarship Chairman of Kappa Kappa Gamma. She is also a member of the Board of Publica-

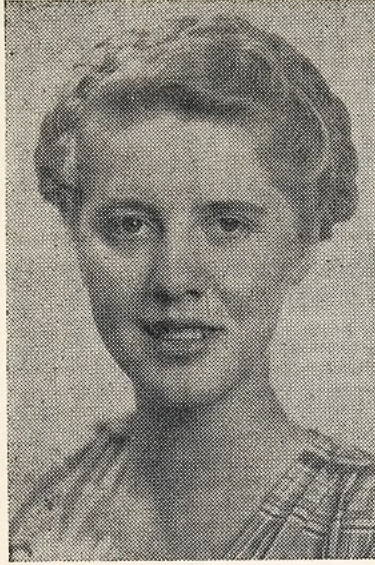

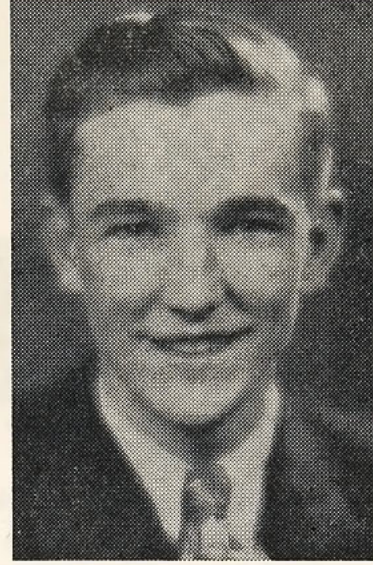

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Blue Bombers Defeat Bison 27-0 In Game At Winnipeg

The NDAC Bison lost a bitter struggle to the Winnipeg's semi-pro Blue Bombers last Friday night at Winnipeg by the score of 27 to 0. The Bombers scored early in the first quarter by two passes caught by Mulvey, which brought the ball down to the six-yard stripe. Frank Mather, the star of the Blue Bombers, plunged over for a touchdown. The kick was wide and the score was 6 to 0 in favor of the Bombers. Then the Bison took over and staged a 91-yard march down the field with Ottelle gaining consistently for ten or fifteen yards and Warner passing the ball beautifully to McCoy for 20 yards. The Herd then tried a pass in the end zone and it was intercepted and run back to the 18-yard line. The rest of that half of the game saw-sawed back and forth with neither team scoring. Bruce Warner, starring for the Bison, and Frank Mather for the Bombers.

The second half of the game was played by rugby rules and the Canadians out-played the Herd who never played rugby before while the Bombers had played both football and rugby. With rugby being practically the opposite of football, the Bison were so befuddled that the boys didn't realize that 21 points were scored against them until the end of the game.

The Bombers being a much big-

ger club kept swarming in one substitute after the other and finally had a total of 42 substitutes which gave a decided advantage of having fresh players every few minutes.

The much more older and experienced Bombers had a hard time with the right side of the Bison line and failed to crack it with great credit going to McCoy, Paliseno, and Christianson. The Bombers admitted after the game that the right side of the line was almost invincible.

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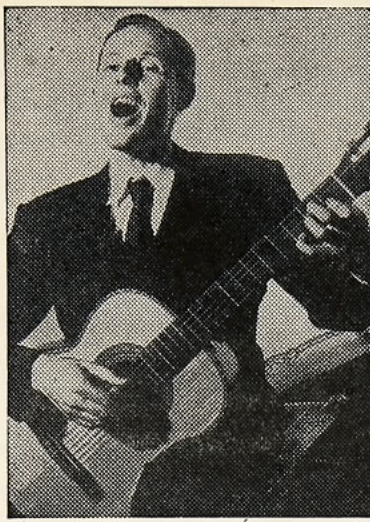
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A. G. Arvold Announces 35th Annual Lyceum
