In his address, the President pointed out that in this great new era whose beginning was marked by the end of World War II, unlimited opportunities and challenges await us. We, the youth of America, must discover progress in social, economic, and moral standards to combat intolerance and selfish isolationism. He indicated that we, the students of NDAC, must put away little bigotries and differences, and become united in a common loyalty and in a common program; that we must discover our place in the new order which includes all peoples and nations. In this, the age of the atomic bomb, we must rediscover America.

Improved Conditions Bring Increased Enrollment

With conditions getting almost back to normal, the NDAC registered 712 students for its fall term. This is almost a hundred per cent increase over the registration during some of the terms last year. It is with interest that the fact is noted that the ratio to men and women is now one to one on the campus. This is a change from the ratio of four to one. In some of the classes it was as high as eight men to one woman.

The Freshman enrollment is 382, 225 men and 157 women. The Sophomores number 162 with 52 men and 110 women. Nineteen men and 66 women make the total of 85 for the Junior class. The Seniors number 78 with 17 men and 61 women.

There are two special students this year. Both of them are men. The graduate students on the campus are three, one man and two women.

The School of Home Economics and Applied Arts and Sciences vie with one another for the large enrollment. Home Ec has 252 students and Applied Arts and Science has 214. Engineering School follows with 94 students. The enrollment in the other schools is as follows: Agriculture, 69; Chemistry, 25; Education, 8; and Pharmacy, 50.

Big Sisters Entertain

This year the Campus Big Sisters really showed their ability to "get there first with the most" in welcoming new girls to the campus. Many a freshman girl was set at ease by letters from her Big Sister explaining a few of the apparent intricacies of college entrance about which she, as a freshman, suffered many doubts and misgivings. Most of the new girls were met at trains and buses by their Sophomore Sisters, who escorted them to their rooming places, helped them become established there, and later sponsored a Get-Acquainted Party for them in the Log Cabin of Main Building. Campus Sisters also accompanied their charges to the All-College Luncheon and to the Sunday Breakfast.

The Big Sisters plan to continue their activities throughout the year, and will probably sponsor other entertainment for the new students.

Amphion Plans Winter Series

The 1945-46 Lyceum series has been announced by the Amphion Chorus of Fargo-Moorhead with Concordia and MSTC.

The opening number on Oct. 31, presents Richard Bonelli, Metropolitan opera Baritone. A musical version of Uncle Tom's Cabin will be given early in December. On January 8, Charles N. Lum and Kate Penzer Stakes will present impersonations of Shakespearean roles. March 23, brings the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra. In April, the Opollo Boys Choir will be heard.

Elliott Addresses NDAC Students

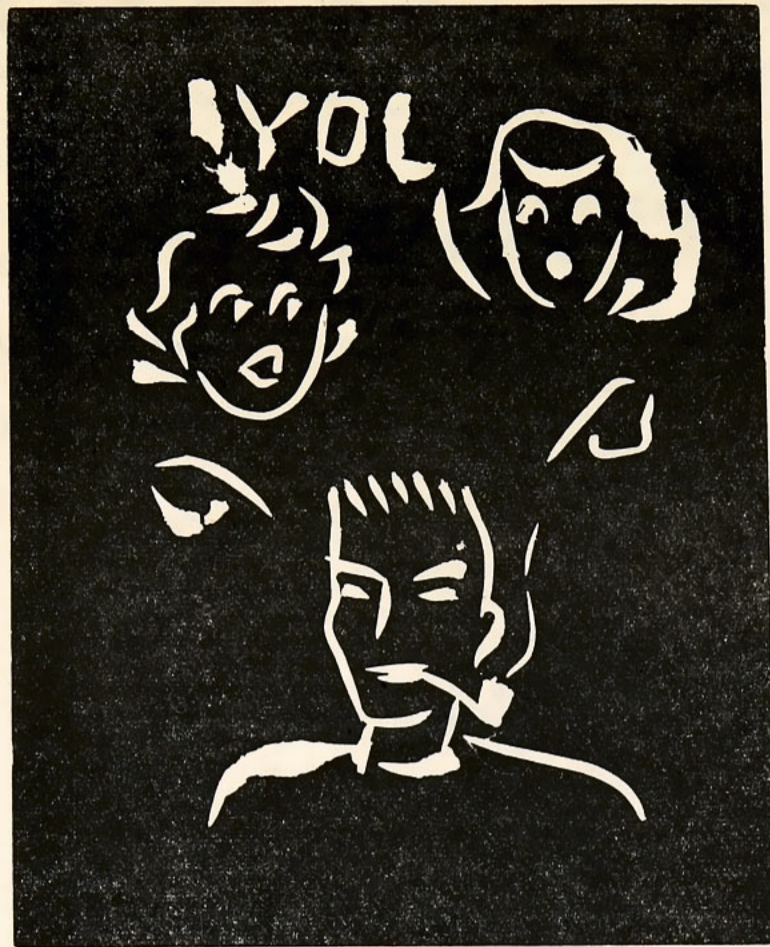

After a two year period of inactivity, the NDAC Bison again took to the gridiron Friday

night against the Bemidji Beavers at Bemidji. Although the Bison dropped their first encounter, they showed promise of a good season.

Sparked by their 230 pound full-back, Sid Nelson, the powerful Beavers outplayed the inexperienced Bison in the first half of the game. Midway in the second quarter Nelson scored the lone counter of the game from the 2 yard line. The kick for the point was no good.

The Bison came back strong in the second half to outplay the Beavers threatening to score several times when Bruce Warner's passes were snatched for long gains. The Lowe-coached Bison battled the Beavers on fairly even

terms throughout the game although Friday's engagement was the third start for the Beavers.

The starting line-up for the Bison were Don Hofmeister, Norman (Mons) Oftelie, Charles Diskens, Bruce Warner in the backfield. Linemen starters were Jerry McCoy and Dick Hanson at ends, Odmund Lervik and Dean Amsden at the tackle positions, Ricky Christianson and Joe Phelps as guards, and Jerry Bridgeford held down the center position. Other men who saw service and made good account of themselves were Jerry Shermoen, Curtis Halverson, Don Matson, Frank Sween, Eugene Holmes and Pat Vogel-sang. 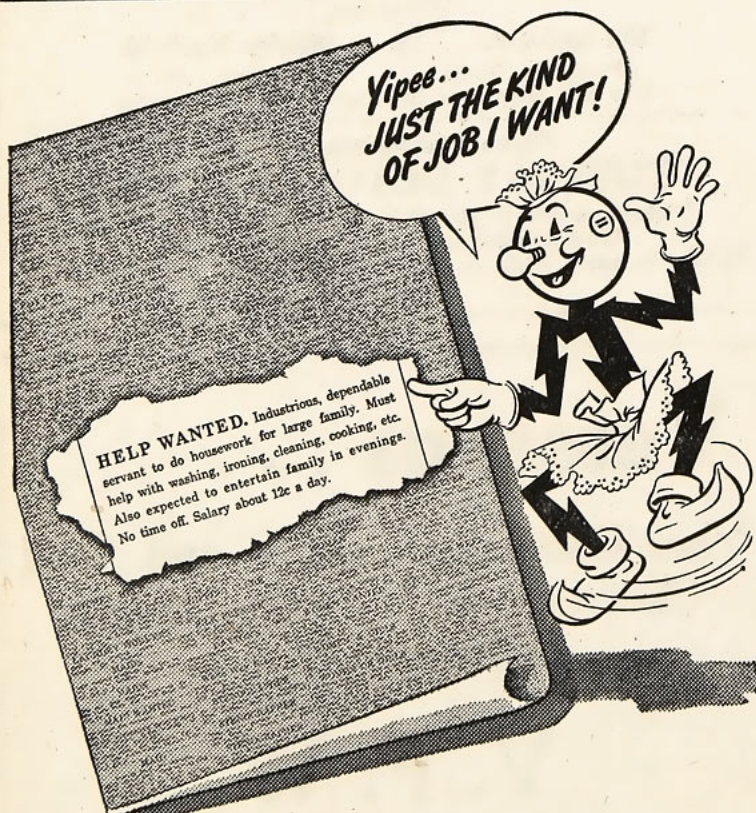
