Student Commission Elections May 15

The new Student Commission will be elected on Tuesday, May 15. Kay Huntley, Assistant Commissioner of Finance, is the hold-over member as Commissioner of Finance. The Commission is made up of seven other members-a president and a commissioner of each of the following organizations: Public Speaking, Elections, Publications, Social Affairs, and Assistant Commissioner of Finance.

Candidates for office must meet the requirements of eligibility published elsewhere in this article and file their applications with the Commissioner of Elections, Marian Stemme, by noon on Monday, May 1; or they may leave them at the Dean of Men's or Dean of Women's office.

Eligibility Requirements

Any student wishing to become a candidate for the Student Commission must meet the following eligibility requirements:

He or she must have carried in the previous quarter a minimum of 12 credit hours, and he must have secured a general average of 1.0 or above for that quarter. In order to establish this average, a student may be allowed not to exceed two weeks after the opening of the new term to make up incompletes. No student who is on probation shall be eligible for any such office. A student must also be carring a minimum of 12 credit hours during the current quarter. He must not be carrying excessive activity points. The present commission wishes to call attention to the fact that those running for places on the Commission should consider the fact that the work of the Student Commission can be carried on much more effectively if those who run for office plan to be in college at least until the end of

the winter quarter, 1946.
Elections will be made for the following on May 15: President of the Student Commission, who shall be at the time of his elec-tion in the last half of his junior year; Commissioner of Organizations, Commissioner of Elections, and Commissioner of Social Affairs, each of whom at the time of his or her election should be at least in the last half of the sophomore year; and the Assistant Commissioner of Finance, who at the time of election shall be in the last half of the sophomore year, and who shall have no vote until his second year, when he automatically becomes Commissioner of Finance with full voting privileges.

Fargo recently helped deliver a surprise one-two punch when Ninth air force B-26 Marauders bombed, then strafed the rail ROTC unit here and was called to yards at Butzback, Germany. He is a member of the 322nd bombardment group "Annihilators," which was awarded a Presidential Unit Citation for pioneer bombing techniques while flying more than 350 missions against Nazi targets. Lt. Humphrey's has flown 27 missions in Marauders and wears the Air Medal with four Oak Leaf Clusters. Prior to entering the army in February 1943, he was a student at NDAC.
