## Lt. Schollander Killed In France January 10

Second Lt. Donald Schollander, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Schollander, 815 Eleventh Ave. No., was killed January 10, in France, according to word received by his parents. He was serving with the infantry. He had left Dec. 7, to go overseas and had arrived in France Dec. 20. He was over just a little more than a month before his death.

A 1940 graduate of Fargo high school, Lt. Schollander attended the NDAC for two years and UND law school for two years before entering the service in June, 1943. He trained at Camp Roberts, Calif., and Fort Benning, Georgia, and received his commission there, before being assigned to Camp Adair, Oregon, for a time before going overseas.

When in high school, Lt. Schollander was active in Boy Scout work, and was president of the Trefoil club. He was an outstanding athlete, having been chosen on the "all star team" of the American Legion Junior Baseball team. Lt. Schollander was a member of Sigma Chi fraternity.

## Thorwaldson Dies In Action

Capt. Albert O. Thorwaldson, known as "Bud" when he was on the campus of the NDAC, died January 14 in a plane wreck in India. This word was received by his sister, Mrs. D. S. McArthur of Wahpeton, N. Dak.



At the time of his death Bud was with the China National Aviation Corporation as an officer flying war supplies over "the hump" to China. Thorwaldson had been over since September. Bud was formerly from Cavalier, N. Dak. He had worked at the Fargo Forum and WDAY.

No details of the wreck were received, but another sister, Mrs. A. C. Shafer, Jr., of Los Angeles, was informed that the body had been recovered and would be buried in an American Memorial cemetery in India.

### Member of Theta Chi

Bud was born March 2, 1918, at Cavalier, where he also attended high school. Then he came to the AC, where he was a member of Theta Chi fraternity and Blue Key. He was also on the staff of The Spectrum. He left Fargo in November, 1942, for Mather Field, Santa Anna, California, where he was a civilian flight instructor. Other places in the United States where he was stationed as an instructor were Monticello, Minnesota; Alexandria, Minnesota; and Visalia, California.

### Wife Dies

On May 20, 1943, Capt. Thorwaldson was married to Cathlyn Schabel who died the day after their child was born. The son, Kurt, is now with Mrs. Shafer at Los Angeles.

His other survivors are three sisters and a brother, Mrs. Gilman A. Strand, Glendale, Calif.; Mrs. Leonard R. Hannula, Huntington Park, Calif.; Miss Fredrica Thorwaldson, Huntington Park; and W. S. Thorwaldson, San Diego, Calif.

## Lt. T. Callinan Missing On Western Front

Word was received two days ago that Lt. Thomas Callinan, a former student at the NDAC, was missing in action "somewhere in France." Lt. Callinan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Callinan of 921 Eighth St. So., in Fargo. The date that Lt. Callinan was missing was Jan. 6. He has only been in the European sector for a short time. His arrival in England was just a few months ago. There he served with an infantry division. Lt. Callinan received his commission July 25, at Fort Benning, Georgia. Before his arrival in the European theater he was stationed at Camp Gruber, Oklahoma.

After completing his junior year at the NDAC, he enlisted in the service, April 2, 1943. He was originally at Camp Roberts, California, and from there went to OCS. Callinan was an Eagle Scout, and a member of Sigma Chi. He was also active in the field of dramatics and in sports, having received his Red Cross swimming instructor's certificate.

## Cook Returns To The States

Capt. Richard Cook, a former NDAC student, has just been reported back in the United States. His return is from a band of Filipino guerrillas with which he has been fighting ever since his release from a Jap prison camp.

Capt. Cook is now residing with his mother, Mrs. Willis Adams of Los Angeles, a former Fargoan. It was through one of Mrs. Adams' letters that word of Cook's arrival was received.

Mrs. Cook says, "He's well and seems the same as when he left, although he suffered much at the hands of the Japs." Capt. Cook went to the Philippines before the

war where he was stationed with native troops. Capt. Cook was one of the 83 Yanks who escaped when the Jap vessel he was on was sunk in September. He was wounded over the right eye at the time.

Capt. Cook received his commission through the ROTC of the NDAC. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in the School of Architecture. During his college days he was Business Manager of The Spectrum and a member of Sigma Chi.

Don Hofmeister is from Fargo, coming from Grand Forks where he started at Grand Forks high school. Don is a freshman and stands five foot, eleven inches while weighing in at 160 pounds. Don's usual position is a forward.

Holding down the forward position also is Vernon Strong, another Fargo product. Statistics show Vern to be 5 foot, 10 inches in height, and 140 pounds. Vernie is also a freshman.

Playing the center spot is freshman Don Murdahl who hails from Edinburg, North Dakota. Don is the tallest member of the civilians being 6 foot, 1½ and weighing 160 pounds.
