All New Features
All of the features in the library are the newest designed for construction of the modern library. Some of the new features are quite amazing to the older students at NDAC. There will be carrels for all research students. These carrels are special study desks designed for the intricate and painstaking work that is required by the research student. Also along that line there will be built cubicles for the faculty so that if extensive reading has to be done, it can be done in a quiet atmosphere conducive to study.

Another of the very modern features is the micro-film reading room where students can run off on the movie machine the film of information for what ever they are interested in—such as, if you are interested in some scientific slides you can go in, put them in the machine, sit there, and study them. There will also be a micro-film storage room in which all the valuable micro-films will be stored. This room will be scientifically regulated for temperature to preserve the film.

To Have Listening Rooms
Listening rooms for radio and victrola will also be present. That is one thing the college has needed for a long time—someplace where the history classes, etc., can go to hear election returns or other pertinent programs. This will be a great aid to the music department. And as you might expect, there will be reference rooms, browsing rooms, and seminar rooms.

The present library will not be forgotten in the middle of all this planning. Its main floor is to be turned into a museum. The bottom floor is to be turned over to Publications. In it will be the new

Jamestown jumped out in the lead after six minutes of the third period had elapsed and never relinquished it thereafter as they went on to lead 28-24 going into the final quarter.
