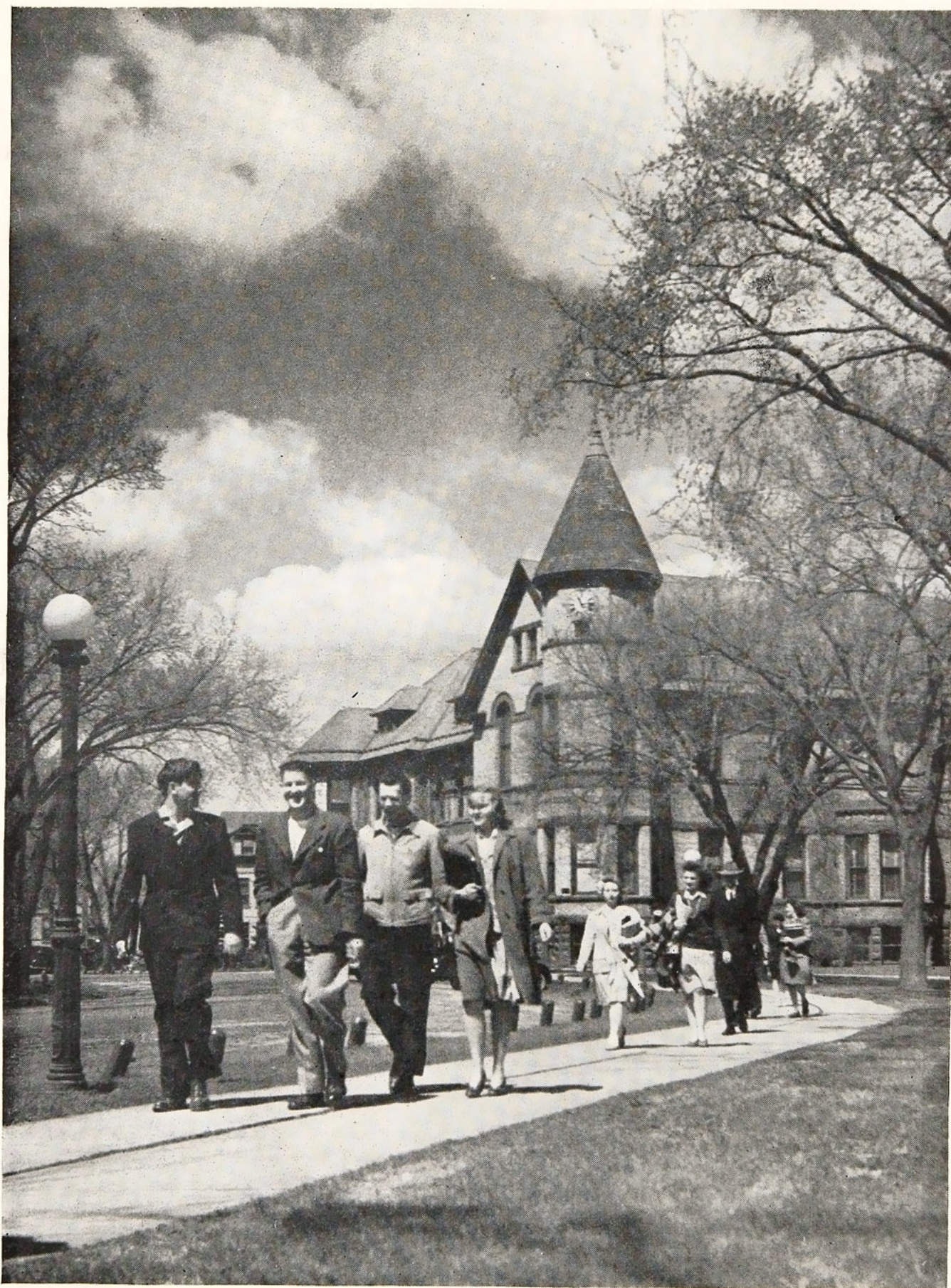


Spectrum Pictorial Review

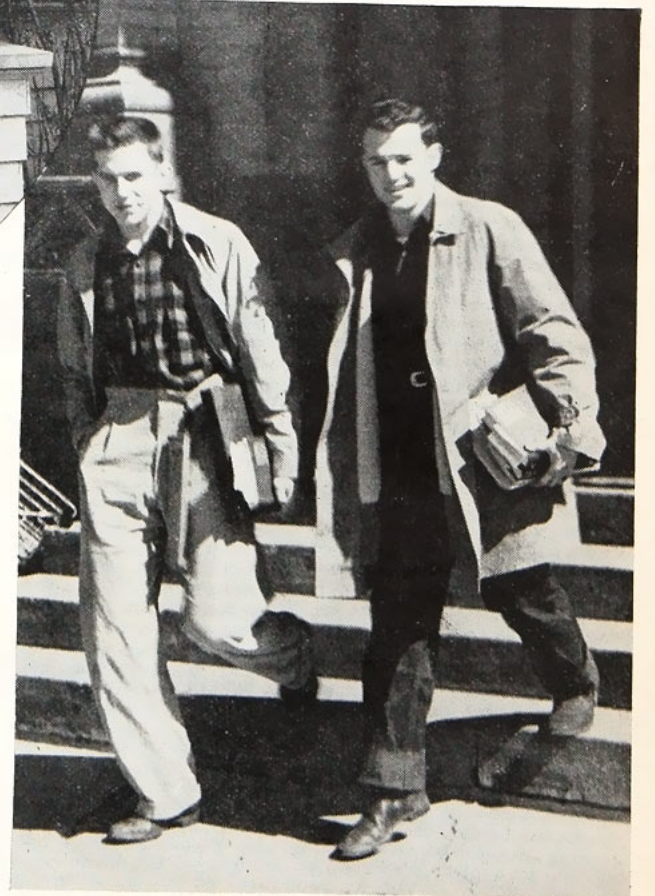

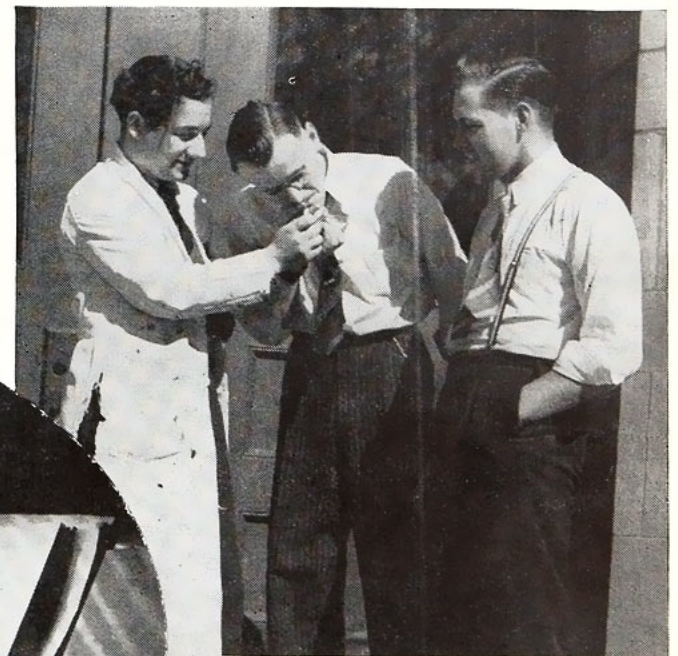

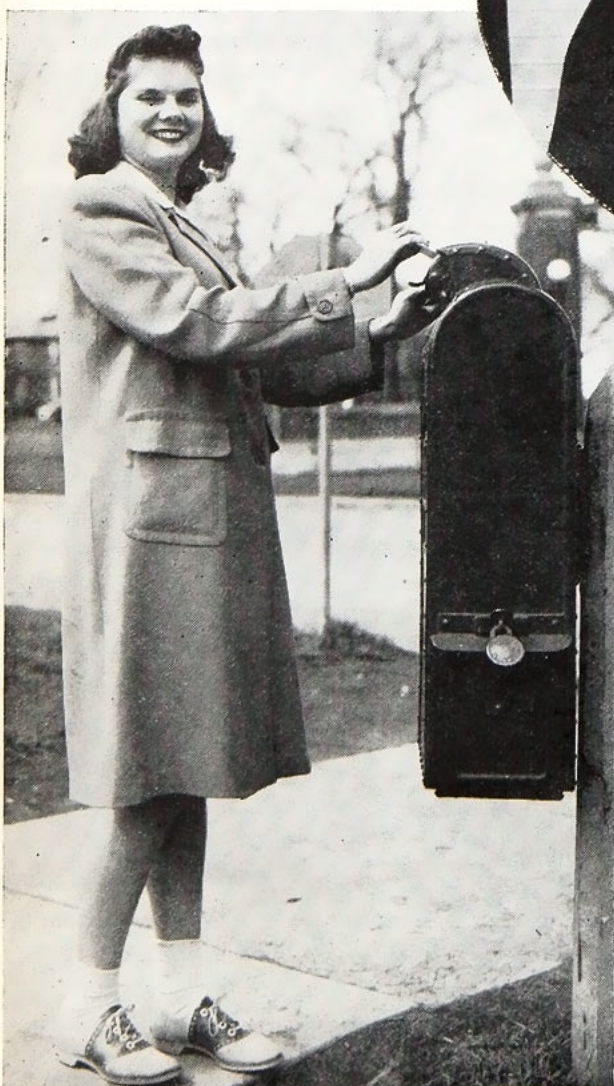

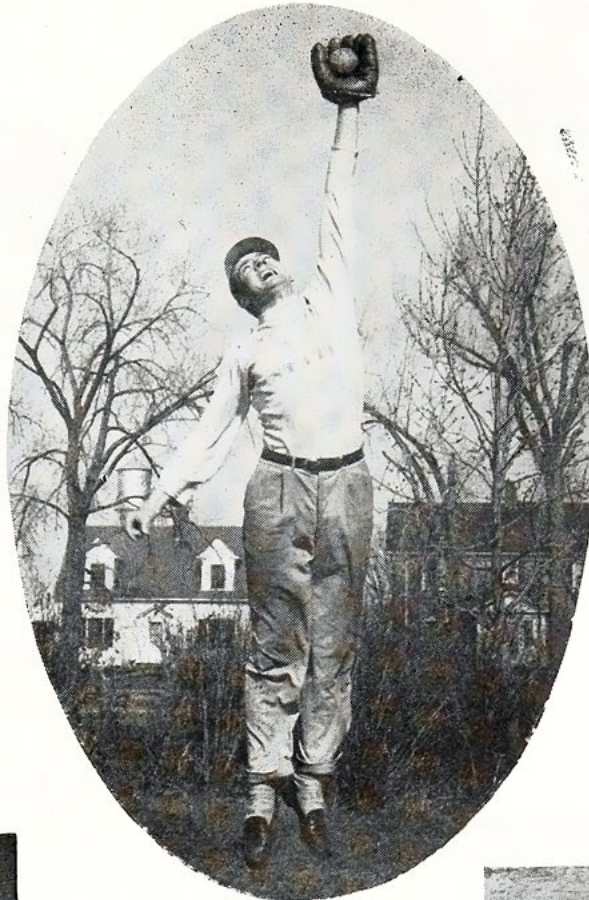

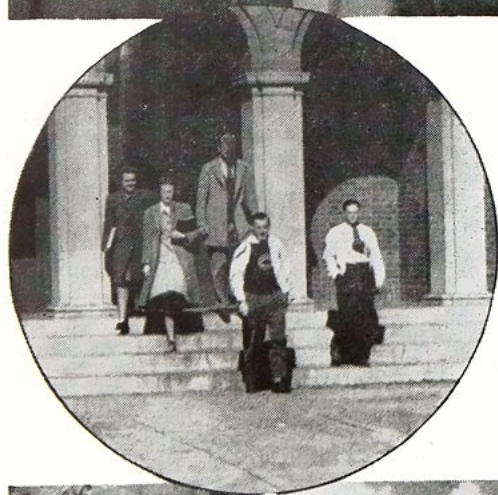

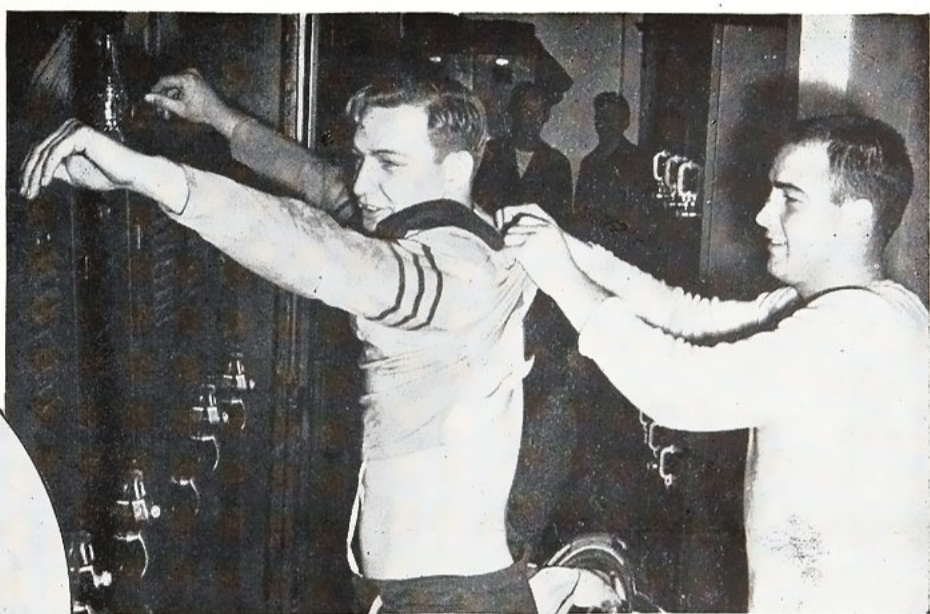

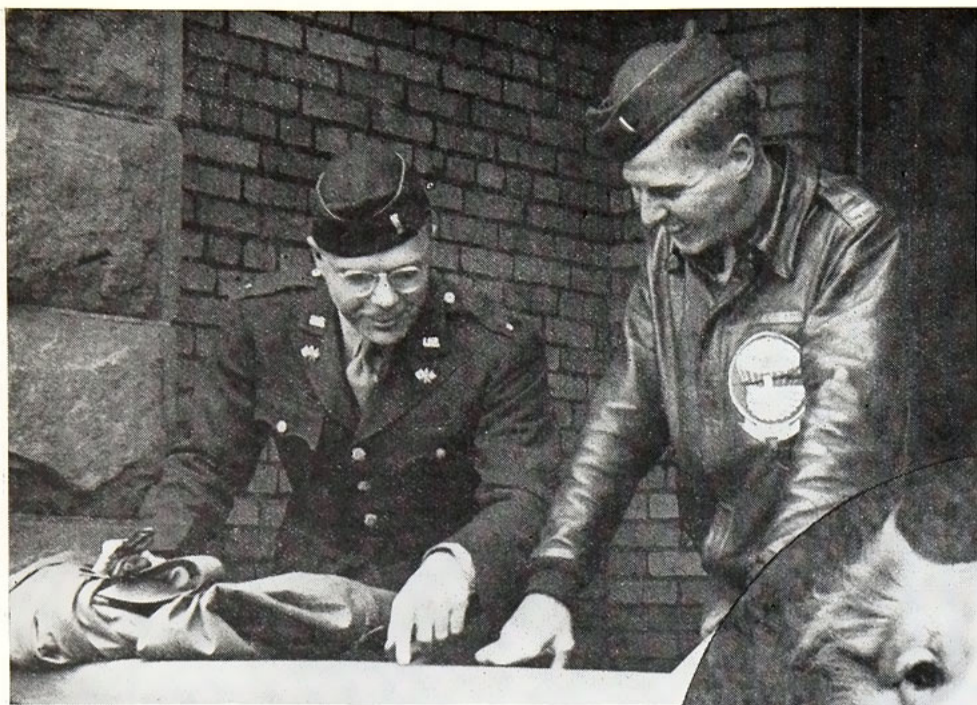

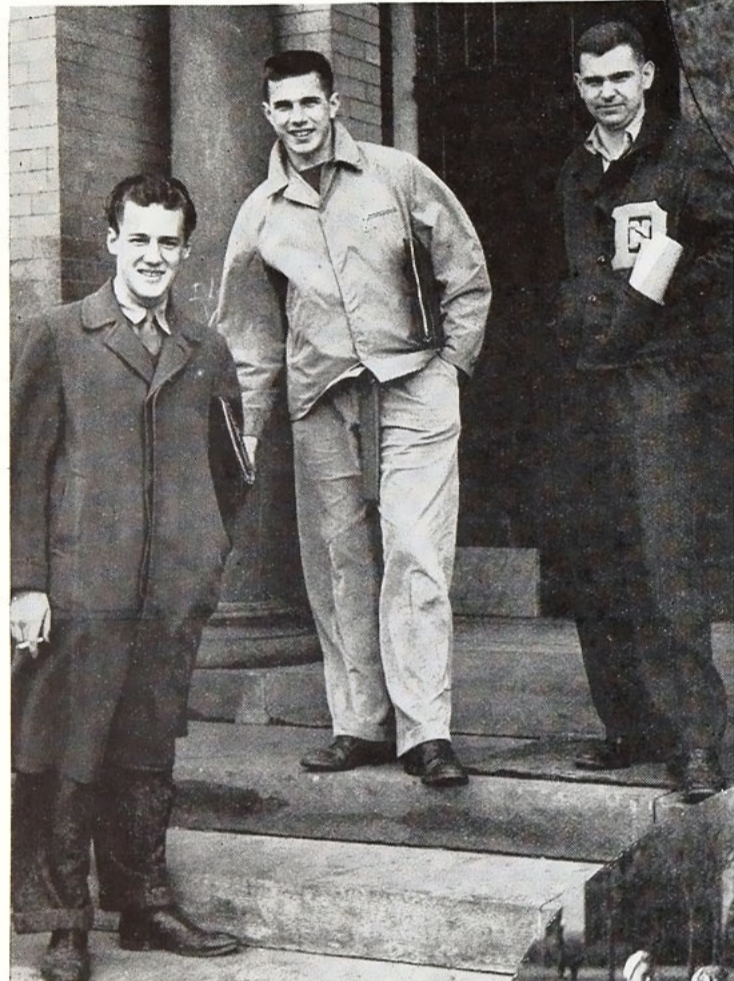
