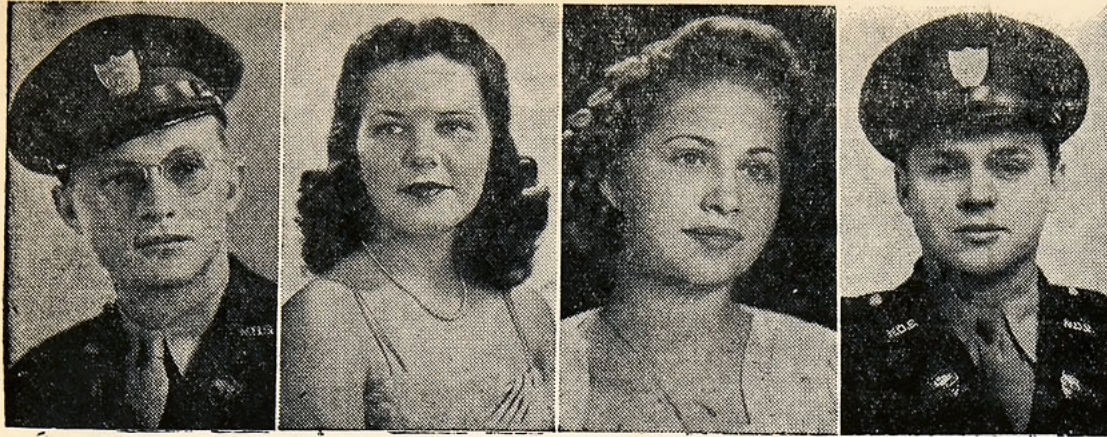


Saturday's Military Ball Leaders Army Engineer Students Expected Here April 5

ROTC Graduation Parade Tuesday

O'Brien Talks At Thursday's Convocation

The enormous contributions made by American medical men to the world's medicine kit were brought out by Dr. William A. O'Brien, Director of the Graduate School of Medicine of the University of Minnesota, when he spoke at convocation Thursday.

Dr. O'Brien stressed the avoidance of misconceptions concerning "most advertised cure-alls, quacks and all that junk."

"The stories behind the discovery of insulin and nutritional defects, especially the ragings of pellagra in the poverty stricken south, showed the advances made through methodical study and experimentation," he stated.

"The modern technique and treatment of shock in surgery is vividly shown in the work of the Russians," he declared.

The advent of sulfa drugs has brought new hope for the rapid treatment of infections and countless diseases.

"These and many other discoveries have been among the contributions of American medicine which will be of great importance to our soldiers on the bloody, disease-racked war fronts throughout the world," he added.

All Reserve Students Urged To Enroll For Spring Term

Students who are enlisted in the Army, Army Air Force, Navy V-1, V-5, and V-7 programs, and the Marine Corps are advised to register for the spring quarter during this week or next week.

No clarification of the possible date of call has been issued regarding the Army Enlisted Reserve Corps, Unassigned, and college authorities are unable to make any prediction as to when these men might expect to receive their call. Under the terms of their enlistment, students in this program are required to remain in school until they receive an official call to duty. A check of ERC students who are not enrolled is made on the first day of school and students not registered are reported to the Headquarters of the Seventh Service Command for the purpose of cancelling their deferment.

Indications are that the Navy specialized training program will not be in operation before July 1, 1943 and therefore, Navy V-1 and V-7 students will remain in college as civilian students for at least the spring quarter.

Navy V-5 students who have deferments until the end of the school year will not be called to duty until such deferments expire under present information available from the Navy. Students

who have enlisted under different deferment plans are obligated to fulfill requirements of such deferments.

A letter from Marine Corps headquarters states that the Marine Corps specialized training program probably will not go into

Glen Strom is in charge of general arrangements for the affair which will be held in the banquet room of the Gopher Grill.

Saturday evening he will address the Fargo Engineers' Club at their regular monthly meeting.

Colored motion pictures taken by Pehrson on the highway and showing the extreme difficulties which confronted the United States Army Corps of Engineers and the private contractors in building a road through the uncharted wilderness of British Columbia and Yukon Territory will be shown at both meetings. These pictures were only recently released to Pehrson by Army censors.

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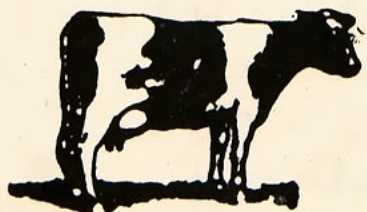
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Bison Cop Second In NCI As Sioux Fall Twice Here

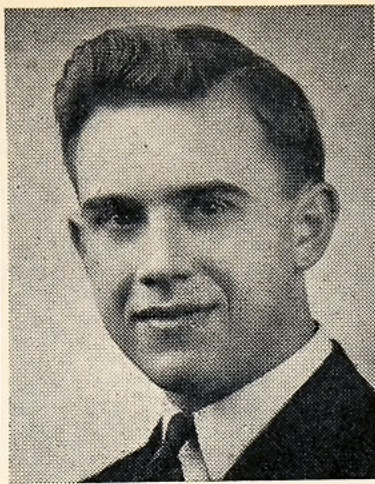
Betty Gage, president of the group, was chairman of the general arrangements with Leola Myhra in charge of the program and Betty Lynne in charge of the decorations.
