## Beverly Halbeisen Stars As Eliza In LCT's Production Of Pygmalion

"He's no right to take away my character, ah-e-o-ow" were words that will long remain in the minds of those who attended the Edwin Booth production in the LCT last night of George Bernard Shaw's Pygmalion. Beverly Halbeisen

portrayed the role of Eliza, the Cockney flower girl, a challenging part, but Miss Halbeisen met the situation with the grace and ease of a true artist. To use good timing, to never step out of character, to never overdo a part are the standards by which a good actress is judged—Miss Halbeisen had mastered them all. She managed the transition from the flower girl to the duchess with ease and stood out especially in the scene after the Duchess' party in which she had little conversation but portrayed her feelings almost entirely through her actions.

Ed Kasner as Higgins was consistently the unemotional phonetics teacher. The nonchalance with which he carried out his part in the scene after the party (and ate an apple at the same time) was remarkable. Philip Thompson as Mr. Doolittle added vitality to the role of Liza's affectionate father.

Stage manager Dave Haibeck deserves a compliment on his appropriate settings. They formed a perfect background for a perfect play.

The play progressed smoothly from the beginning to the end; however the timing in the last

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# Marine Reserve Plan Still Open To Collegians

Seventeen-year-old college students are still eligible to enlist in the Marine Corps reserve on an inactive status, for training after graduation leading to a second lieutenant's commission in the Corps.

This program will be open until March 15, according to Captain W. W. Gamwell, officer in charge of the Marine Corps office of officer procurement in Minneapolis, room 810 Roanoke Building.

Undergraduates 18 years of age or over are not eligible, he said.

The students must be taking an accelerated course—which means no summer vacation—with plans to graduate in three years, in order to qualify. Any choice of courses is acceptable except the ministry, medicine or dentistry.

Plan is to allow the students to remain in school until graduation, at which time they will be called for training in the candidates' class. Should the exigencies of the service so require, however, they may be called ahead of time. If so, they will still be called for officers' training.

So far, no students have been called ahead of graduation.

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# Bison, Nodaks Divide First Two Series Games

In games sparked by unusually close finishes, the Bison gained an even split in the first half of the annual UND-NDAC cage series played at Grand Forks last weekend. The Sioux triumphed, 39 to 38, Friday; the Herd won, 41 to 38, Saturday.

After holding period leads of 14-7, 18-16, and 30-25, in the first game the Sioux ound the Bison threatening midway in the fourth quarter when Bob Lowe's boys knotted the count at 34-all.

Nicky Schneider and Art Grannum put the Nodaks in front 36 to 34, but Bob Yeasley quickly put the Bison into a 38-36 lead. With the score tied at 38-all in the closing minutes, Dud Draxton, Sioux sophomore, netted a free throw to give the Nodaks their game-winning margin.

### BROSTROM EFFECTIVE

Red Brostrom, effective under the basket throughout, paced Bison scorers with 14 points. Russ Burfening had 12. Dan Polis accounted for 10 as well as performing sensationally on the floor.

Schneider and Bud Halliwell led their mates with 13 points each. Art Grannum had 8.

The Bison out-scored the winners 18 to 15 from the floor, but inability to connect at the free throw line spelled defeat. The Bison made but 4 gift tosses to 9 for the Nodaks.

### BISON LEAD

The Bison point-getters went to work early in the second game and jumped to a commanding 8-0 lead while the first quarter was yet young. Two baskets each by Russ Burfening and Dan Polis accounted for the scoring. The Herd held margins of 13-7 at the quarter, 28-18 at halftime, and 29-28 at the three-quarter mark. Burfening and Howie Rohs each had three fouls before the half.

The Bison slowed down considerably in the second half, and only after Coach Bob Lowe inserted Cliff Rothrock into the game did the State cagers revert to first half form.

Exceptional shooting by Howie Rohs kept the Bison in front as the Sioux second-half offensive became effective.

With 2 minutes, 10 seconds remaining, the Bison led 39 to 38.

The Nodaks threat was thwarted when Burfening hit the hoop with less than a minute to go to give the Bison their three-point margin.

Rohs topped the Bison in scoring with 13 points; Burfening had 11; Yeasley 7, Brostrom 6. Dan Polis stood out as a floor man and on defense.

Art Grannum led the Sioux with 14 points. Schneider followed with 8.

## Burfening Moves To Fifth Place In NCI Scoring

Russ Burfening, idle in NCI competition for two weeks, moved into fifth place in the individual scoring race last week with 81 points in 7 games.

Morningside's Bob Held continues to lead with 134 points in 9 games. Jim Schmidt of South Dakota State is second with 130 in 10 games.

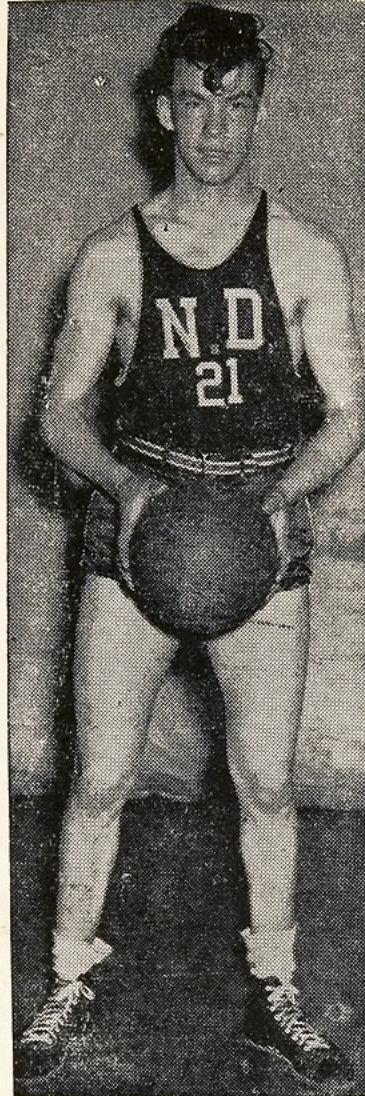
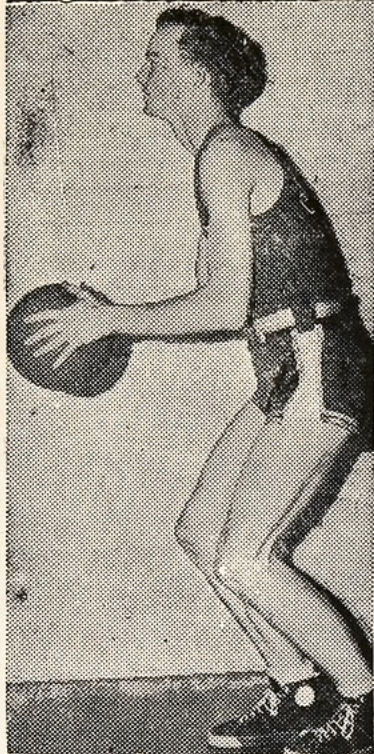

And don't forget the Spectrum-Dakota Student basketball game tomorrow at 6:45.

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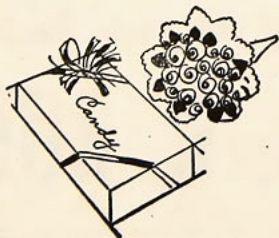
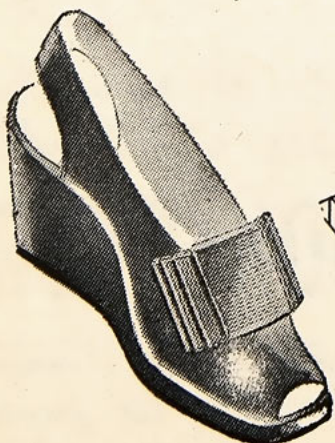
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### KKG Group Installs Doris Bjorklund As President
