Some of the student body feels that since no Bison will be forthcoming this year a part of the activity fee that would ordinarily be used for the vearbook should be returned to the students.

Sigmund Romberg, the noted composer, will appear in person next Tuesday in a special concert at 8:15 in Festival Hall. An evening with Sigmund Romberg will feature the perennially beloved melodies from all his operettas, films and plays. Tuesday's concert is a special attraction not included as a regular Lyceum number.

Along with Jerome Kern, George Gershwin and Victor Herbert, Romberg ranks among America's foremost composers of popular music and the public will be served a full measure of the tunes from Student Prince, Blossom Time, Desert Song, New Moon, and other works. 45-PIECE ORCHESTRA

Romberg will conduct a fortyfive piece orchestra. Soloists will be Marie Nash, soprano who has appeared in I'd Rather Be Right, Gene Marvey, tenor of American Jubilee, and Grace Panvini.

Other outstanding composers whose most popular works will be presented are Johann Strauss, Franz Schubert, Chopin, Delibes, Victor Herbert Fritz Kreisler, Albeniz and Lecouna.

One of the most famous of all Romberg compositions is the robust thrilling Stout Hearted Men from the operetta New Moon. Recently Romberg rewrote the original lyrics and turned the song over to the U.S. Navy. At present all royalties from the sale automatically become the property of the U.S. Navy Relief Fund. Student tickets for the concert are on sale in the Little Country Theater for fifty-five cents.

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


