Women in the WAAC are trained in and assigned to a wide range of interesting jobs. There are scores of jobs, from typing to driving trucks, which the Army feels women can do to release the men for combat duty.

If you join the WAAC you will lead an orderly, healthful life, and enjoy the companionship of other fine women. The adventure of new scenes, new friends and unusual experiences will appeal to you. The pay, with smart uniforms, clothing and all essentials included, is good.

(Ed. Note: The following is part of a letter received by Jean Monson, a freshman in Home Economics, from Marti Nakazawa, an American Japanese interned following Pearl Harbor. We print it with belief that the excerpts will be of interest and value to the student body.)

January 7

Slumberers in Jerome sleep soundly... It's early dawn but there is not a sound within the block... no sound of automobiles... footsteps or trees... not a sound of life. Winter has appointed clouds to take the glory once had by the sun... so the sun cannot drive its rays through barrack windows at dawn. The barrack windows are dark... and still.

Clang! Clang! Clang! "Oh no! Not morning so soon!" Slumberers turn over in their beds and relax feeling exhausted. Why is it we are always most sleepy just before rising?... We take deep breaths that will return us again to that dream or slumber... so peaceful and... Clang! Clang! Clang!

"That dooded it!" It's impossible to sleep with that horrible clanging of the bar on that old rusty iron rim! I stretch myself like a bored cat and sit straight up in my bed. Now... what's next? I think each day's program out here in bed before getting out... this helps to make my days run smoothly. Having decided I jump out of bed and see how fast I can dash to the washroom... the wash-room being in another barrack some seventy-five running steps from my door... Br r r r... seems like a mile!

I dash back and in 15 minutes I'm sitting at our family table in the mess hall. I've always thought our block mess hall had the cleanest tables, best food and the most super service and each day I am more convinced I am right. This morning we had pancakes and pork sausages and coffee. Just what I like! So, my day is started off on the right key and in good tune. Some mornings there is only

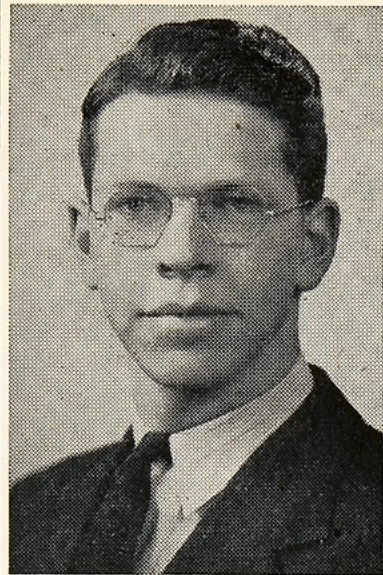

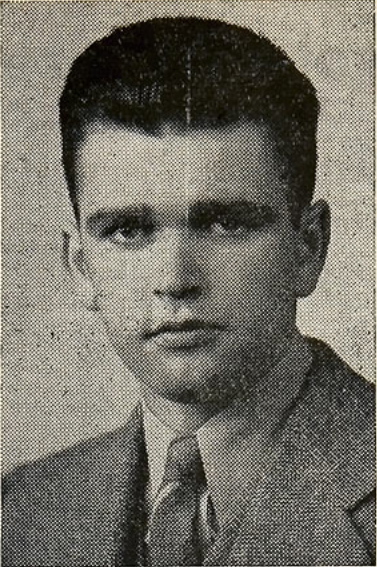

Now, if you can, please try to see our camp as a unit. One big center where the people don't talk about movies, chocolate malts or driving around. Where bridge and chess is played by night, songfests enjoyed by a full Recreation hall, and dances attract couples almost every week . . . Most of the girls who work at the Ad. building look like college co-eds and try to be as happy as they can . . . Where a boy not wearing a mackinaw is considered a non-worker . . . and a girl's wearing one . . . is "hot stuff." (Incidentally, these mackinaws look atrocious! Big black, fingertip coats of unmentionable material, and long!)

You must be glad you're not in Denson by now. This is no place for any decent person looking for a bright tomorrow. I have no alternative. You have. So be grateful you are free. When we Nesseis are again free, we want to build a greater and more sturdy democracy than the one that failed us on December, 1941 . . . Our talents, loyalty, and hopes are being wasted in here where we are burdening the defense program. We could help in so many ways. College graduates and professional men and women are washing dishes or chopping trees. Our lives are being cut off from national and world activities . . . We are striving hard

to make ourselves better able to fit into normal community life when this war is over . . . but we need your patience and kindness. Do be kind to any of us . . . you may see . . . when our tomorrow comes . . . this life has made us unhappy.

I am 22 years old . . . born in Issaquah, Washington . . . lived 16 years in Long Beach, Calif., where I attended Edison grammar and Junior high school . . . graduated from polytechnic high school and went two years to the Long Beach Junior college. My major and minor subjects were art and dramatics. I was a receptionist for two years until the time of evacuation on April 4, 1942.

If you are interested in keeping news wires alive between Denson and Fargo, please tell me about Fargo and write often. However, the best news would be to know that college is wonderful and you have lots of friends. I envy you, and wish that the fence between you and I were not government owned.
