Bison Attempt To Maintain Home Win Streak Tomorrow

Bob Lowe's Bison will take the Field house floor tomorrow night at 8 against the South Dakota State Jackrabbits with three objectives in mind.

They will be out to stay in the NCI title race, to avenge a 40-37 loss to the Bunnies at Brookings, Jan. 8, and to keep their record of undefeated games on the home floor intact for the fourth straight year.

Currently in second place among the loop leaders, the Bunnies are on the rebound after losing to Morningside last week. They downed Augustana, 45 to 35, Tuesday, and are seeking their fourth conference win against a single defeat at Grand Forks tonight. Should SDS humble the Sioux, NCI leaders, the Rabbits would have undisputed possession of the top spot when they come here tomorrow.

Victorious in its first two starts on the home court, the Herd "wants this game badly," according to Lowe. "We'll have our hands full, but they're not out of our class."

6 foot 7 inch Bob Schryver, Bunnie big boy who uses his height to good advantage, will again be a thorn in the side of the Bison club. His height enables him to control the ball under both baskets. He is particularly adept at jumping up ABOVE the hoop and batting the ball away before a basket can be scored.

"We can't play an orthodox game against a tall boy like that," declares the Bison mentor.

Other capable performers on the Rabbit roster include Jim Schmidt, sensational sophomore forward, Harry Franz, aggressive little guard, Tommy Lyons, and Jim Postels.

Lowe plans to start veterans Bob Yeasley and Russ Burfening at forwards, sophomore Red Brostrom at center, and Nick Soulis at one guard. The other back court opening spot is uncertain with Jim Noonan, Don Polis, and Howie Rohs battling for the call.

OCS Officer Speaks At Nutrition Week Convo

As a feature of Nutrition Week, Capt. W. O. Flom of the Officer Candidate School addressed Thursday's convocation on army nutrition. Dr. J. H. Longwell, campus chairman of NDAC's first Nutrition Week, also spoke.

Stating that the United States soldier is the best fed in the world, Captain Flom said, "To be a good fighter he must be superior in all departments, physical, mental and moral."

Asserting that the civilian population must sacrifice so that the army could continue as the best cared for in the world, Captain Flom declared that all foodstuffs he had seen in inspection tours were of the highest caliber.

Dr. Longwell discussed the need

for student education on food and the value of proper nutrition. Using the establishment of classes for this purpose as an example of how the problem of proper student nutrition is being solved, Dr. Longwell also mentioned plans for a breakfast room in Ceres Hall for those students who would normally skip breakfast in preference to an extra five minutes of sleep each morning.

A nutrition film in technicolor was also shown.

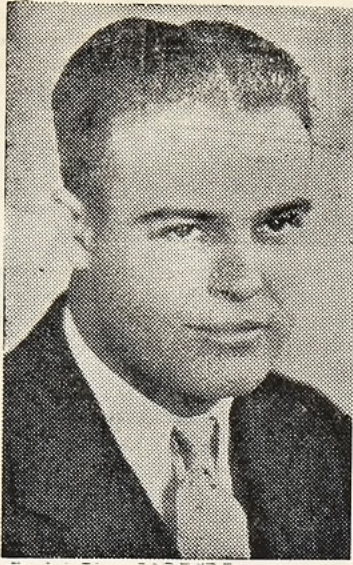
George Klein led both teams with 12 points, but of no avail, as the Yanks scored a 26-22 win over SAE II, Wednesday.

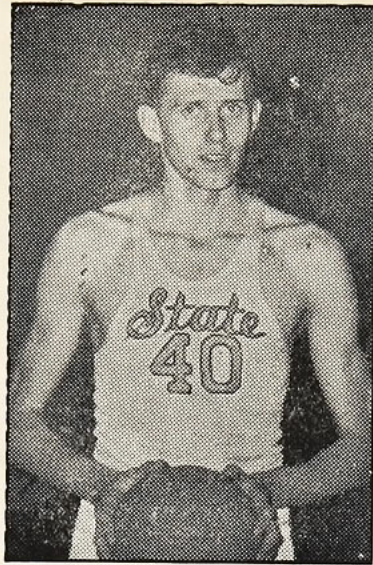
Sigma Chi teams II and III forfeited Tuesday to the Y Dugout and the Yanks.
