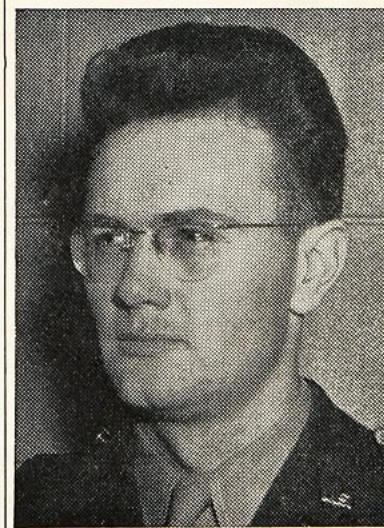

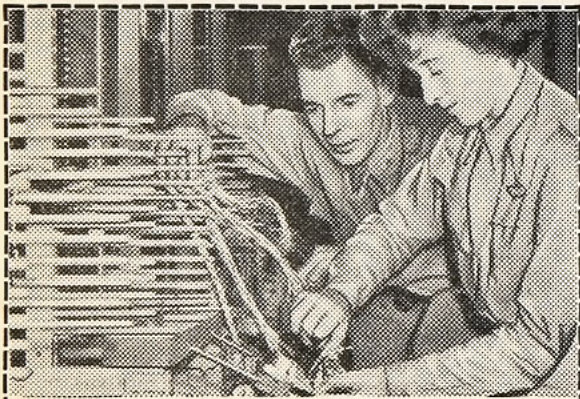
ISA Elects Three Executive Members

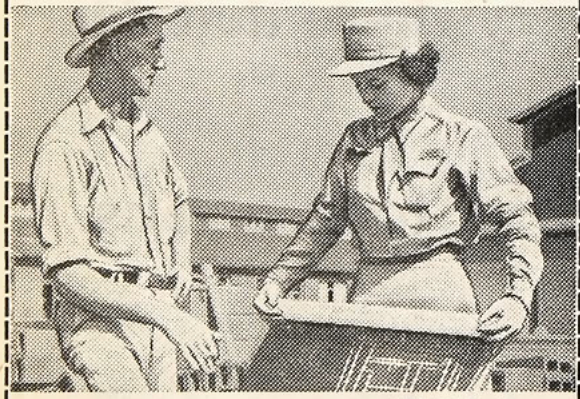

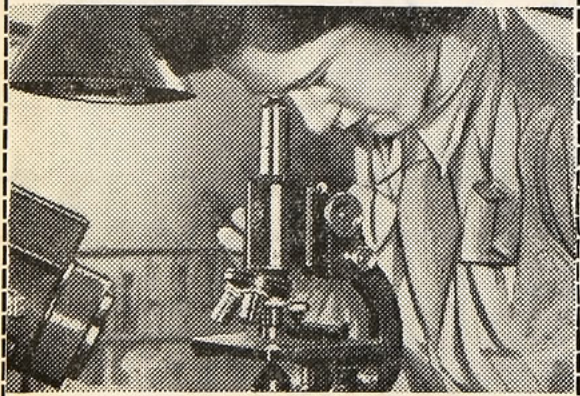

After dropping a close contest to South Dakota State at Brookings, 40-37, Friday, the Bison basketball team broke into the NCI win column with a thrilling 43-42 decision over Augustana in an overtime game Saturday, at Sioux Falls.

Three Bison were ejected from the game on personal fouls: Jim Noonan left in the second period, followed by Russ Burfening in the third, and Bob Yeasley in the finale.

Yeasley was the Herd's most potent point-getter with 11; Burfening had 10, and Brostrom and Rohs counted 5 each.

BISON 43; VIKINGS 42

As in the Jackrabbit game the night before, the Bison again

found themselves trailing, 28-17, at halftime against an Augustana aggregation displaying brilliant ball.

But in the second half the Bison big guns began to boom, giving the Herd a 37-35 margin shortly before the final gun. Two Viking free throws knotted the count at 37-37 as the game ended, sending the teams into an overtime period in which the Bison, with Burfening tallying twice and Brostrom once, eked out the win.

Burfening topped Bison scorers with 16; he was followed by Brostrom with 10, Rohs with 8, and Yeasley with 5. Art Kilness, Augie ace, paced his mates with 14.

Dragons Down Cobbers To Even Trophy Series

In a game of more than passing interest to Bison players and fans, the MSTC Dragons downed Concordia 37-29, Wednesday night to even the Moorhead Daily News Trophy race at one-all. Concordia won the opener 42-31 in December.

High-scoring Craig Hertsgaard of the Cobbers and Curls Nelson of the Dragons were locked in a defensive duel, as each held the other to six points.

Dick La France was elected "rook king" for 2nd term pledges. Something new has been added—Don Anderson of Litchfield is newest Theta Chi catch.

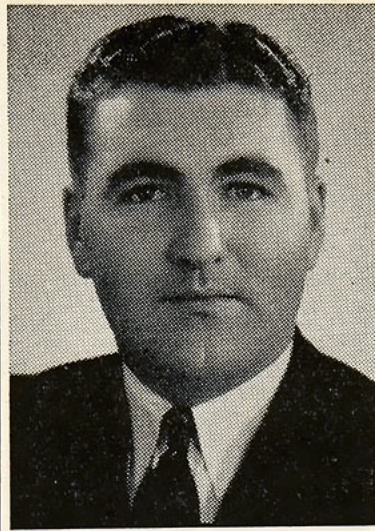
