term goes for athletics. Fair enough. If we were paying separate admission for each game,
it would far exced that amount. One twentytwo a term pays for the Bison. Some schools charge as much as ten dollars in addition to the
activity fee, so we're not griping there. The activity fee, so we're not griping there. The
Spectrum gets forty-eight cents. Whether that's valid, we could hardly say. The student commission, the Women's Senate, the band, and the
individual classes come in for apportioned amounts of thirty-one and one-fourth cents. The
