Emma Nelson, Art Ziegler Have Leads in Allan Langdon Martin Drama

The Senior class of North Dakota State will present "Smilin' Through" as their annual class play, on Friday, 8:15 p. m., at the Little Country Theatre.

"Smilin' Through" is a play in a prologue and three acts, by Allan Langdon Martin. The story of the play is that Kathleen Dunganon is in love with Kenneth Wayne, but her aging and stubborn uncle, John Carteret, having taken oath that no one of his line shall ever marry a Wayne, forbids their marriage. Pressed for an explanation of his seemingly unreasonable prejudice, he begins the story of something that happened 50 years ago. There is a "flashback" to the period in which Carteret and one Jeremiah Wayne were in love with Mooneyen Clare. She chose Carteret, and Wayne, becoming wildly jealous and quite drunk, forced his way into the house on the day of the wedding, and shouting at Carteret, accidentally killed Mooneyen, as she threw herself in front of her lover. Remembering this, Carteret continues firm in his opposition to the modern romance until the spirit of Mooneyen Clare and Sarah Wayne, mother of Kenneth, get a message across from the other world, softening his stubborn heart.

The scenic effects are very beautiful, and are being arranged for by a committee headed by Forrest Willey. Miss Jane Eddy is in charge of the costumes, and special music has been secured for the play.

Rifle Champions Journey Toward Capitol June 14

Ross, Comm, Lee, Arthur, Johnson, Barks Take Trip To Receive Awards

Plans for the trip which the North Dakota State college rifle team and their coach will make to Washington, D. C., have been completed, according to Captain Frank M. Ross, coach of the team. The trip is given to the team by William Randolph Hearst in recognition of their winning the Hearst trophy.

The party, including Captain Ross, Edward Comm, Alvin Lee, Arthur Johnson, Kenneth Piper, and Morris Barks, will leave Fargo on the morning of Saturday, June 14, and will spend four days in Washington, June 16, 17, 18, and 19.

While in Washington the individual medals will be presented to the members of the team by the Secretary of War. Among the other events which have been scheduled are a trip to Mount Vernon, a visit to the patent office and the bureau of patents, an inspection of the United States treasury, the Capitol, and the Congressional Library, and a visit to the Smithsonian Institute. The team will also attend a baseball game between Washington and Philadelphia on the afternoon of June 19.

During their stay in Washington the party will make their headquarters at the Mayflower hotel. The return trip to Fargo will be begun on the evening of June 19, arriving here June 22.

All expenses for the entire trip are paid by Mr. Hearst.

Matt LeFor Chosen President In Annual Election Preceding Banquet

W. P. Porterfield, retired Fargo druggist, was presented with certificate of honorary membership by Rho Chi, honorary pharmaceutical society of the North Dakota State college, at a banquet in the Powers hotel Tuesday night. This is the first time the honor has been conferred, but it will be granted annually, according to Miss Laura Sticka, Beach, N. D., who presided at the dinner.

Graduating from the Philadelphia School of Pharmacy, Philadelphia, Pa., in 1878, Mr. Porterfield came immediately to North Dakota and operated a general store at Davenport. Later he moved to Fargo and operated a drug store at 61 Broadway, at that time called Fout and Porterfield. This business was purchased and now carried on by the Cook Drug company.

In 1902, he was elected president of the North Dakota Pharmaceutical association and served from 1907 to 1930 on the North Dakota board of pharmacy. He has been vice-president of the American Pharmaceutical association and president of the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy. This title of "master of pharmacy" was bestowed on him by his school recently.

At present, Mr. Porterfield is a director of the Merchants National bank, a member of the city park board, B. P. O. E., Scottish Rite bodies, Shiloh lodge and Masonic orders.

Harry McLachlin the stubby little whirlwind is the only man lost to next year's hockey team. Harry graduates with three letters won in this branch of athletics.

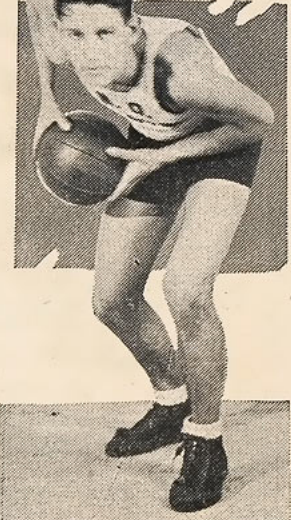

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE

Article III, Section 3 of the North Central Conference rulings: Athletic directors and coaches shall not, by the initiation of correspondence, by the distribution of literature, or by personal interviews of his own seeking, endeavor to recruit athletes. It is legitimate for them, in speeches, or in response to inquiries, or in casual conversation, to point out what they believe to be the advantages of attending the institution which they represent, but further they shall not go. Moreover, they shall actively exert their influence to discourage questionable recruiting by alumni and students.

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Bayliss Succeeds Rudolph Ottersen YMCA Secretary

Architecture Instructor Assumes Active Work During September

Dudley C. Bayliss, instructor in the department of architecture, has been appointed secretary of the college Y. M. C. A. for the coming school year. Mr. Bayliss will succeed Prof. Rudolph Ottersen, retiring secretary, and in addition to his new duties, he will also retain a part-time instructorship in the architectural department.

Bayliss will begin work actively in September, taking charge of the secretarial business interests of association and working out a good constructive social academic and athletic Y. M. C. A. program. At present he is cooperating with Carl Albrecht, newly elected president of the "Y" on the organization of a new cabinet.

The committee in charge of the selection of the new secretary has based its choice on leadership and respectability. Mr. Bayliss has demonstrated on the campus that he is a congenial chap and he will unquestionably set a fine example for the boys and will add much prestige to the organization.

Frank Forbes has been selected to take charge of the athletic phase of the program and Arthur Knight will be in charge of the Freshman program and is already working on the plan of organization for a Frosh Orientation entertainment which will be more important and more elaborate this year than it has been in previous years.

A constructive program is now in progress for the improvement of the Y. M. C. A. building, the exterior improvements being already completed and steps are being made to enlarge and improve the facilities of the dug-out which has proven a very successful addition to the campus. The "Y" this year particularly through the influence of Joseph Lindgren, retiring president, has risen in the estimation of the students.

C. Nelson who has also served on the "Y" Board before and who has taken a general interest in student welfare.

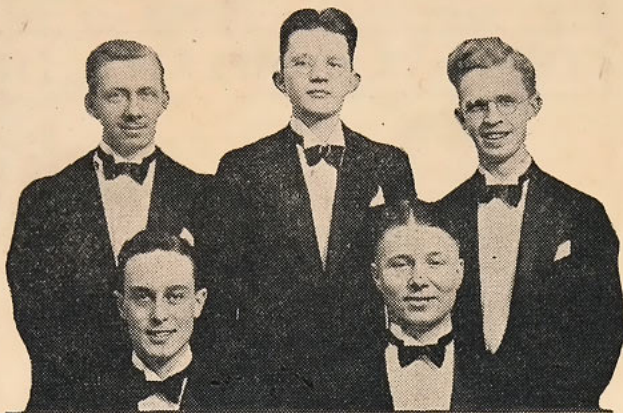

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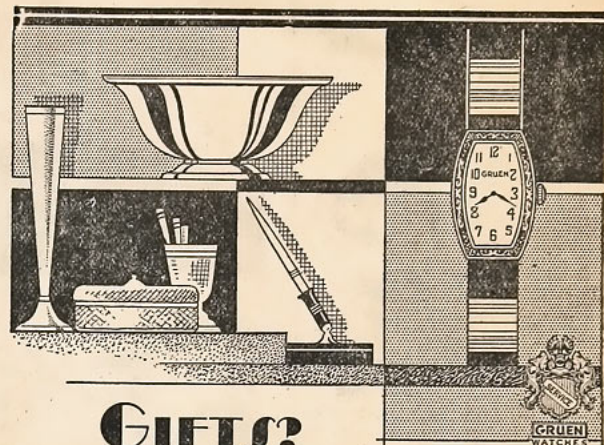

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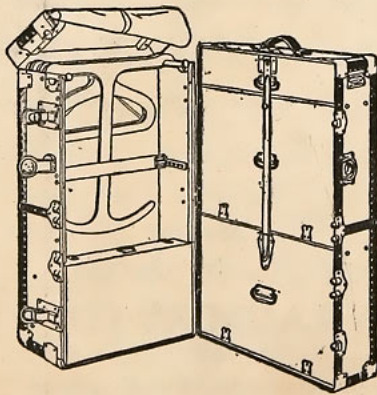


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
