Manitoba Agricultural North Dakota State Fri. Dual Debate

Lawrence, Gast, Buchli, and Wolla Will Represent State

Manitoba Agricultural college and North Dakota State college will meet in a dual international debate Wednesday, March 5, 1930. They will debate on the question, "Resolved, that the Canadian government should adopt stringent measures to prevent run running from Canada into the United States."

The Manitoba affirmative team will come to Fargo for the debate, while the North Dakota affirmative will journey to Manitoba. Members of the local team who will uphold the affirmative at Manitoba are: Donald Lawrence, Fargo, junior in the school of agriculture, and Loyal Gast, Beltrami, Minn., a senior in the school of agriculture.

Albert Buchli, Golden Valley, a freshman in the school of agriculture, and Chester Wolla, Tioga, a junior in the school of agriculture, are the local representatives who will oppose the Canadians here.

UNIT COURSES OFFER NATURE LIFE STUDY

A series of unit courses intended to call attention to the native life of the state and to acquaint the teacher with the common forms, their habits and use for classwork, will be a feature of a group of such courses to be taught at North Dakota Agricultural college summer school session to be begun June 17. O. A. Stevens, associate professor of agricultural botany, is in charge of the series which will last the duration of the six weeks.

A week each will be spent on birds, animals, animal life, weeds, flowers, and plant life.

For each unit course lasting a week, one-half college credit will be given, Dean A. D. Weeks of the school of education and director of summer school, announced. More than 100 unit courses will be taught during the six weeks by the various college departments. The United College idea is an inauguration at the college.

Howland Awarded First In Futuristic Design Competition

Architects Compete for Prizes In Futuristic Drawings

Banked by ferns and surmounted by modernistic draperies, the huge windows of Herbst Department store present to the people of Fargo their city of the future as it is visioned by the architects of North Dakota State college.

Under the stimulus of a competition for three prizes offered by Herbst to those students who best conceived the Fargo of tomorrow, nineteen future architects offered their ideas of everything from aeroplane landings to a complicated tube system.

The winning design, drawn by Charlotte Howland, junior in the school of mechanic arts, was that of the growth of Fargo through the development of a large waterway system effected through the transfer of water to the Red river. Miss Howland's sketch showed a Fargo of large wharfs and steamboat landings, docks and warehouses. The second prize was won by Herman Skaret, who depicted an office building of tomorrow, while the third winner was Ernest Nystrom, whose "Hotel of Tomorrow" emphasized the combination of intense concentration of space with beauty of line which tomorrow's architecture will embody.

The first prize carried an award of two terms tuition, the second that of one term, and the third the tuition for half a term. Judges were Messrs. Kurke, Rossetti, and Chestnut.

Groups are now working on a finale, an innovation in this year's production, in which each of the acts will be represented. A tieup feature is also being planned for between acts.

Huntoon Makes Statement
"Fargoans will be agreeably surprised when they witness what a high calibre vaudeville performance these organizations will present. With the passing of the circuit vaudeville, local theatergoers have had few opportunities to attend a real life revue. We believe this fills the bill," Mr. Huntoon stated.

Everett Wallum, manager of the show for Blue Key fraternity, which is sponsoring the event, has arranged a matinee for Fargo high school students at 2:45 p. m., March 3. The evening performances begin at 8 p. m.

The Acts
Alpha Kappa Phi and Kappa Kappa Gamma, winners of the fraternity and sorority divisions, respectively, last year, are again entered with acts very similar in construction to those which took cups in 1929. The Kappas have a song and dance act with human bookends, while the Kappa Phis have assembled a 10 piece jazz band which will feature some oriental hoofing.

"Go to Blazes" is the name of the Alpha Sigma Tau act which has for its theme a fire station in Birmingham. Singing and dancing are featured. Sigma Phi Delta fraternity, a new entrant in the Brevities, looks to bizarre stage effects to please the judges. The title of the act is "Cold Light" and portrays an airman lost in the arctic.

"Kampus Dope", title for the Kappa Delta contribution, is a collegiate act with the setting "Old Main." There will be coed football players and dancers.

A Burlesque
Burlesquing on the "Trial of Mary Dugan", Delta Kappa Sigma fraternity will present a mock trial which was written by William Shine, student in architecture. The name of the act is the same as the picture with Blugen substituted for Dugan. A dance specialty will feature. The Y. M. C. A. has an act of muscular ability and control called "The Tawney Tumblers." The act was coached by Meredith Mattingly, student tumbler.

Phi Omega Pi sorority will bring things to home with "In a Kitchenette", a dance and song act featuring costumes depicting vegetables.

"Advue" is the name of the Gamma Phi Beta sorority presentation which will be a series of takeoffs on modern advertising. This is billed as the last act and will be followed by the finale. Cups to be presented winners of the acts are on display in the Merchants National Bank window.

Competition for the Bison Brevities ticket sales cup closes at 4 p. m. today with the winner in doubt, it was announced by Victor Madsen, in charge of the campaign.

Tickets have been selling so brisk that all pasteboards are at present in charge of the organizations, which have cooperated in staging the most heated drive ever undertaken for a sales cup.

All unsold tickets must be turned in this afternoon and will be placed on sale at Sherdal's Jewelry Saturday.

On Tuesday night, two exceedingly close contests were witnessed by the fans. The Gamma Rho quint took a hard battle from the Kappa Psis by a 27 to 26 count. This game was hard fought throughout with the score see-sawing back and forth, neither team having a commanding lead at any time during the contest. Cecil Bliss Plays Best Basketball During This Season

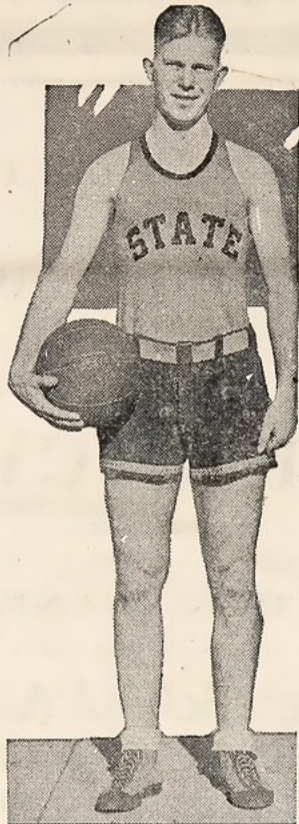

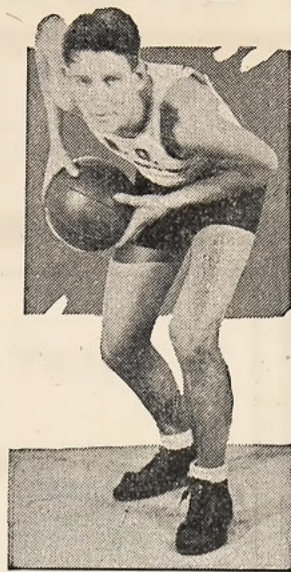
meet to select their mythical five. Bliss will long be remembered by the Bison fans as a man that shot with deadly accuracy when given an oppor-
