New Dormitory Is Possibility For Fall Term

State Senator Fowler Is Co-Author of Bill Passed in 1929

IMMEDIATE ACTION PLANNED BY SHEPPERD

New Dormitory Is Possibility For Next Fall

Alumni and friends of N. D. S. C. read with interest the recent favorable action by the North Dakota supreme court on the dormitory law, passed by the 1929 legislature. The decision clears the way for completion of the men's dormitory at N. D. S. C. the basement for which was built three years ago. At the time this is being written Acting President J. H. Shepperd is busy with plans to call a meeting of the holding corporation to consider immediate action. It is believed that the sale of bonds may be consummated early enough to permit the letting of the dormitory by the time school opens next fall.

State Alumnus Helps

One of the co-authors of the Act which withstood the test of the supreme court was State Senator Arthur Fowler, '01, of Grand Forks, North Dakota State. He is working with him in drafting the measure and bringing it to passage was State Senator D. H. Hamilton of McHenry county. The Hamilton-Fowler Act opens the way to relieve crowded housing conditions at six state schools.

A dormitory bill passed in 1927 received an unfavorable verdict from the supreme court. The Hamilton-Fowler bill eliminates the undesirable points of the old measure and received a favorable verdict from the tribunal without reservations.

To Sell Bonds

As constituted the Hamilton-Fowler bill provides for the formation of nonprofit holding associations, to manage sale of bonds, to finance dormitory constructions, and manage the structure when completed. The holding associations, nonprofit organizations, are to retire the bonds from the rentals and net income of the dormitory. When bonds financing the structure are retired, management and ownership of the dormitory will revert to the state. Fifty years is set as a maximum time which the bonds may run.

The need of a men's dormitory at State college was brought forcibly to the attention of the authorities by J. L. Coulter, former president of the A. C., pointed out that only a small percentage of the male students enrolled at the college were taken care of by fraternity homes or as residents of the cities of Fargo and Moorhead.

Military Pictures Sent To Engraver

Pictures for the military section of the 1931 Bison were sent to the engraver Wednesday afternoon, it was announced by Amos Wallum, editor of the publication. Because of the added enrollment this year the section will be increased by one page over last year.

Aside from the number of platoons this year, the section will be very similar to that of last year. The Scabbard and Blade page will be transferred to the fraternity section.

To date the Bison life pictures and the track pages have been forwarded to the engraver, and proofs have been received, according to Mr. Wallum.

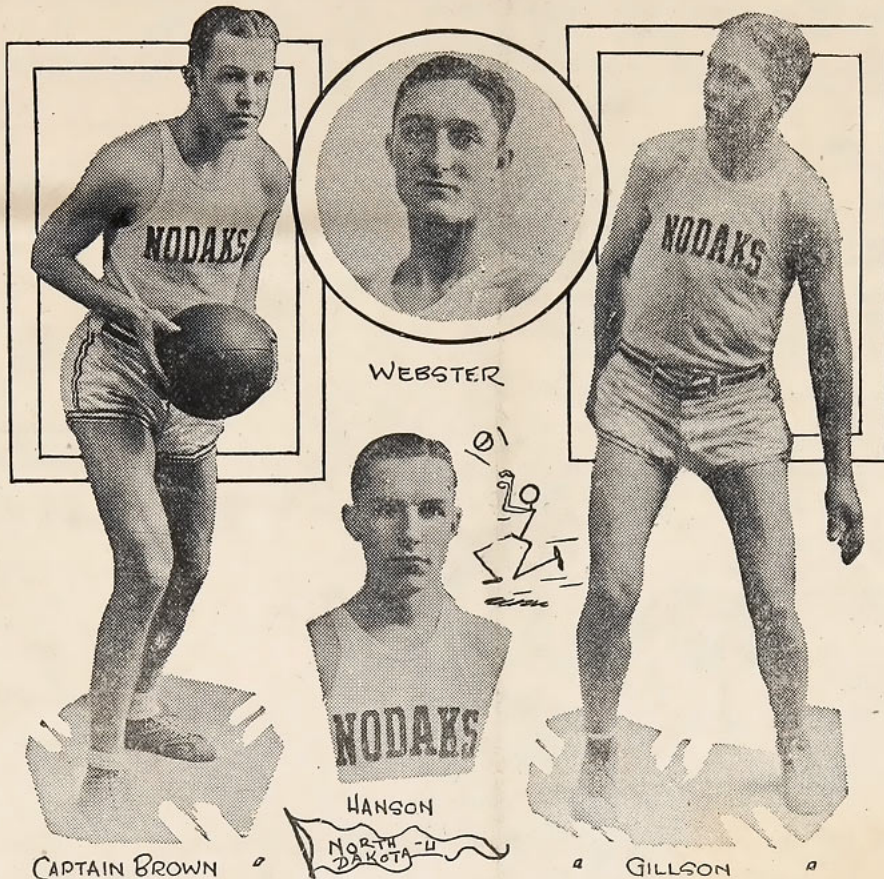
CLASS TO MEET

Plans are being completed by the committees chosen for the 1930 Charity Ball, which will be held in the Crystal Ballroom on Friday, Feb. 28. The Red Jackets will furnish the music for this formal dance, which is one of the most outstanding social events of the school year. Between 175 and 200 couples are expected to be present.

Miss Luella McDunn, a senior in Home Economics, president of the Pan-Hellenic Council, and vice-president of Phi Kappa Lambda sorority, will lead the Grand March this year with her partner, who is as yet unannounced. Miss Virginia Davis, secretary of Pan-Hellenic Council and member of Kappa Delta sorority and her partner, will be second in line.

The Charity Ball is a traditional social event sponsored by the different sororities and is supervised by the Pan-Hellenic Council, composed of members selected from the different sororities. Through the aid of the Charity Ball an annual donation of \$100 has been made to the Fargo Community Chest for the benefit of the sick and needy. Besides this annual donation, a fund has been started to help women students who are in need of financial aid. A special effort is being made to have the 1930 Charity Ball a financial success in order that the Council may undertake a proposed project.

Miss McDunn says that much effort will be put forth to make the 1930 Charity Ball an even greater success than the elaborate Charity Balls of previous years. Simplicity and originality will be stressed in the tone of the ballroom decorations.

Bison-Nodak Clash To Fill State Armory

University Delegation Will Be Largest in History of Series

SAALYMEN GIVEN EDGE IN CONFLICT

State Reserve Strength Feels Loss of Goodwin and Fairhead

When N. D. S. and N. D. U. meet in the armory tonight, the state championship will be at stake for the Nodaks, and a good chance for the conference title will be at stake by the Bison. For the first time in four years, the Bison will enter the series as favorites, but there is little to choose between the two, since Saaly's crew suffered the loss of Fairhead and Goodwin, and the Nodaks have shown lots of improvement in their recent games. Right now they are considered as strong as any team in the conference, and it is fair to say that the two North Dakota teams are more evenly matched than they have been in many years.

Sport fans of the University and Grand Forks are not going to miss the classic unless Casey Finnegan cannot find room for them all in the old armory. Word has been received from Grand Forks that the largest crowd ever sent from there to witness an athletic contest will be in Fargo for the three games between representatives of the two schools. Besides the two games Friday and Saturday between the varsity teams, there will also be a contest Saturday afternoon engaging the "U" frosh and the Baby Bison.

Subs Worry Saaly

Coach Saalwaechter is satisfied that his starting lineup will be strong enough to keep pace with the speedy Nodaks, but he shudders every time he thinks of the possibility of one of his regulars being ejected on personal fouls. The tendency of players to be over anxious and commit infractions of the rules might prove disastrous to the Bison, because their reserve strength has been sapped by the necessity of putting Eric Nordstrom and Leo Thomasson into regular or alternate positions. Nordstrom not only filled Goodwin's place satisfactorily, but he proved to be the big threat in State's lineup against Morningside by leading the scoring for the evening.

An interesting battle of another type will be waged in the armory before each game when Doc Putnam's Gold Star Band has its annual indoor duel with Dr. Howard's band from the "U". Those fans who fill the rush seats long before time to start the game will be well entertained by the rivalry of the cheering sections and bands.

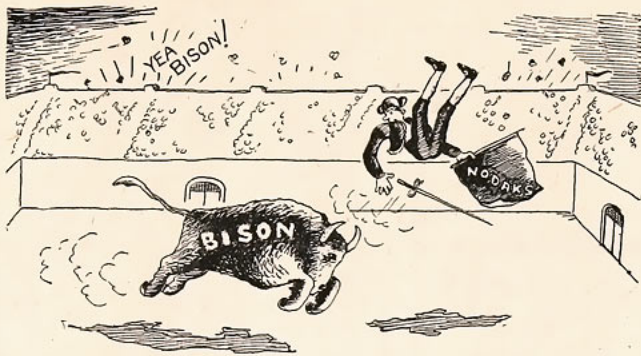

Members of the casts of Grumpy and William Tell, plays which will be given in the Little Country Theatre in the next two weeks, were also guests.

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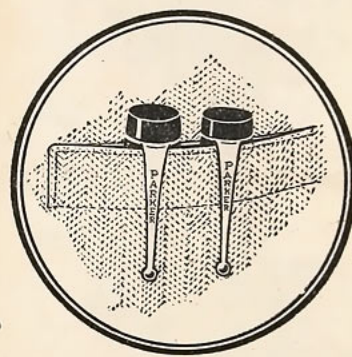
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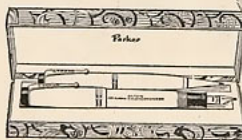
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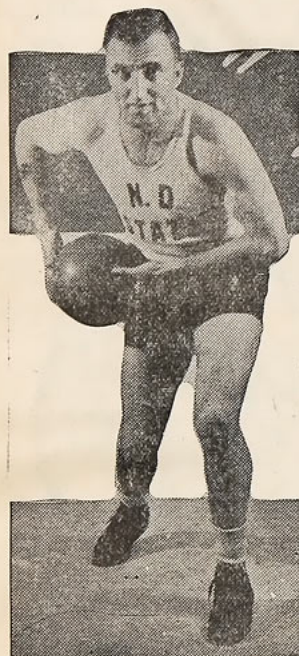
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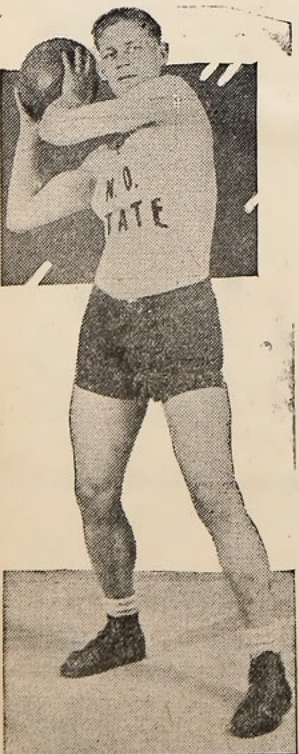
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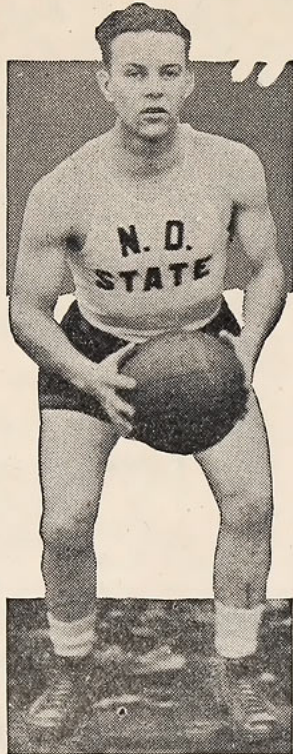

SAALY GREETES YOU

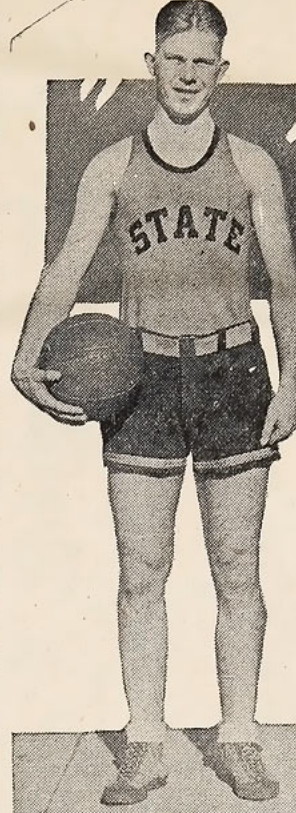
