### Theta Chis Win The Intramural Track Trophy

Kappa Phis Win Both Relays With Their Outstanding Athlete, Ole Sand

Theta Chi tracksters, presenting an evenly valenced cinder team, dashed, jumped, tossed weights, and vaulted their way to 54 1/2 points, sufficient by 9 1/2 points, to win the third annual intramural track meet which was held on Dacotah field Saturday.

Ten records were shattered in the annual spring classic. Three of new marks made were setup by the flying feet of Ole Sand, Alpha Kappa Phi dashman. Sand clipped the time of the 100 and 220 yard dashes and the 220 yard low hurdles. Sand also annexed the high point honor by gaining 22 points in six events.

Alpha Kappa Phi turf pounders were second to Theta Chi with 45 points. Alpha Sigma Tau were close on the heels of Kappa Phi with 36 1/2 points. The Y.M.C.A. entry also showed up well taking fourth place with 32 points.

In winning the championship the Theta Chi athletes counted in all but three events those being the low hurdles, mile and two mile runs. Theta Chi weightmen counted heavy in the shotput where Leo May and Bill Hilts snatched up nine points winning first and second respectively. Theta Chi also polled heavy in the dashes where Carroll, and Grohne were trailers of Sand. Members of the Theta Chi team contributing to winning aggregate are: Leo May, Cecil Carroll, Baldy Hays, Jack Grohne, Jim Hill, Bill Hilts, and Bill McRoberts. Leo May was the heavy scorer of the Theta Chi entry securing 12 points.

Two trophies and a record were the results of a speedy Alpha Kappa Phi relay team which nosed out the Alpha Gamma Rho team in the 440 yard relay and repeated their feat with the Theta Chi quartet as second in the 880 yard relay. The Kappa Phi team lowered the 880 record from 1:40.6 to 1:35.6.

Next to the relays, the century was the feature event of the meet. Ole Sand closely followed by Carroll, Grohne, and Peschel, fairly flew through the air to break the mark established by Dave Aitken in the initial intramural meet.

The battle for the supremacy of the javelin throw lived up to expectations, the record being bettered by all entries winning points in the event. Redhouse Johnson bettered the record by 30 feet when he tossed the shaft 175.5 feet. Johnson's new mark was closely followed by a throw made by Paul Bunt which was good for 167.1 feet.

Roy Jordre, Kappa Sigma Chi, gave a fine exhibition of how the half mile should be run. Jordre cut the semi-mile run from 2:15 to 2:05. Frank Haley, running for the Y.M.C.A., shattered the mile record traversing the distance in 4:54.

Prospects of the Bison having a powerful grid machine for the 1929 campaign have taken on a much brighter hue following the football game played by two evenly matched Bison grid teams Thursday evening. The two fighting teams were so evenly matched that neither were able to gain definite advantage, the game ending in a scoreless tie.

A great backfield pitted against a strong line was the impression of the majority of fans prior to the game, for the yellow jersied team had a ball lugging quartet made up of May, Lonsbrough, Westgate, and Pariseau. The green sweatered line was made up of such stars as captain Ordahl, McGrath, Shamp, Law, and McMillan. Gergen and Hanson were the only veteran backs to perform in the green backfield while Hiltz and Skaret were the only lettermen in the Yellow line-up.

New grid candidates capable of making strong bids for varsity positions were found on both teams. One of the most outstanding players of the day was Ralph Herseth, tackle on the yellow team, who with the aid of Art Hoveland repelled the vicious off tackle onslaughts of the green backfield. Herseth also gave fans a pleasing exhibition when he bored his way through the green backfield to block a punt and place his team in a scoring position.

In the opening quarter of play the two teams played on even terms, neither team being able to penetrate the other's line when on the defense. In the second period Hanson, Gergen, and Goodwin smashed their way to the Yellow's one yard line but their drive was halted at this point by Hoveland, fighting Yellow guard.

During the third period May, Westgate, and Lonsbrough, bucked the line and slipped off tackle to within a short distance of scoring. The Yellow

ball luggers were halted in their touchdown march by a penalty. Lonsbrough made a pretty off tackle run for the Yellow in their campaign for a touchdown.

In the final stanza the teams fought on even terms. Sam Westgate, with but a few minutes of play remaining, left finger marks on six or seven green clad tacklers when he stiff-armed his way through the Green team on a spirited 25 yard dash. Leo May followed up Westgate's run by a ten yard run off the opposite end.

Cod Ordahl turned in a great line performance as defensive center for the Green. Ordahl sifted his way through the Yellow team and repeatedly threw the hard hitting Yellow backs for losses. McMillan and McGrath, Green team guards also showed themselves as strong candidates for the Varsity. Hiltz and Skaret showed much class in their line positions.

Carl Miller played the leading role of the ends. Miller, a hard tackler, will make a great bid for the wing position for the coming season.

Some of the most vicious line plunging of the day was that done by Oscar Hanson veteran fullback. Gergen, Hanson's teammate, also showed some classy ball carrying.

Linemen with great possibilities are Shamp and Law. With the early fall practice the two massive tackles should make the going tough for any team. Other line candidates that showed up well are Bollman, Halev, Wahl, and Gorder.

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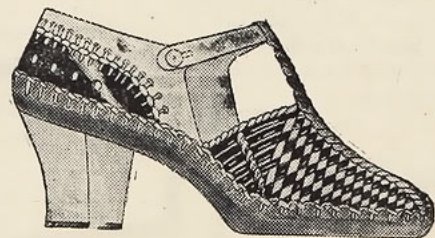

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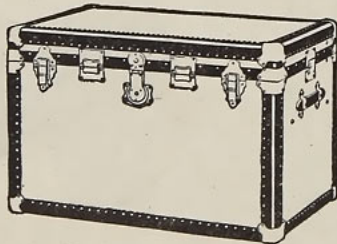

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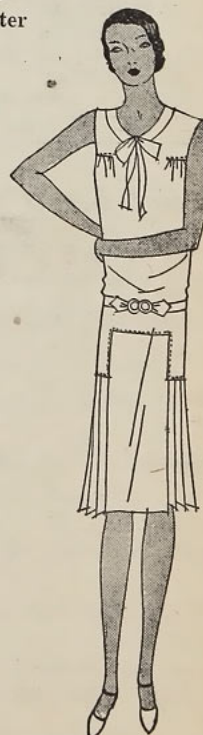
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
