

## Bison To Meet Several Illinois Teams In '29-30

Saalwaechter Announces Two Changes In Rules On Return From Chicago

Coach Saalwaechter, who recently returned from a meeting held by college basketball coaches in Chicago, announces that several games have now been scheduled for the holiday basketball trip to be taken by the Bison next season. The majority of the colleges to oppose the Bison are located in Illinois and Missouri, a locality heavily infested with fast teams.

Teams which are already scheduled to play the Bison are Minnesota, De Paul, Loyola, St. Louis University, and Lombard college. The Bison cage mentor states that there are possibilities of the Bison opposing other Big Ten universities or teams of Big Ten caliber.

DePaul university, Chicago, which was defeated by the Bison in football two years ago, will probably be the first team to pit their cage skill against the Bison on the Illinois invasion. Sally's crew hold a verdict over the Loyola quint which will be the second team to be played in the pineapple city.

Lombard College gave the Bison their most severe defeat in their encounter two years ago and eked out a win over the Saalymen last season. The Bison have never had prior court hostilities with the St. Louis University team, but the St. Louis quint is reputed as being one of the strongest teams in Missouri. Coach Saalwaechter stated that at least three other teams would be added to the present campaign list.

### Rules Changed

Two important changes in the basketball rules were results of the cage mentors conference. The power of the center was somewhat relieved by prohibiting the catching of the ball after the tip off. The rule makes it necessary for the ball to touch the floor or another player before the man who tips it can legally catch the ball. A radical change that advocated the putting of the ball in play by a side line play will be given trial by a number of eastern teams. The success with which it meets in these trials will greatly influence its use or disuse in the future.

The ball, which was previously put into play after the second attempt of a double gift shot, will now be called dead following the second attempt. The ball will be taken back to the center position whether the free throw is made good or missed. This clause was given entrance to the rule book in that it eliminates the chance of a team gaining the advantage by having two free chances and a possible chance of making a basket following a missed second gift shot.

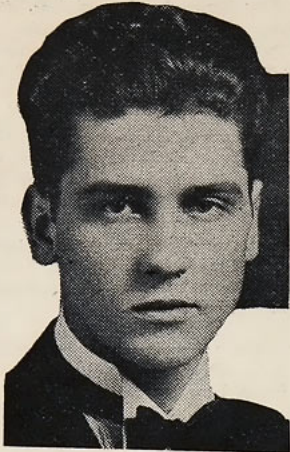
## ART CLUB FORMAL TO BE THIS SATURDAY

**OUR FUTURE LIBRARY**

With attention ever fixed on the progress of this institution and the forces that will aid such advancement, The Spectrum turns its attention to what it considers the paramount necessity of the N. D. S. C.—a new library. We feel that the glaring facts of the case for such a structure are well known. Governor Shafer recently vetoed a bill appropriating \$5,000 to be applied on an addition to the present structure. He should be congratulated for his proper estimate of a growing problem and a vision of the future. The need can only be satisfied by a new building, centralizing campus library facilities in such a place, and more books, notably reference material. A school is as great as its library. When the legislature appreciates our need and makes provision for its satisfaction we predict that N. D. S. C. will overstep all present limits of size and influence.—H.P.

**TENTATIVE "SCIENCE" PLANS WELL UNDER WAY**

Tentative plans for the new wing to be built on Science Hall are now in the hands of Dean Minard. This addition will be the third structure to be constructed on the present site, the original Science Hall having been built in 1901, and known as the southwest wing. The next addition came in 1917 and is called the center section. Now, in 1929, it is expected that the building will be finally completed by the construction of the proposed north wing.

This north wing will be joined to the present building. It will be, according to present plans, the same

width as the south addition but 112 feet in length, or about forty feet longer than the north wall of the center section. The same style of architecture will be followed throughout. Approaching from the east, one will note that the east end balances off that of the southern wing. A center entrance is planned for the north side. In order to keep within bounds of the appropriation it is intended to reserve the new building exclusively for classrooms and offices, doing away with the necessity for installing equipment for laboratories. Thus about twenty-four new classrooms will be acquired to be used principally by the students in the Science and Literature school. Some of the features of the architect's

plans include: a study room to relieve the crowded condition at the library; a new office for the Dean of the Science and Literature department; several rooms for high school students, including an assembly room; a large lecture room for students of economics and history; a different system of ventilation, calling for an individual system for each room.

It is understood that these plans are subject to revision. Dean Minard expressed the hope that a bid would be accepted in time to begin work in May, for completion next September. If possible the ground for the new wing will be broken during the May Festival.

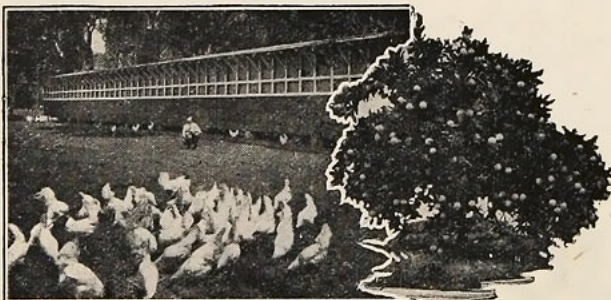
