BISON STILL HAVE UNDEFEATED RECORD AT HEAD OF LIST

CORTRIGHT CAGERS DOWN BUNNIES ON FRIDAY EVENING FOR THIRD TIME IN AS MANY STARTS—38-19.

THOMPSON STARS IN JIMMY TILT

THUNDERING HERD COMPLETELY OUTCLASSES JIMMIES IN OVERWHELMING THEM 39-18 SATURDAY.

Jack West's South Dakota State Jackrabbits hopped into the armory here Friday evening with the idea that the undefeated Bison quint could be defeated. An hour or so later they hopped out again with an altered frame of mind, for the unbeatable Bison basketeers had beaten the Bunnies 38-19 for the third time in three conference starts.

Bison Trio Star.

Captain Blakely, Arnold and McPherson were the outstanding Cortright cagers. This trio accounted for 27 of their team's 38 points, contributing nine points apiece to the Bison cause. Claudie Miller's defensive work was the feature of that department of the game. Captain Ekern of the Bunnie crew, and Sorbell were Jack West's star performers.

Saturday evening the herd completely outclassed the Jamestown college quint and overwhelmed them 39-18. Five regulars and seven reserves carried the Yellow and Green to victory over the invading Jimies. Every one of the five regulars took care of his position in faultless style, Wad Thompson being high scorer of the contest with five field goals and two free throws for a dozen points. Sage and Gussner were the stars for Erickson's crew, Gussner's guarding and Sage's floor work being the features of the Jimie game.

Rabbits Score First.

The Jacrabbits were the first to score when Eckern came through with a free throw. Within the next five minutes Captain Blakely had counted four goals from the floor and a foul shot, and the Bunies had registered once from the field, giving the Bison a 9-3 advantage. Popowski scored from the foul line and Ekern scored from the side making it 9-6. Newgard and McPherson opened their offensive program and raised the count to 13. Ekern duplicated his initial basket and Nodings tok advantage of Blakely's foul. Cy Arnold took the leather near the center of the floor to drop it through the net and complicated matters 15-9. Following a nice pass from Blakely, Thompson scored from under the basket, and Sorbel impersonated Wad to the letter, gathering in a long pass from Ekern and ending the half 17-11.

The Bison opened the final period with a sweeping attack that raised the score 28-11 before the Westmen could locate the net. Arnold dropped a foul shot through the basket and dribbled through the whole Bunnie defense on the next play for a basket. McPherson made one of two free throws and Arnold caged another long double marker, making it 34-13. The State

H. C. Hoffommer, instructor in social and economic science, thinks that it is a nice feature, although some students do not properly sum up the proper requisites in voting for candidates for this section. "Judgment on

popularity is frequently based on their activities in social and athletic circles, while their scholastic standing is given but little thought," he concluded.

Jaeger was the individual star for the Preps, while Narum starred for the N. D. Harness.

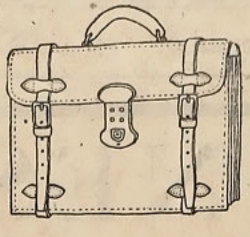
Hesperian Meeting.

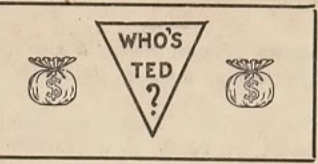
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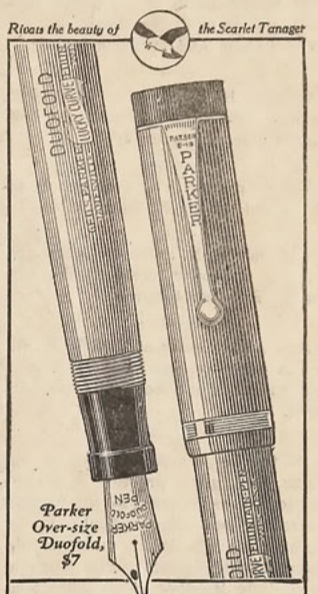

Therefore, I say let's have the other buildings as time and money permit, but first of all, let's have the new library. A. LLOYD RYALL.

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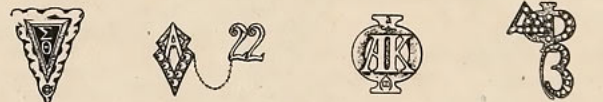
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
